

Says Democrats Are Lacking in Settled Convictions.

The action of the attorney-general in enforcing the anti-trust and interstate commerce laws, and the action of the last congress in enlarging the scope of

and labor, with a bureau of corporations, have, for the first time opened a chance for the national government to deal intelligently and adequately with the questions affecting society, whether for good or for evil, because of the accumulation of capital in great corporations, and because of the new relations caused thereby. The laws are now being administered with entire efficiency; and as, in their working, need is shown for amendment or addition to them—whether better to

or addition to them—whether better to guarantee the proper publicity, or better to guarantee the rights of shippers, or in any other direction—this need will be met. It is now asserted "that the com-mon law, as developed, affords a com-

plete legal remedy against monopolies."
But there is no common law of the United States. Its rules can be enforced only by the state courts and officers. No federal court or officer could take any

states to control trusts and monopolies, which led to the passage of the federal statutes known as the Sherman anti-

trust act and the interstate commerc act; and it is only through the exercis

of the powers conferred by these acts, and by the statutes of the last congress

supplementing them, that the national government acquires any jurisdiction over the subject. To say that action against trusts and monopolies should be

against trusts and monopolies should be limited to the application of the common law is equivalent to saying that the national government should take no action whatever to regulate them.

Undoubtedly, the multiplication of trusts and their increase in power has been largely due to the "failure of officials charged with the duty of enforcing the law to take the necessary procedure." Such stricture upon the failure of the officials of the national government to do their duty in this matter is certainly not wholly undeserved as far as the administration preceding President McKinley's is concerned; but it has no application at all to Republican administration. It is also undoubtedly true that what is most needed is "officials having both the disposition and the courage to enforce existing law." This is

Wire Fences and Lightning.

Since the use of wire fences has become se extensive the number of cattle killed each year by lightning has greatly increased. Farmers' insurance companies have investigated the matter and now come forward with a warning to policy holders. Nearly all of the cattle killed by lightning have met their death in open fields, where in many instances, there was not even a tree to attract the electric fluid. As many dead cattle were found near wire fences this led to the discovery that the lightning was carried along the wires composing the fences. During a severe storm cattle are liable to run until stopped by a fence. Here they stand huddled together ready for the bolt. A remedy is suggested in running a ground wire every ten rods several feet into the earth.

Broken Benes Bolted. Dr. Stephen Watts, assistant resident surgeon at the Johns Hopkins hospital. Baltimore, has devised a method of joining broken bones that is attracting wide interest among surgeons. His device consists of a silver bolt and nut and is simplicity itself. carpenter mortises the ends of two pieces of wood he desires to join. Then a small hole is drilled through the joint thus made and a silver bolt is inserted. When the nut is screwed down the foint is immovable and the natural knitting of the bone may proceed without the interruption usually caused by change in position and lack
