Prof. Campbell's Letter.

Mr. H. W. Campbell writes to The Earth as follows below. His system of soil culture is well known, but these

EDITOR OF THE EARTH:

Few people realize the marvelous farming possibilities of the great Pan Handle of Texas. Fifteen years ago 1 come into this great broad stretch of beautiful prairie by request of the Santa Fo Railway to examine the soil and ascertain its adaptability to general farming. I left Cnicago in June 1904, with many misgivings, as I had always known the Pan Handle as a strictly grazing country, the home of the cowboy and the Texas steer. On reaching here I found practically

the same idea prevalent among the older inhabitants. But a few days driving over the prairie and visiting a few scattered farmers that were trying to raise wheat, oat's, corn and fruit with general observation of the soil formation and the grasses, together with an inquiry at the local Government Weather Bureau, etc, changed my mind completely. The government records at Amarillo showed an average rainfall for twelve years of twenty-two inches. This, coupled with the deep, beavy loam soil and a clay subsoil, was positive evidence that scientific soil culture could soon transform the great plains country into land of beautiful houses surrounded with shade, fruit and ornamental trees, and fields yielding enormous crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn and vegetables.

Later arrangements placed me in charge of a model farm. Work of breaking 200 acres was commenced in April, 1905. The sod was turned 21 to 3 inches deep, then rolled flat and the surface gone over with the Acme harrow to loosen enough sofl to fill the crevices between the furrows and form a blanket over the entire surface. Ample rains came and soaked down beneath the overturned sod, which held the moisture from evaporating. In I have found the place to buy July we found our soil moist over four my goods. Everything kept feet down, and through the combined fresh and clean, your money's elements of air and water coupled with worth of anything, when you buy the heat of the midsummer, the subsoil beneath the sod had become rotted fully five inches down.

We then began lacksetting or second

plowag, going about three inches deeper. To our surprise when we turned this decomposed soil over we

found numerous angle worms, indicating the extreme fertility of the soil. Fifty acres of this ground is now ready for winter wheat. We shall sow only twenty-five pounds of Russian red wheat per acre, as our seed bed is fine, firm and moist. On boring down (September 3) we found ample moisture to a depth of five feet to make the soil into mudballs at any point.

The amount of moisture this soil holds per cubic inch, owing to its very fine texture and the manner in which it pulverizes and works down, is posi-

it is impossible for anyone to comprehend even to a small degree the yielding powers of these plains-country soils when put into propor physical conditions. Of all the different sections of unoccupied prairte land none seems to offer such marked opportuniies for the homeseeker as the Pan Handle Texas, and none are so grossly misunderstood from the fact above reknown as a grazing country only. The variety of cereals, vegetables and fruit that can be successfully grown here is lmost unlimited. Cantaloupes, melons and onions grown here cannot be excelled at any point.

Other advantages notable are universally pure water in inexhaustible quanities, varying from 40 to 300 feet in depth; much of it from 60 to 150 feet. The climate from the fact of the plain's altitude, being 2,000 to 2,500 feet is clear, dry and invigorating, with cool nights giving restful sleep. Naval surgeons have investigated the amined. disease in parts of South America and the West Indies, and their reports indicate that there can be little doubt that it is a distinct malady, and one which does not yield to the treatment given tuberculosis, leprosy and other diseases common to tropical countries. Cases of gangrosa have been treated in New York which are believed to have come from Brazil and Panama.


