Admiral Toga reports that on Thur day last, June 23, his patrol boat discoverel the battleship Peresviet and seves other vessels, accompanied by sine torpedo boat destroyers near the entrance of Port Arthur harbor. They warned him wirelessly and he immediately advanced with his entire fleet, except those engaged upon special duty. The Admiral then discovered the Russian fleet, which consisted of six battleships, five cruisers and fourteen destroyers, evidently planning a dash southward by sundown. The Russians stopped outside the entrance to the harbor and after nightfall a fleet of Japanese torpedo boat destroyers resolutely attacked the Russian ships and succeeded in torpedoing and sinking a battleship of the Perseviet type and disabling the battleship Se-
