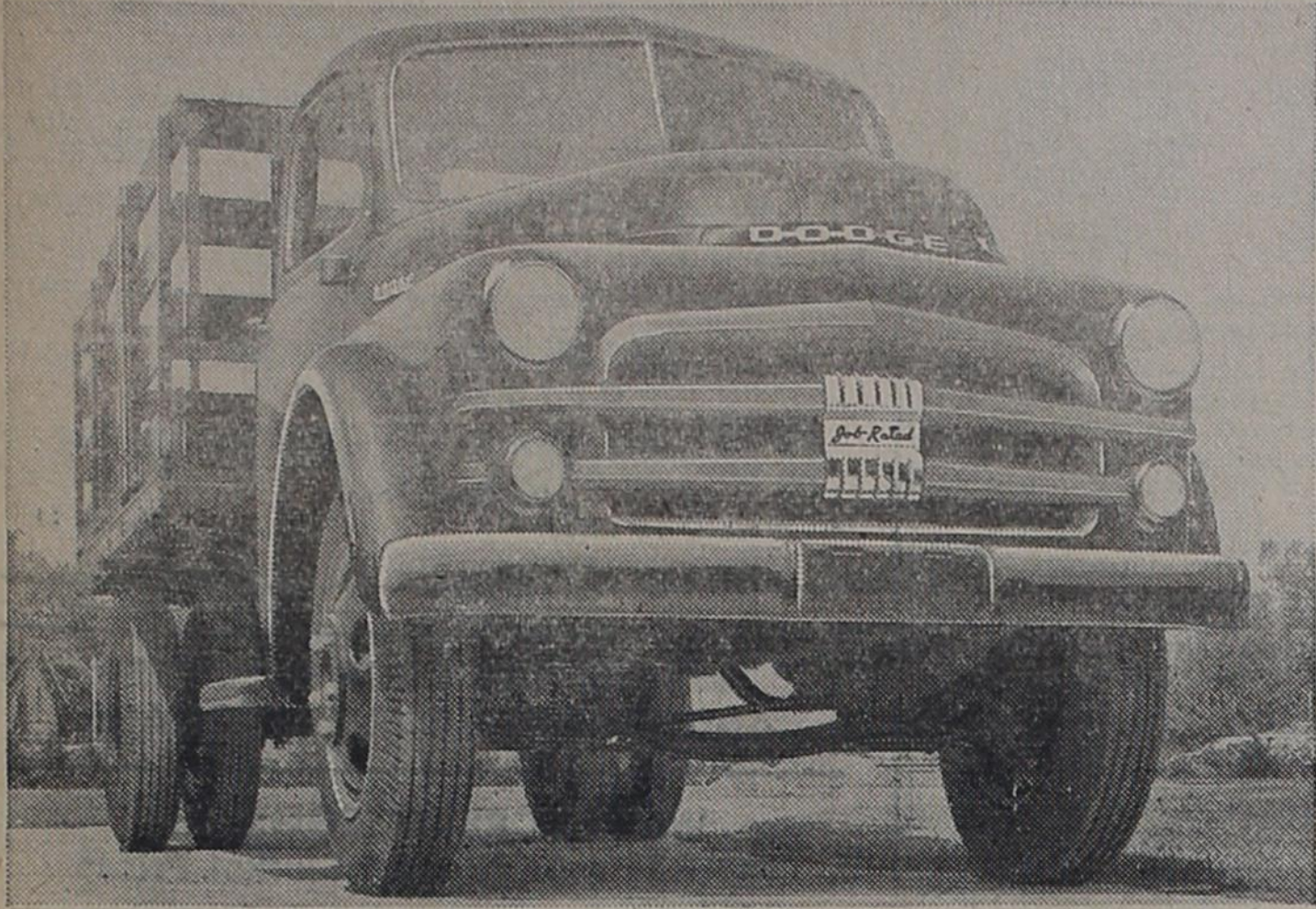

## New Dodge Trucks Have 50 New Features



More than 50 new features have been built into the new B-3 Series of Dodge "Job-Rated" trucks to provide faster, safer and more economical hauling of larger payloads. Power increases up to 20 per cent, entirely new styling, better brakes, improved steering, newly designed shock absorbers and more driver comfort are among the major improvements in the new line which ranges from 4,250 to 40,000 pounds gross vehicle weight. Nominal ratings range from one-half ton to four tons.

Franklin Latimer, local Dodge dealer, today revealed some of the 50 new features of the new B-3 Series of Dodge "Job Rated" trucks which will be introduced on Saturday, February 10.

Increased power, new styling, better brakes, improved steering for easier handling, more driver comfort, and newly designed shock absorbers are among the new features providing faster, safer and more economical hauling of larger payloads.

Horsepower increases in some of the eight engines powering the new Dodge truck line range as high as 20 per cent. Gross vehicle weight rating in the new trucks range from 4,250 to 40,000 pounds, and gross combination weight ratings range up to 60,000 pounds.

Higher governor settings, redesigned fuel pumps, "hotter" spark plugs with improved moisture-proofing, larger-capacity generators, a new high-torque starting motor, and more efficient cooling systems are among engine improvements which provide the new line with greater power and economy.

A major engineering development for easier riding and better

handling are the new Oriflow shock absorbers introduced on the 1/2-, 3/4- and 1-ton models. Featuring an entirely new design and valving system, they provide better ride control on all road surfaces.

Brakes have been improved on all models. All brake cylinders now are anodized for positive protection against destructive rust and corrosion. A new Cyclebond molded tapered lining was developed to give the brakes smoother, more positive action, and to reduce the tendency to grab or squeal. The new lining is now used on all model not equipped with air brakes from the 1 1/2 ton up.

Loading heights are even lower than before on all models from the 1/2 ton through the 2 ton. This was accomplished by redesigning the rear spring.

New styling on all models features a new grille formed by two large horizontal louvers. A new "Job Rated" medallion is centered in the grille beneath the redesigned Dodge nameplate. Wrap around bumpers give the fenders more protection.

Thicker seat pad cushions and

re-contoured seat backs provide greater comfort for the driver. Instruments are arranged in a cluster on the dash. Driver visibility has been increased by lowering the front of the hood line. The windshield wipers have been repositioned to cover a more usable area and to lay closer to the base of the windshield when not in use.

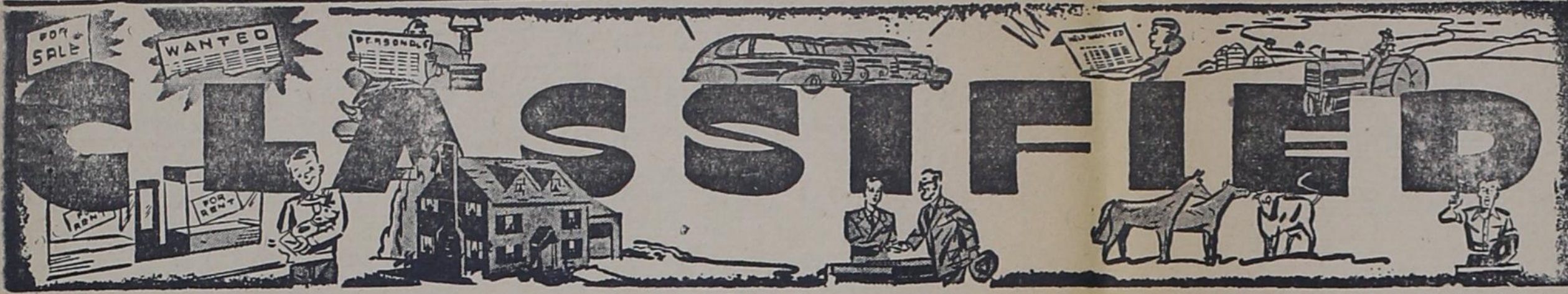

# Weekly News Letter

From Washington by Congressman Rogers

## MOBILIZATION

The big freeze to prevent runaway inflation is on. Our American economy is the richest productive mechanism the world has ever known? Now, the government has placed this great economic machine under controls which will eventually reach down to its smallest cogs. The Mobilizers were given the order, "Get going! Clean up the details later". Basic reason for haste is the need to stabilize economy while mobilizing for defense.

Following the outbreak in Korea, the cost of living reached an all-time high and continued to rise sharply. These price increases added billions to the cost of the defense program and more billions to the cost of living of the general public. Holding prices on a broad front is being applied to stop the high trend toward continuous inflation. And, in the future, price-cost structures in various industries will be examined to determine where changes in the present set-up are appropriate. If we are to have successful stabilization, production and distribution controls must be effectively interwoven with price control. The proper medicine is being injected to stop the rise of the inflationary fever and bring it back to normal without permanent injury to our economy.

## SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE

The President invited the Texas Delegation to the White House to pay homage to our Speaker, Mr. Rayburn, who has now served in that capacity longer than any man in history. He has hurdled Henry Clay's time of service. After the President's congratulations, Speaker Rayburn thanked him, then spoke deeply of the "happiness this occasion would give his family back in Texas." There has never been a greater Speaker of the House and all fellow-Texans join his family in praise of this outstanding man who has worked so earnestly and served the Nation so loyally.

## LETTERS

Congressman Rogers says in a letter to a constituent: "We cannot discount in the least the avowed intentions of the Soviet Union to control the world. We stand today as the leaders of the free peoples of the world and if we could be taken out of the path of Russia, world domination by Russia would be realized very shortly. I hope, and I'm sure other members of this Congress hope that further fighting and worldwide conflict can be avoided by this nation flexing its muscles for the world to view. This, we intend to do as Russia no doubt now realizes, and I feel that the might we will exhibit will forestall further bloodshed and that the service of the young men in this country will be confined to their preparedness and will not extend to actual combat."

Another letter quotes: "I can assure you that there is a great deal of work going on here toward solving the international problems—more than most people

know. I do wish that everyone could see the actual work that is being done and I think they would appreciate and be able to discount much of the talk and rumors that seem to be going around. The program outlined is sound and will undoubtedly have its effect on stopping Russia. I hope this can be done without a Third World War and feel fairly sure it will be."

## RAIN

Folks who have long joked about asking Washington to do something about the weather may no longer find it a joke if a recent bill introduced in Congress becomes law, and the Federal Government is asked to take a hand in the rainmaking business. This bill states there is no longer any doubt that cloud nucleation can be used to increase precipitation, and unless regulated and carefully planned, these artificial rainmakers might make storms and rain where not intended and cause damage. Well, maybe some day we'll be able to control those big dust clouds that sometimes ride in over the Panhandle and turn them into much needed rain when a drought threatens.

## GENERAL EISENHOWER

General Eisenhower, in his report at a joint meeting of Congress and the public held in the auditorium of the Library of Congress, gave factual information that is so necessary for a proper evaluation by the Congress. One impressive point was his reference to his first hand views of the low, low incomes and standards of living of the average citizen of Western Europe. We in this country still have so much to be thankful for. We do a lot of healthy talking and a lot of griping but when the chips are down no one can doubt the sincerity of purpose and the sound dependability of Mr. and Mrs. Average Citizen in our country.

## UNITY

Every inch gained in unity of purpose at home is equal to a gain of miles for our boys at the battle front.

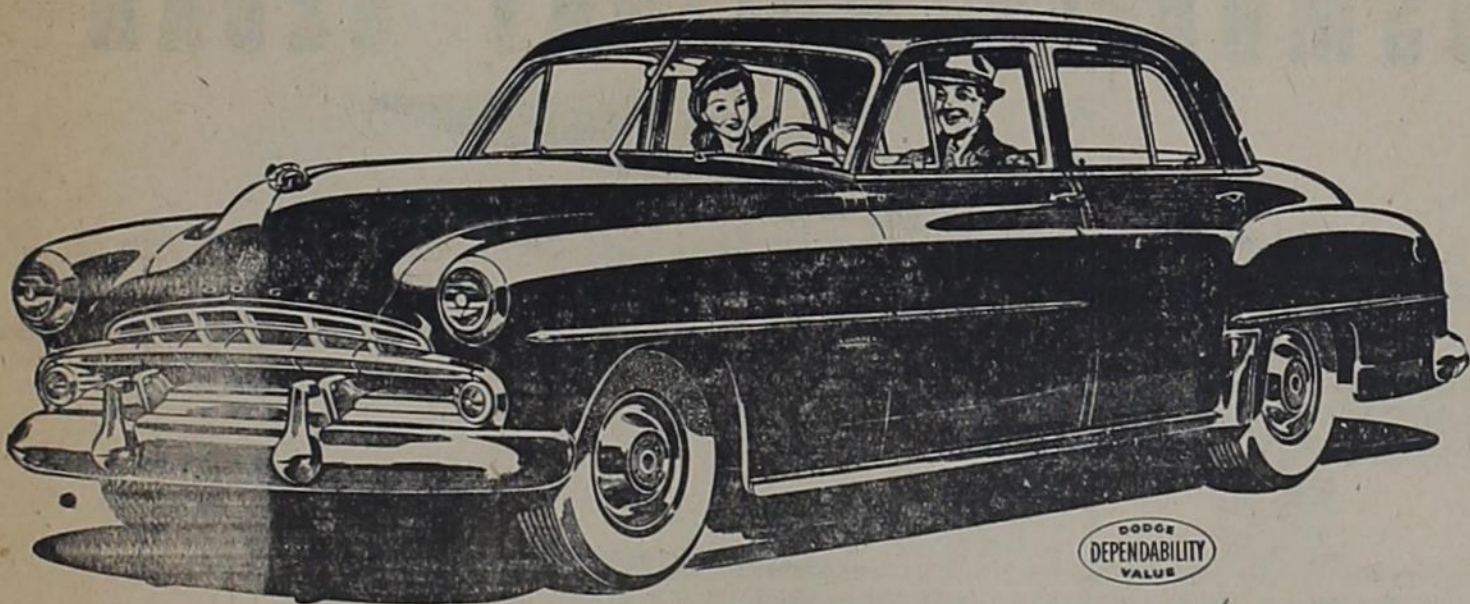

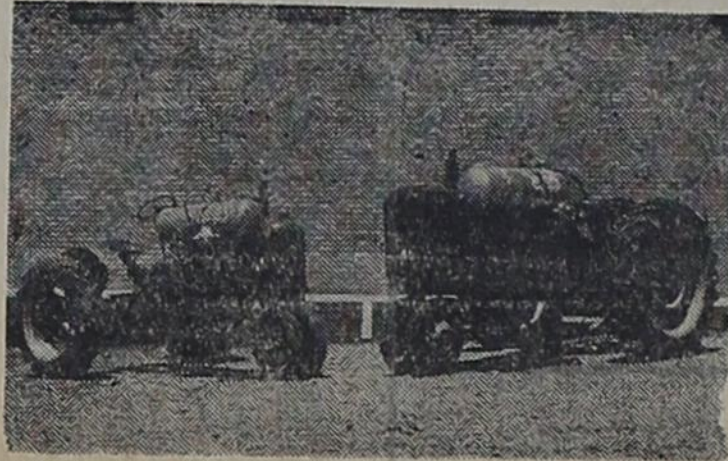

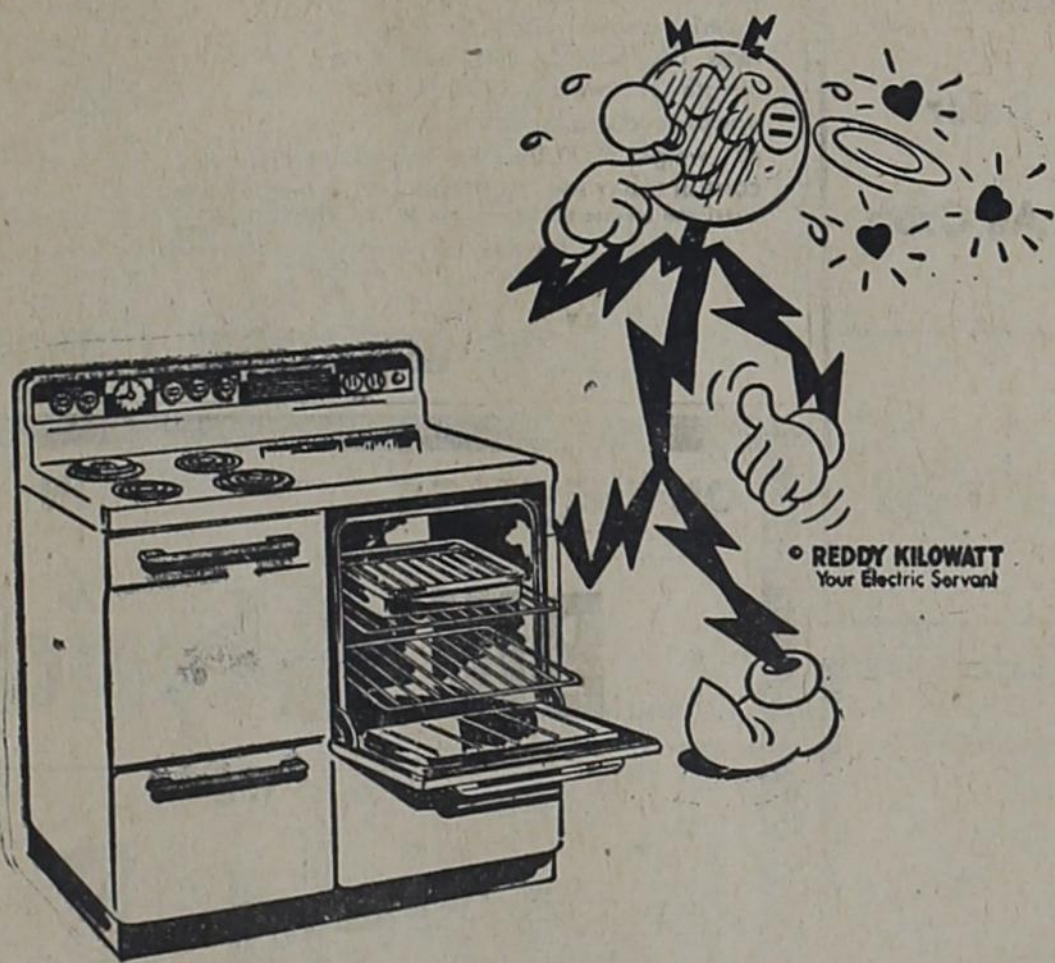
