Incendiary Fire.

On last Sunday about two o'clock, as Ad Sailor, one of the proprietors of the Stag salcon, was going home, a man, at a fast run, passed about ten feet be-hind him, headed in the direction of the Santa Fe track. This occured almost directly behind the commercial hotel. Mr. Sailor states that, at the time, he thought the circumstance poculiar, but gave it no particular attention. He had not proceeded more than twenty feet on his way when he saw a fire in the rear of a building to the right. He immediately started on a run for the scene of the fire discharging his revolver and hallooing fire. Upon arriving he found the fire to be in the rear of A. C. Bedgood's grocery store. He says that three barrels wer piled one above the other as near the grocery as was possible and that they were thoroughly saturated with kerocene oil. He pulled them down with an old hoe and scatterd them, but not before the flames had caught the roof and the inside of the building. At this juncture Ed Chambless and Bud Veach arrived and through their combined efforts the fire was extinguished. Ed Chambless kicked in a small window, crawled through the opening and rolled a coal oil tank, that was directly under and not more than four or five inches from the flames, out of the way Had the fire not been discovered for five minutes longer nothing could have saved the row of frame buildings joining this one on the east, That the fire was incendiary is proven by the fact that nearly the whole back end of building was saturated with coal oil, inside and out, and there is now no doubt but what if the man who ran down the alley could be identified the fire bug's identity could be established. It was a very fortunate circumstance that caused Mr. Sailor to happen along just in time to thwart the evil designs of the villian who was responsible for the conflagration. Both building and stock was fully insured.

ARRIVAL OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE IN THE CAPITAL OF BRAZIL.

The Historic Abrantes Palace Given Over To the Occupancy of Mr. Root and Those Accompanying Him.

The latter, who spoke in Portuguese, made a hit with his auditors. Secretary Root and Ambassador Griscom visited President Alves at three o'clock in the afternoon.

Banquet and Reception. Secretary Root was given a banquet during the evening by 30 of the most prominent men of all parties and literatures. After the Jinner Mr. Root attended a reception at the president's palace, which was a brilliant affair. The palace and gardens were decorated with royal splendor.
