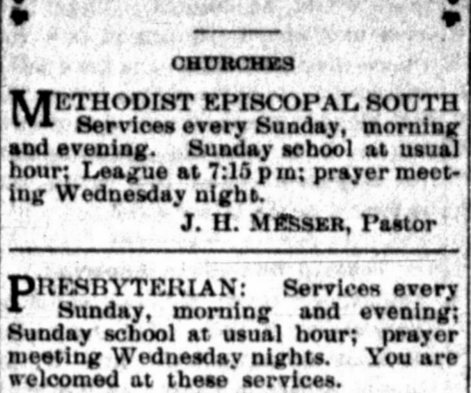

Trees For Wireless System.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 2.—Major George O. Squier, signal corps United States Army, has by a series of experiments, reached an original conclusion to the effect that living vegetable organisms may be used as part of a circuit for electrical oscillation or hertzian waves, which in turn suggests the possibility of using living trees as substitutes for masts and towers in the operation of a wireless telegraph. To use a tree instead of a mast, balloon or kite for wireless telegraphy it is only necessary, according to Major Squier, to drive two ordinary iron nails into the tree, one near its base and the other where the main branches of the tree divert from the trunk and to connect the receiving apparatus between the two nails. With this simple arrangement the messages from the distant wireless station are read by means of a telephone.—Ex.

The Poultry Industry in New Mexico.

The value of the poultry products in many states is enormous. In several states the value of these products exceed in value the products of any other industry. The conditions in New Mexico are exceptionally favorable for the production of poultry and eggs, and yet New Mexico does not at the present time, supply the needs of her own markets. Large quantities of both eggs and poultry are imported annually. Through this medium, a large sum of money finds its way into the pockets of the Kansas and Nebraska farmers. This money should be claimed by the New Mexico ranchmen. And why not? To the cost of producing the imported products must be added the cost of such items as storage, refrigerator cars, and high transportation charges through a mountainous country. Whenever the local supply is insufficient to meet the demands, the market price is always fixed by the price of the imported article. At ruling prices, the New Mexico ranchman can produce these products, and he can produce them at a good profit. In fact, there is probably no industry that can be made to pay larger dividends upon the invested capital than this one; but, it is a business, like many others, in which the greatest success follows the most careful study and the strictest attention to details. Every ranchman, whether large or small, who interests himself in these matters, will not only be made to render a service to the consuming public by supplying products that can be used while still fresh, but will also be able to increase the revenue from his ranch with a comparatively small outlay in time and money.

Two or three articles, dealing briefly with some features of the poultry industry in New Mexico, such as "Classes and Breeds," "Improvement of the Scrub Hen," "Housing Requisites," "Feeds and Feeding," and "Diseases and Insect Pests," will follow this one. By this means, it is hoped to arouse interest in this much neglected industry.
