Scientific farming is a vocation and requires a lifetime of study and application for it to be developed in a given area. This writer, not knowing anything about farming other than what he by chopping weeds and riding a wiggletail cultivator in Central Texas as a boy, believes that with the information that is to be had from other areas where intensified farming is practiced coupled with the advice from our local farming specialists, this area can show greater development in the next few years than any other in the State or Nation. Many sections of our country, we didn't know about or disregarded the various types of better farming practices, and consequently depleted their natural soil fertility and had to travel the long road back in rebuilding the land. Castro County is practically virgin soil and by holding the land at a high production level the costly task of rebuilding will be avoided. The Chamber of Commerce, the county agricultural experts, and civic organizations cooperating and working with the farmers organizations of the county should, within a few short years, bring about the maximum production of this fertile and ideally situated diversified farming area.

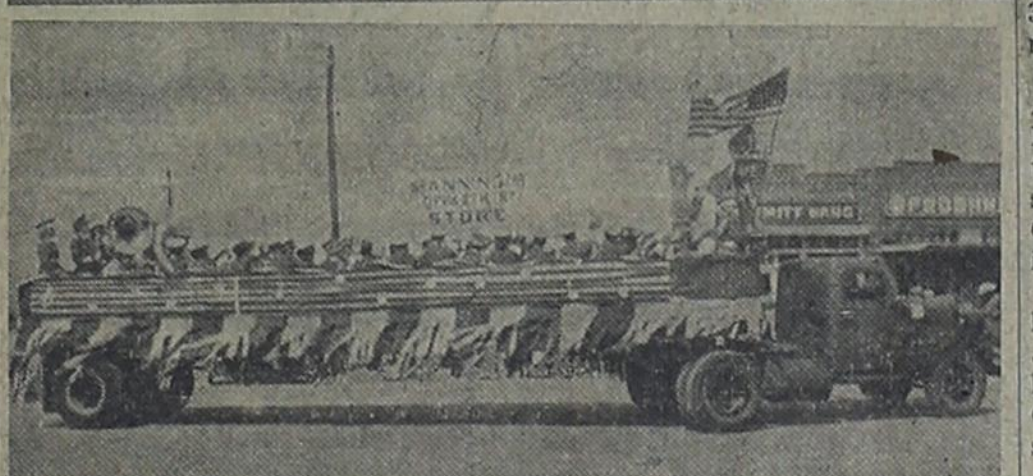
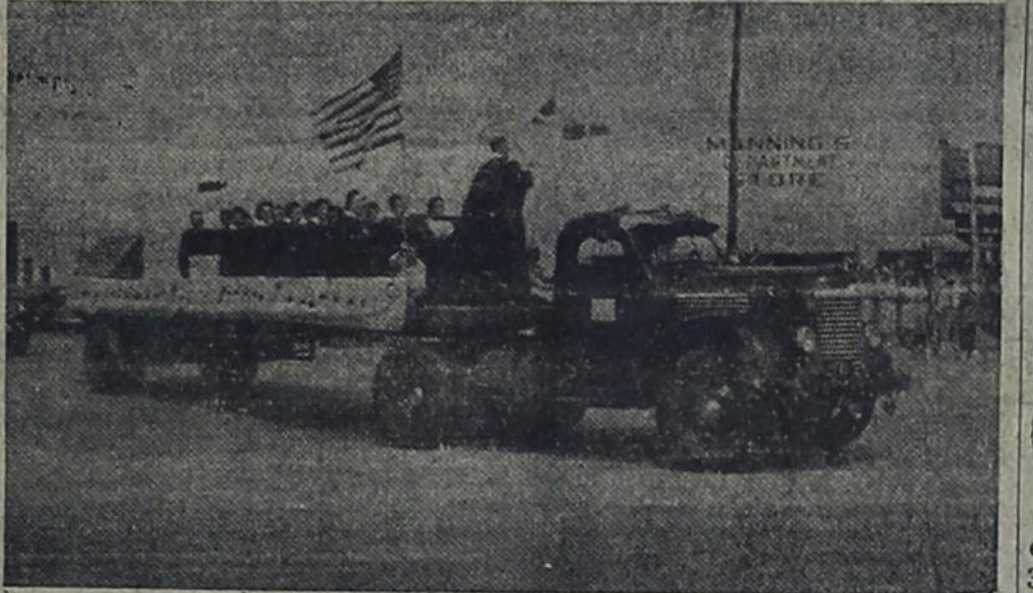

Polio Patient Is Slightly Improved

Alvin Hastings, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hastings, is slightly improved according to a report by his father this morning. It was necessary that Hastings be placed in an iron lung the second day he was at the center. According to attending physicians Alvin has suffered five percent paralysis in one arm and twenty percent in the other. His throat is also paralyzed causing the necessity of using the iron lung.

According to a telegram received here Wednesday by Mr. Orbie Armstrong his brother-in-law, Sgt. Raymond R. Randolph, has been missing in action in Korea since September 4. Sgt. Randolph was returned to active duty in Korea on August 8 after recovering from wounds received in the Korean War. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Randolph, live at Earth. So far as is known here Sgt. Randolph is the first Castro County man to be a casualty in the Korean campaign.



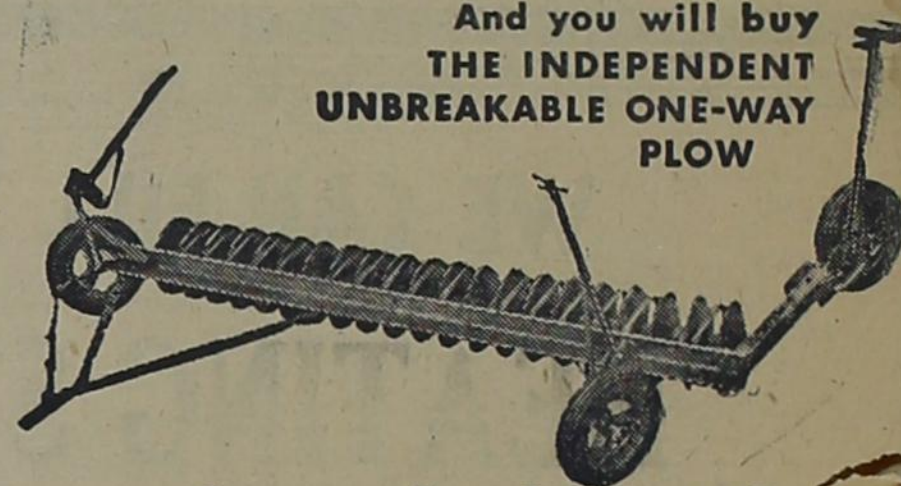

Texas Has Latest Equipment for Testing A-Bomb Radiation

At least four different types of radioactive detection instruments and computers are available for measuring radiation particles if and when an atomic bomb is ever exploded over a Texas community.

This encouraging bit of information was revealed by the state's chief health official, Dr. Ge. W. Cox. He's state director of health and emergency medical services, part of the Texas civil defense setup.

Radiation is one of three principle harmful effects of atomic explosions. Others are blast damage and burns. Using RADIAC instruments, it is possible to know what areas are safe from the tasteless, odorless, colorless radioactive particles.

All RADIAC instruments are designed for use by radiation monitoring squads. Squad members might be soldiers, or they could be civilians trained by the State Health Department's radiological division. In either case they would be trained for immediate action in atomic disasters.

"Planning emergency medical and health services in an atomic disaster has been one big mess of confusion," Dr. Cox admitted. "But we're beginning to see light now. Our radiology division is going to go right to work, now that we have it set up."

Radiac instruments got this official explanation:

Film badges can be pinned onto the lapel, strapped onto the wrist, worn in a ring, etc. They consist of a piece of photographic film, and are used to show the amount of radiation to which the monitor has been exposed. Radiation particles affect the film like light. Dozens of "tracks" are visible when the film comes in contact with heavy concentrations of radiation.

Film badges are a permanent record of the exposure to which the monitors have been subjected. Dr. Cox says they show whether or not the wearer has received the "maximum allowable life-time dosage."

Pocket dosimeters, like the film badges are for protection of the monitors. They look like fountain pens, and gauge on-the-spot amounts of radiation.

Geiger counters and ionization chambers actually count the number of radiation particles—gamma rays, and alpha and beta particles present in an area. So sensitive is the Geiger counter that if it could be wired to a fly his footsteps could be heard distinctly.

Sports Afield

by Ted Kesting

Did you realize that almost every wild hickory, walnut, butternut, pignut and king nut in this country was planted by a squirrel? Some scientists believe it was squirrels which speeded up the reforestation of

all the parts of North America swept bare of life by the great ice sheets of the glacial age. And of all the squirrels, the gray is the most efficient tree planter. Donald Culross Peattie, one of our most famous naturalists,

thinks that if the gray had studied at the Yale School of Forestry he couldn't do better by the woods.

The life of a gray squirrel usually begins at the end of winter when mating is at its height. Four or five young are born about 44 days after breeding. The babies don't open their eyes for 36 days, and are utterly helpless for eight or nine weeks. They are naked, their legs ridiculously short, their ears seemingly non-existent, and the tails give little promise of future beauty.

All this time they see nothing of their father. In the first place there is nothing he could do to be useful. In the second place the male is by this time pursuing another mate. This is not resented by the first; his promiscuous behavior merely puts more little squirrels in the world, and who objects to that?

When a gray squirrel is big enough to walk and balance himself, his mother puts him away from her and he has to go and look for his own breakfast. Then the fun begins. And nature has fitted him superbly to enjoy it. He has big bright eyes, and a nose that can smell anything good to eat. His forepaws are almost as mobile and cleverly manipulated for handling things as a raccoon's; his hind legs are coiled springs for jumping. And finally nature has pinned on him that preposterous yet elegant tail.

Once in a squirrel's lifetime an impulse stronger than love may overpower him—a wild desire to leave home. Every gray squirrel within a hundred miles travels with him. Studies in Ohio and Wisconsin have shown that these flights from nothing to nowhere reoccur in cycles of five years when the population has reached a peak of about 10.8 squirrels per acre. Back in the region they have left, a hunter will need an average of 11 1/2 hours to bag one squirrel! But nature swiftly fill the void. Soon again in early spring every hollow tree has a nursery of little suckling grays, preparing to start on their madcap existences.

THE LAW AND YOU

DO YOU KNOW what "extradition" is?

Extradition is the legal process whereby one who is charged with an offense under the laws of one state, may be brought from another state where he has gone, back in to the state where he is charged with the offense.

The officers of one state who have a warrant for a man's arrest may not go into another state and arrest a man on this warrant and return him to the state issuing the warrant. The officers of the state where the defendant is at the time may arrest on the out of state warrant. The defendant may then agree to return for trial. If he does so, he signs a waiver of extradition and the officers of the arresting area take custody of him and return him for trial. If the defendant will not agree to return with the officers for trial, extradition then becomes necessary.

The local officers prepare certain instruments and send them to the Governor of their state. Upon being received by the Governor, and being approved by him, they are forwarded to the State where the Defendant is being held. These papers request this Governor to authorize the return of the defendant for trial. It is within the discretion of the Governor, receiving this request whether or not to grant this permission. If permission is granted,

which it nearly always is, the Governor signs the papers, and the defendant is given into the custody of the officers of the requesting state for return for trial. FOR FURTHER INFORMATION ON THIS SUBJECT SEE YOUR LOCAL ATTORNEY.
