District Court Opens

Judge Pope Presents Handsome Autograph Photograph of Theodore Roosevelt.

The new Court house of Roosevelt county was opened this week on Monday for the first term of District Court. The most important business to be transacted on opening day was the constitution of the Grand Jury with S. F. Wooding as Foreman. Judge Pope, in his charge to the jury, enumerated many matters of importance into which the Jury must carefully investigate, and reminded the Jurors that they had a peculiar responsibility, inasmuch as the work done at this our first session of Court would set a standard for future administration of justice. It is generally agreed that the present grand jury is a fair-minded and able body of men in whom the citizenship of the county may well confide.

At four o'clock on Monday afternoon the court suspended regular proceedings and an interesting presentation ceremony took place, the grand jury, and many citizens, including a number of ladies, being present in open court.

The Court—Mr. Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, and Citizens of the County of Roosevelt.

Some months ago while at Santa Fe I received a letter from one of your citizens, informing me of the approaching completion of your new court house. It then occurred to me that it would be entirely appropriate to secure, if possible, a token from the President for presentation to the county, which bears his name, upon this first day of the occupancy of this building for judicial purposes. Accordingly the following letter was addressed to the Secretary to the President, which I will read in your hearing.

The letter as read was in substance a request that upon the occasion of the dedication of this new Court House there might be placed in the court room a photograph of the President endorsed with his autograph.

Promptly the following reply was received:

White House, Washington, June 21, 1904.

My Dear Sir:
In response to your letter of the 14th instant I have pleasure in sending you, with the President's compliments, the accompanying photograph upon which he has placed an autograph inscription.

To Hon. Wm. H. Pope, Associate Justice Supreme Court of New Mexico, Santa Fe, N. M.

Thus showing, as you have already noticed, that instead of complying with my request to have indicated what photographer would furnish the best photograph, the President, promptly, through his private secretary, forwarded such photograph, suitably endorsed with his signature.

After the rehearsal of a letter of thanks to the President, the Court went on to say:

I have had the photograph in question suitably framed, and it now gives me great pleasure to deliver it to you, Mr. Chairman, as the representative of the governing board of the County of Roosevelt.

I trust that this photograph now committed to your care, will, as it hangs in your court room during the years to come, prove an incentive to the emulation of those qualities which irrespective of creed, and irrespective of politics, we recognize and honor in Theodore Roosevelt. As your county grows in population and prosperity, may its patriotism keep pace with its progress. May "the higher life" be the goal toward which your citizenship shall strive. May this building, this day dedicated to the purposes of your courts, ever be the scene where even-handed justice—nothing more and nothing less—shall be administered. And in future years, when your children and your children's children shall re-visit this room, and look back upon all that has been here performed, may they be able to say that we who have preceded them have builded well, and may they add, reverentially

that they, with God's help, will bravely and earnestly carry forward the work.

Mr. Clerk, as representing the court, you will hand to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, the photograph which has been sent for this purpose.

Thereupon the photograph was by the Clerk handed to the Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Roosevelt, Mr. W. W. Oldham.

On behalf of the County Commissioners the Probate Clerk made a fitting response thanking His Excellency the President and the Honorable Judge of the court for the presentation.

The Court—Court will be in recess for a short while, for the purpose of permitting an examination of the photograph by those of the audience who may desire to do so.

Roosevelt County's first Grand Jury was comprised of the following: S. F. Wooding, chairman, Wm. Kilpatrick, clerk, L. P. Glascock, W. W. Humble, W. K. Breeding, Liddon Cowden, Mat Roberson, C. W. Miller, J. B. Crawford, M. A. McClister, H. J. Farnham, J. S. Washam, Wm. Beck, C. D. Steele, J. R. Hull, T. C. Hunt, C. Woodcock.

The Brookshire cases came from Texas while that of B. F. Newam is one from this place. The case of Montgomery is the result of a fight between two school boys.

Several civil cases were taken up but no decision has as yet been handed down in any of them.

There is now on trial the case of the Territory against Jake Netherland, charged with stealing horses. This is a case wherein a change of venue was taken from Chaves county.

The Territory is represented by District Attorney J. M. Hervey and Mr. Bernay, of Fort Worth, who is the general attorney for the Texas cattlemen's association. The defense is being conducted by Judge Freeman, and Attorney Cameron, of Carlsbad Attorney Rowd, of Roswell and J. S. Fitzhugh, of Portales.

Defendant, was found guilty of receiving stolen goods, the second charge in the indictment.
