ted States Circuit Court Holds Up Reduced Fares.

Dallas, June 26.-By an order is sued by Judge Andrew P. McCormick the Circuit Court of the United States for the Western District of Texas, the Railroad Commission of Texas is temporarily restrained from enforcing its order to reduce passenger fares on the Houston and Texas Central Railroad from 3c a mile to 21/2c, effective July 1.

This temporary restraining order is to hold good until the application of the complainant for a temporary injunction can be heard, and the same is set down for nearing before Judge Maxey, or any other Judge of the Western District, at Austin on July 16.

The complainant further asks that all of the Commission's rates, both freight and passenger, shall be permanently enjoined upon a final hearing of the case. All other principal Texas lines will join in this petition.

Austin: Chairman Storey said that he regretted the injunction suit and the litigation to which the commission will be a party as the result of the order of a majority of the commission in adopting the two and onehalf cent rate, and to which he was opposed. He said he not only thought the reduction unjust, but that he had desired to make reductions which would result in benefit to the people. This he thought the commission should have done instead of reducing passenger fares on one road; that the




