There was another sugar beet neeting at the the court house ast Saturday and it was well ateduded too, showing that, at east, some of our farmers are aking an interest in this under taking; that some of them are far sighted enough to fully appreciate the boundless possibil ities presented to our people from an enterprise of this magnitude; that some few of the more enterprising farmers of the Portales Valley have awakened to the fact that our natural resources are, practically worthless unless put to some good and profitable use. It is a waste of time and energy to sing the praise of our inexhaustible supply of water, our fertile soil and our never ending sunshine unless we can show by actual results that we,ve made a two-time talk and that we have some substantial results to show for all our wind-jamming.


