STATUS OF WAR.

Japs Slowly Advancing on the Russians.

Except for important reconnoissances by Gens. Rennenkampf and Samsenoff, there appears to have been but little interruption of the quiet that has ensued since the hard fighting around Liao Yang more than a fortnight ago.

The indication of mortality among the Russian officers is shown by the report from St. Petersburg that about one-seventh of the officers of the guards stationed at the capital are to be drafted for service with regiments at the scene of the war.

The Japanese are reported to be advancing slowly upon the positions held by the Russians in a line extending about twenty-seven miles.

There have been no developments at Port Arthur beyond a reported futile sortle by the garrison against a height which recently fell into the hands of the Japanese.

Measure English Sunshine. Sunshine is so rare in England that the government takes great care to measure it. The official summing up for 1903 as regards sunshine shows that all districts in the British Isles. with one exception, fell short of the average. The exception was England northwest, including Manchester, that curiously had an excess of fifty-seven sunny hours. In Scotland north, west and east the deficit was eighty-one hours, forty-eight hours and 133 hours. England northeast and east were short by 107 hours and 139 hours, while in England south and southwest the deficit was sixty-eight hours and 115 hours. The islands were behind by ninety-eight hours. In freland north and south the shortage was eighty-one hours and 113 hours. Commonly the islands in the English channel have a large share of sunshine, but last year they were 135 sunny hours short.

The torpedo-boat destroyer Spiteful has been passed into the Portsmouth fleet reserve, after satisfactorily, undergoing her power trials. 
