New Orleans, La., March 27.-With the river practically stationary during the day, there has been little change in the flood conditions. The early morning reading of the gauge was 20.2, a rise of one-tenth in twenty-four hours. From morning to night the height of the river fluctuated, reaching 20.3 as the maximum. The phenomenal speed at which the current is flowing and favorable winds have doubtless restrained the upward tendency. 


