Prof. Campbell's Letter.

Mr. H. W. Campbell writes to The Earth as follows below. His system of soil culture is well known, but these two experimental farms mentioned are the first to be established in Northern Texas.

EDITOR OF THE EARTH:

Few people realize the marvelous farming possibilities of the great Pan Handle of Texas. Fifteen years ago I came into this great broad stretch of beautiful prairie by request of the Santa Fe Railway to examine the soil and ascertain its adaptability to general farming. I left Chicago in June 1904, with many misgivings, as I had always known the Pan Handle as a strictly grazing country, the home of the cowboy and the Texas steer.

On reaching here I found practically the same idea prevalent among the older inhabitants. But a few days driving over the prairie and visiting a few scattered farmers that were trying to raise wheat, oats, corn and fruit with general observation of the soil formation and the grasses, together with an inquiry at the local Government Weather Bureau, etc. changed my mind completely. The government records at Amarillo showed an average rainfall for twelve years of twenty-two inches. This, coupled with the deep, heavy loam soil and a clay subsoil, was positive evidence that scientific soil culture could soon transform the great plains prairie into land of beautiful houses surrounded with shade, fruit and ornamental trees, and fields yielding enormous crops of wheat, oats, barley, corn and vegetables.

Later arrangements placed me in charge of a model farm. Work of breaking 200 acres was commenced in April, 1905. The sod was turned 2 1/2 to 3 inches deep, then rolled flat and the surface gone over with the Acme harrow to loosen enough soil to fill the crevices between the furrows and form a blanket over the entire surface. Spring rains came and soaked down beneath the overturned sod, which held the moisture from evaporating. In July we found our soil moist over four feet down, and through the combined elements of air and water coupled with the heat of the midsummer, the subsoil beneath the sod had become rotted fully five inches down.

We then began plowing and seeding

 There are several fields of oats in this vicinity which are growing rapidly and looking fine.

Cement Making in New Mexico.
 The re-building of San Francisco brings forcibly to the front the importance of the cement industry. Together with steel, cement is today the principal building material, not only for skyscrapers but also for bridges, all sorts of foundations, for dams and irrigation works. Its consumption amounts to millions of tons annually, but this is only an indication of what it will be in the future. Formerly most of the cement used in the building industries, was imported from Germany, Belgium and Great Britain, but today fully one-half is manufactured in the United States. In eastern Pennsylvania, tens of thousands of men are employed in cement making, and millions of dollars are invested in the industry. Although of recent growth the manufacture of cement has built a dozen towns in the famous Lehigh Valley and railroads, whose chief tonnage has been coal and steel now consider the transportation of cement of equal importance. Even in Colorado the cement industry is at the point of marvelous expansion and here in New Mexico a good beginning has been made by the cement works at Ancho, Lincoln county, and the projected resumption of cement making at Springer, Coconino county, while the artificial stone plants at Roswell, Portales, Alamogordo, Albuquerque and other points are branches of the same industry. New Mexico has immense beds of shale, lime and natural cement rock that, if utilized, could alone supply the demand for cement in the United States for many years and there can be no doubt that in the not distant future, the making of cement will employ as many men in New Mexico as at present are employed altogether in all the other manufacturing industries.—New Mexican.
