WHO SHE WAS

SKETCH OF THE LIFE OF LYDIA E. PINKHAM

And a True Story of How the Vegetable Compound Had Its Birth and How the "Panic of '73" Caused it to be Offered for Public Sale in Drug Stores.

This remarkable woman, whose maiden name was Estlin, was born in Lynn, Mass., February 9th, 1819, coming from a good old Quaker family. For some years she taught school, and became known as a woman of an alert

and investigating mind, an earnest seeker after knowledge, and above all possessed of a wonderfully sympathetic nature.

In 1843 she married Isaac Pinkham, a builder and real estate operator, and their early married life was marked by prosperity and happiness. They had four children, three sons and a daughter.

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EVENTS OF EVERYWHERE.

Louis Longpre, who successfully passed \$25,000 in forged pay checks on Illinois Steel Company, has been captured.

It is officially announced at the offices of the Mutual Life Insurance company that Jos. H. Choate had accepted the position of attorney to the Mutual's self-investigating committee recently vacated by Jas. B. Dill.

President Roosevelt has removed from office John D. Oliphant, register; J. A. Trotter, receiver, and J. I. Chapman, clerk of the land office at Mangum, Okla., for irregularities in the conduct of the business office.

Peter Smith, 13 years old, was shot and killed by Vincent Urbanaki, a private watchman employed by a brewing company in Chicago. Urbanaki told the police he had discovered Smith and several other boys in the act of breaking into a freight car.

Pierre Hanks the young farmer who was seriously injured on the farm of John Burgin, near Crowley, La., by being thrown from a gang plow and dragged by four mules, died from his injuries. Hanks was severely cut about the throat and head by the plowshares.

Major General A. W. Greeley, until recently chief signal officer of the war department at Washington, has gone to San Francisco to assume command of the Pacific division of the army, filling the vacancy caused by the retirement of General Summer some weeks ago.

Princess Yolande, of Italy, although only 4 years old, already enters into the pleasures of her father and mother. The queen has a passion for fishing, which her little girl shares, that morning after mornning this little group of two is to be seen in the park at Racconigi side by side, line in hand, in profound silence.

The bishop of London, generally regarded as one of the wisest prelates of the Church of England, has proclaimed himself an ardent friend and patron of the drama. The bishop holds that one of the chief difficulties facing the social reformer is to keep poor people out of mischief, and he declares that he has seen thousands "dragged from the public house" by the simpler forms of the play.

Washington: The state department is in receipt of a telegram dated at Monte Christi, San Domingo, saying that on the preceding day, while the terms of surrender were being carried out between the government forces and the revolutionists, the latter acted in bad faith and there was a fight, in which two officers and six men were killed, including Gen. Ceplin. The revolutionists escaped to the bushes.

Trenton, N. J.: Sentence of death upon Mrs. Antoinette Tolla, the Bergen county murderess, for the killing of Joseph Sonta, commuted to seven and one-half years' imprisonment by the court of pardons. The vote stood six to two. Mrs. Tolla was to have been hanged at Hackensack Monday, March 12. This is the first time the court of pardons ever commuted the death sentence to other than life imprisonment.

A telegram to Washington Friday morning announces that Senator Bailey's father was so much improved that there was no occasion for the Senator to make the trip to Mississippi. Senator Bailey had already gone, however.

S. A. Tunison, once a prominent hardware man of Enid and also a popular traveling man of Oklahoma, committed suicide at Lawton at noon Thursday by taking poison. His body was found thirty minutes later.

Chilolde, the 7-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Amazi McCaulis, who reside on the Sperry ranch, southwest of Sherman, is in a precarious condition from burns and her recovery is considered doubtful.

Fred A. Burnham, president; Geo. D. Eldridge, first vice-president; and George Burnham, second vice-president of Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company, have been indicted by the grand jury in New York City.

Major Henry C. Corbin, who has just returned from China, says that the reports of disturbances coming from there are greatly exaggerated, and are not in any sense general or to be considered as indicating an uprising.

In response to a telegram from headquarters at Kansas City, members of the switchman's union on the Kansas City Southern, struck Friday morning. It is said that they are out at every point on the road.

The city tax rate of Waxahachie is \$1.00, which is two cents lower than last year.

An engine on the Pennsylvania, near Radeburgh, ran into a work train and killed three Italian laborers and severely hurt a number of others.

At a meeting of the Ohio coal operators it was decided not to concede the demand of the miners for an increase in wages. This action it is believed makes a strike of the Ohio miners very probable.

The House passed 408 private pension bills Friday.
