## ONION CULTURE PROVES TO BE MONEY GETTER

Some Astonishing Results Achieved in Portales Valley This Year by James Ryther.

Other Interesting Items Tending to Show that in Matters Agricultural Portales Valley is It.

Every one acquainted with the conditions in Portales Valley and especially those who have experimented in truck gardening in this vicinity have long since been convinced that this section is destined to prove one of the greatest markets, gardening districts in the southwest. But no matter what the soil conditions, climate or water supply, no section of country has or can be developed without men who have the energy and pluck, the experience and the patience to work out in a practical and a successful way a given line of industry.

Happily Portales has several experienced market gardeners and several others who are fast developing along this line. One of the best known and most experienced of these, is our neighbor, James Ryther. Mr. Ryther brought into the Herald office last week a remarkable demonstration of onion growing in Portales Valley. Among many other interests in the market gardening line, Mr. Ryther has twelve rows of onions, planted in bed last September and transplanted the past March, in rows fifteen inches apart. The rows thus planted are sixteen and one half feet long and have fifty-one onions in each row, or six hundred and twelve onions in the twelve rows, and these onions, when weighed out, aggregated three hundred eighteen pounds each row, netting the owner twenty-six and one half pounds of onions and every onion weighing over one half pound. Now it will be seen that on this one square rod of ground, Mr. Ryther has raised three hundred and eighteen pounds of as fine onions as one rarely ever sees; and these onions, at two to three cents per pound, will bring the owner from six to ten dollars on the square rod of ground. Now how much is that per acre? Between nine and twelve hundred dollars worth of onions; it sounds "fishy", doesn't it? And yet, the facts are here. And the most remarkable thing about it is "how they were grown". Sowing the seed in the bed last fall and transplanting in March of the present season, they did not have any fertilizer whatever and Mr. Ryther was so busy with other matter that the onions suffered seriously for water once or twice. Of course these onions were carefully cultivated by an experienced man. But that any other man might not get equally good results per acre on this great money crop is preposterous, and with such results plainly possible and actually demonstrated, why not a larger acreage in onions and in all other garden truck?

### FOLLOW WITH CELERY.

Another fact should not be overlooked in considering the foregoing figures, viz. that this crop of onions is now harvested

and in plenty time for setting the ground in celery. And on this matter of celery, Mr. Ryther is a specialist of no mean ability. Last week, for example, we looked over one and one half acres of celery he is growing on the Priddy farm and were astonished to learn that he had over 22,000 plants growing on this little spot. And he informs us that he sometimes sets 30,000 celery plants to the acre.

### More Alfalfa Figures.

John R. Hopper, who lives in the southeast part of town has a small alfalfa patch which is something of a wonder in its way. There is three fourths of an acre in this plot and Mr. Hopper has cut it twice this far this year and cut it the third time this week. It is probably the most even stand to be found in the Valley and it sure is good to look at. Mr. Hopper says that ordinarily he irrigates twice for each cutting, when there has been no rain. This little patch of alfalfa has yielded all this year one and a half tons per cutting and there will be two more cuttings after this one or five cuttings in all, making a total yield of seven and one half tons of hay from a short three fourths of an acre of ground Mr. Hopper says that he never saw anything that responds so readily to cultivation as alfalfa and of course, he thinks that Portales Valley is the one place of all others in which to grow it and in fact, this appears to be the general opinion of all who have investigated it.

### Some Oats if You Want to Know.

Saturday evening as John Tyson was about to leave the irrigated farm belonging to him and Councilman Mart Servis, to come to Portales, he decided to go by the oat field and see how they were coming on. Now there were a great many people who were very skeptical as to whether or not oats would be a profitable crop here; however these gentlemen put out a large acreage of them, regardless of adverse opinion. Mr. Tyson, in passing the field stopped and grabbed a hand full, hap-hazard, and brought them to town with him. The Herald man happening by, he gave them to him, with the information that they were in no particular any better than an average. This bunch of oats measured fifty-four inches in height and showed a uniformity in growth most encouraging to the owners. The heads were large and well filled and, in fact, this bunch of oats looked so good that the Herald man was held up on his way to the office by a real estate man and the oats taken away from him to add to the collection they have in their office.

Mr. Tyson was afraid to estimate the yield, being a very modest and retiring gentleman, lest his veracity be called in question.

### Dr. C. O. Townsend Here.

Dr. C. O. Townsend, agriculturist for the Garden City, Kansas beet sugar company, was in Portales from Friday of last week until Wednesday of this week, looking over the sugar beet acreage contracted by this company. Dr. Townsend says that he is more than pleased with the experiment at this place and is satisfied that the demonstration has conclusively proved that Portales Valley is a sugar beet producing district. Also that we have an added advantage in that the crop can safely be left in the ground until ready for use or shipment. Mr. Townsend has promised the Herald a letter, relative to the industry in this community, which should give our readers some valuable information and be of considerable interest to our farmers.

### Mr. Pruett Buys A Home.

After living, or rather "Bathing", in a side room in his blacksmith shop, with his family living five miles in the country, his children without adequate school privileges, his home life disarranged for five years, J. S. Pruett last week purchased of Judge C. M. Compton, the 150 feet of lots and the house adjoining his shop property in Portales. It looks like a case of where "all things come to him who waits", for the property passed to Mr. Pruett for just about half its real worth, the consideration being \$1100, we are told. And now, Mr. Pruett can bring his family in to town where the "man of the house" will "live and board at the same place", where the children and family can attend school and church. Mr. Pruett will begin at once to improve the place and in fact, make it over, and now that he will be able to live at home, we have no doubt that the new program will make over again the man who owns the place.

### Portales Girl Married in W. Virginia.

A marriage in Charleston, West Virginia on July 26, 1911 was the result of a courtship, sometime at long distance, between a Portales girl and a West Virginia boy. The young lady is Miss Buda Harrison, daughter of Mrs. W. C. Harrison; the gentleman, Mr. C. E. Compher. Mr. Compher was unable to leave his home to come here at the appointed time, so sent for Miss Harrison. The intimate friends of the lady knew of the object of her trip and gave her a number of useful presents, and the word comes back that these were added to by West Virginia friends. Friends of the bride and groom here wish for them the untroubled matrimonial sea.

W. H. Beck of west of town was in Portales Wednesday with another load of fruit and it sure did "Look good to Benny." He had peaches that were plum good ones and plums that were peaches. He brought in two branches from his plum trees that the fruit had broken off and, actually, the fruit was so thick on the bough that you could not tell where one plum ended and where another began.

Mrs. John Doby of Cleburne, Texas, Monday, purchased the business property occupied by M. R. Russell from A. B. Austin and it is understood that Mr. Russell has renewed his lease for another year.

### Joyce-Pruitt Make Changes.

After about a week of busy work in Portales, going over every detail of the management possible, Frank Joyce left on Friday afternoon's southbound train for his home in Carlsbad. One of the results of his visit to here was the making of certain changes in the force and management and the planning of a future business program of the "big store" of Portales.

J. Porter Deen succeeds A. T. Monroe as manager. Jeff Hightower retains his place as manager of the hardware department. N. Connally continues as manager of the dry goods department, while J. M. Twigg will go to Koswell or else accept one of the several splendid positions he is offered in Wichita, Kansas, and other places. Geo. Beatty will remain as assistant in the wholesale department while Geo. Deen will still manage the retail grocery department, being assisted by the new man in Portales, S. B. Dykes from Crandall, Texas, who is a personal friend and old business associate of Porter Deen. Mr. Dykes will move his family here shortly.

L. M. Doerr, formerly of St. Louis, and later of Roswell, who became book-keeper some weeks since, will also retain his present position. Miss Georgia Stewart remains with the dry goods department, while Earle Williams will take a month's rest, beginning with August, and then enter some good college or university in September. ## FOUR HUNDRED ACRES OF FINE LAND CHANGE HANDS

McSpadden and Mullins, of Amarillo, Texas, Invest in Portales Valley Irrigated Lands.

The New Owners Will at Once Begin the Development of Their Holdings in a Large Way.

Last week, Mr. Coe Howard sold four hundred acres of Portales Valley lands to Mr. W. A. McSpadden, of Amarillo, Texas, and is negotiating a trade of some town property with Mr. Bob Mullins, who also lives at Amarillo, and who accompanied Mr. McSpadden on his trip to Portales. There was nothing hasty or precipitous about the deal. Messrs. McSpadden and Mullins came to Portales on Monday and stayed here until Friday. They looked the whole country over, satisfied themselves on every phase of the proposition, and then purchased some of the best land in the Valley. The purchase included three parcels of land, as follows: The southeast 160 acres of section 19, belonging to Dr. J. N. Bolard; the southeast 160 acres of section 27, known as the Klein place and owned by Mr. E. G. Bryant; and 80 acres belonging to Mr. J. A. Fairly, situated four and one half miles south of town, this last named tract being under the irrigation project, but unimproved for the most part.

Mr. McSpadden and Mr. Mike Lee Masters, who is interested with Mr. McSpadden, will start the work of developing the Bolard 160 acres immediately, also will improve the 80 acres of the Fairly place. They will sink a well and equip same with the best private pumping plant obtainable, and, in the meantime, they will prepare the ground for 30 acres of alfalfa to be sown at once, and launch the full program of improving and developing their holdings.

These men were not only convinced to the point of purchasing and developing Portales Valley lands, but they now propose to boost the country. Mr. McSpadden carried away apples, peaches, plums, onions, alfalfa, sugar beets, etc., with which he proposes to "show the natives" in Amarillo. Of course Portales Valley is just beginning in fruit and alfalfa raising, but we join Mr. McSpadden in challenging the Amarilloites to show samples of more luscious fruits, a better start toward magnificent alfalfa fields, or a more wonderful truck or general farming section anywhere in the Southwest, where development has been begun so recently.

The only mystery about this whole Portales Valley proposition is that literally hundreds of thousands of other such men as Mr. McSpadden, etc., have not already come to know what the Portales Valley is and the supreme offer it now presents in the early stages of its development. In an area comprising over 100,000 acres of the best land, with an inexhaustible supply of the best water at 20 feet beneath the earth's surface, where the owners of much of the land are too poor to develop it and are actually offering it at

most at dry-land prices, why may not hundreds and thousands of men, even those with only modest sums to invest, come and see the Portales Valley for themselves? We have never seen a visitor come to Portales for the first time who had the faintest conception of this marvelous underground water supply, the richness of the soil and the wonderful wealth and the variety of crops which can be grown here and, withal, the exceedingly modest prices at which one can now purchase an irrigated farm and join in the development of one of the greatest sections of the Southwest.

### Normal Institute Opens.

The Roosevelt county teachers' institute opened Monday morning with an enrollment of forty-five teachers. A hearty welcome was extended to the visiting teachers by Mrs. Culberson in her opening address, which was followed by brief words of welcome by each of the instructors and by remarks from Supt. Tipton of Tularosa, N. M., also Rev. Taggart and Dr. Fuller of this place. The work was then turned over to the conductor of the institute, Supt. R. A. Deen.

By an almost unanimous vote it was decided that only morning sessions be held. This is made possible by beginning the work at seven o'clock and continuing until twelve.

Our teachers this year have higher standards than ever before, which is shown by the fact that not a teacher who has enrolled so far is taking work for a third grade certificate.
