



An Austrian inventor, Richard Szigmondy, is reported to have made a new kind of window glass whose chief pecultarity is that it prevents the passage of nine-tenths of the heat of the sun's rays.

It is well known that ordinary window glass allows nearly all of the heat derived from the sun to pass through, but, on the other hand, intercepts all heat coming from non-luminous sources, such as a stove or the heated ground. 


