The Cotton Crop.

The Outlook for 1906 is Good And An Increased Acreage is Shows for Texas and the Territories.

Dallas, July 17.—The Dallas Morning News, summarizing its second cotton report this morning says: The News' second report on the cotton crop of the State of Texas and In-

dian and Oklahoma Territories for the current season comprises individual reports of News correspondents at 542 points. The reports were written on July 12. They show that the crop in Texas was 12.9 per cent better than the crop of 1905 on the corresponding date, and Indian Territory 6.7 per cent better, whereas the condition in Oklahoma is

the same as it was a year ago. The following table gives the condition averages in more detail, and also repeats the changes in acreage as ascertained in June. It should be borne in mind that these comparisons are with last year's crop and not with "normal" condition. The figures showing quantity of cotton ginhed are from
