A Chinese official who arrived from Mukden Sunday says that the Russian roops are leaving for the north; that there are 18,000 men ten miles east of the city; that the officers and men have become dispirited, and that much sickness prevalls.

Corn Planting in Argentina.

As previously stated, most of the corn is planted with a machine attached to the plow, and the rows are generally about 20 inches apart-simply drilled in, resembling very much a field of fodder corn in this country. A few of the farmers are learning better, and perhaps 100 American corn planters have been sold in Argentina.
