BANG WINS FIGHT.

Missus Fouts Gains and Makes His Foul Sura.

Arms, Goldfield, Nev., Sept. 4.—Batling Nelson deliberately fouled Joe Gans in the forty-second round of the best and longest fight ever seen in Nevada, or on the Pacific Slope, for years.

Shortly after the forty-second round began the men were in their usual clinch. Nelson had his head on Gans' shoulder and his arm down. Several times he hit Gans below the belt, apparently feeling for a vital spot.

Referee Siler, without hesitating, ordered Nelson to his corner and awarded the fight to Gans on a foul. Siler's decision received almost unanimous approval.

Siler was loudly cheered as he left the ring, as was Gans, who was carried to his dressing room. Nelson and his seconds were hissed as they departed.

Many Texans Are Awake.

Washington: The letters of inquiry about the opening of the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache reservations in Oklahoma, known as the "Big Pasture," which have come from Texas, indicate that many Texans have an eye on these Oklahoma farming lands.

Absconder Stensland Captured.

Tangier: Paul O. Stensland, President of the Milwaukee Avenue State Bank of Chicago, was arrested here by Harry Olsen, Assistant State's Attorney, who had followed the fugitive from Chicago through England and Spain to Gibraltar to this port, where the prisoner arrived Sunday night.

Bryan His Own Manager.

Washington: William J. Bryan plans to speak many times during the forthcoming Congressional campaign, but he will probably not appear under the auspices of the Democratic Congressional Committee.

Killed by a Train.

Durant, C. T.: Bud Hill, a resident of this city, was run over by a freight train near Caney. The body was horribly mutilated. The remains were brought to Durant. The supposition is that Mr. Hill endeavored to get aboard a fast moving freight train to come to Durant, and missing his hold fell under the cars.

A Labor Dearth.

Dallas: Within a radius of 150 miles of Dallas there is a scarcity of laborers on the farms that is causing a bulging of the labor market in the city. Agents are in the city at this time from points in North and East Texas and from the Territories seeking for cotton pickers and for laborers for other forms of farm work.

Central Texas Negro Fair.

Corsicana: The Central Texas Negro Fair closed its fifth annual meeting Sunday night. The attendance was very good, the exhibits creditable and the races were very satisfactory.

A Low Insurance Rate Secured.

Dallas: Mr. Calvin has arranged to cover the insurance risks on all the Farmers' Union warehouses at a stipulated schedule, said to be slightly more favorable than the circular at first sent out would indicate.

Thought His Time Had Come.

Strenuous Visitor Caused Much Mental Perturbation. Congressman George F. Lawrence served several years as Judge of the district court in his home town, North Adams, Mass., and had one experience which for a moment caused him to make up his mind to resign at once.

For eight minutes, while the ground seemed to sway and shake from the shouts and applause, he strode nervously from side to side of the platform.

"I favor the control of only the trunk lines by the National Government," said Mr. Bryan, "and the ownership of all other railroads by the State Governments."

In an instant thousands of voices were raised and thousands of faces were turned toward the side of the building opposite the speaker's stand, where William Randolph Hearst sat.

"Three cheers for Hearst," was the cry which swelled until the speaker's voice was drowned for a moment.

This reception, which was given under the auspices of the Commercial Travelers' Anti-Trust League, proved really to be the sounding of the Democratic campaign call. Mr. Bryan's speech was a clear-cut outline

of his ideas as to what the Democratic policy should be. The election of United States Senators by the people, regulation of the trusts by the Government, an universal eight-hour day, settlement of international disputes by arbitration rather than by force and revision of the tariff were some of his points.

Mr. Bryan declared, however, that he was merely expressing his own opinion and not attempting to forecast the policies of the party.

Mr. Bryan declared that the trusts were the great issue of the day. He favored the closest supervision of the organization of corporations and declared that no man should be a director of two or more corporations which deal with each other or deal in the same line of business.

He called for the enforcement of the criminal clause of the Sherman anti-trust law, and

It is a well established fact by chemical analysis that Cream of Tartar being less volatile than Alum, when exposed to heat, is not entirely evaporated as is the case with Alum, but leaves a residue in the bread, which is injurious.

MEXICO VISITED BY STORMS.

The Pacific Coast Suffers Great Property Damage.

City of Mexico, Sept. 3.—The terrible storm which swept over the Pacific Coast of the Republic for nearly three weeks has ended, after having occasioned immense damage throughout an extensive region. The port of Manzanillo is, after many days of isolation, in communication with the rest of the country. Telegraph lines were prostrated and in a long distance not a single signal post was left in place; often everything was swept away by the floods.

In the State of Sinaloa and the territory of Tepic great injury was done to farmers and great loss of crops done to farmers and great loss of crops and cattle is reported.

Some of the machines employed on the port works at Manzanillo were destroyed or rendered useless.

Many houses occupied by poor people and situated near the sea were ruined.

The overland trail from Tuxpan to Colima is impassable in places and extremely dangerous in others. Five mules of a pack train crossing the trail were caught by a torrent of water in the bottom of the Beltran arroyo and drowned. Several travelers had narrow escapes from death.

Jose Ferrera found in Giles' pasture near Comfort, the skeleton of Antonico Ossuna, the son of Rev. Urbana Ossuna, who had been missed since Nov. 12, 1905. He died of accidental gunshot.

While the wife of Tom Watson, colored, near Petty, was engaged in preserving fruit Friday evening and was holding her infant in her arms, the baby accidentally slipped from her grasp and fell in the kettle, sustaining fatal burns.

Less Than 500 Deaths in Frisco.

San Francisco: In all 452 persons lost their lives as the result of the disaster of April 1. The local health department so stated in its formal report sent out to the State Board of Health. Of the victims, 206 were killed by falling walls, 177 perished by fire, 7 shot and 2 died as a result of ptomaine poisoning due to eating "emergency" canned goods of a poor quality; 420 are believed to have been white, 18 Chinese and 4 Japanese.

Juliette Fowler Orphan Home.

Dallas: The Juliette Fowler Orphan Home near Grand Prairie will be sold. It is stated that there will be erected in the near future on a plot of fifteen acres beyond the city limits of East Dallas, buildings to the value of \$50,000. It is planned to build a home for boys, one for girls, one for aged people and a hospital. With these proposed buildings in place, there will yet be ample room for a campus and for a large truck garden.

Corn IS Short in Mexico.

City of Mexico: It begins to be evident that the shortage in corn and wheat crops here will make it necessary to bring much grain from the United States and dealers look for an executive order abating the duties on cereals. The drought on one hand and the floods on the other have greatly reduced the crops. Railway travel has been somewhat injured by the circulation of reports of impending uprising in this country.

A negro laborer was killed by a piece of timber being wrenched from his hands and striking him while attempting to remove a belt at a gin at which he was working at Hempstead.

Harry, the 13-year-old son of John Lester, a miller of Fairview, Ok., was smothered to death in a pit of wheat at his father's mill. The boy was attempting to make some repair on the engine and losing his balance fell head first into the pit.

Bids are invited on a three-story brick or stone Masonic lodge building at Llano.

The Fruit Belt Poultry and Poultry Stock Association has decided to hold a show at Tyler this fall.

Nine hundred and fifty-five votes were polled in Athens precinct at the local option election Saturday. The prohibition majority was seventeen.

Three restaurant keepers and one dairy woman were arrested in Galveston Saturday for selling impure milk.

Dirt will be broken at Sherman on the Sherman and Dallas Electric Railway within the next thirty days, according to a telegram from J. F. Strickland, now in Boston.

Adolph Rippa, a 9-year old San Antonio boy, died Saturday from a rattlesnake's bite.

The wheat-growing belt belongs in Oklahoma this year to Z. F. Carder, living near Wakita. His crop of 108 acres yielded 3,780 bushels, or an average of thirty-five bushels per acre.

The driver and eight mules were knocked down by lightning Saturday evening on the B. N. Ferguson farm, five miles south from Iowa Park. Four valuable mules were killed.

Ruth, the elephant belonging to the Alexander & Collins shows, died at Eagle Lake. The elephant was sick when taken out of the car and showed signs of blind staggers, as in horses, and died within a few hours.

Bad Hill, engineer for the concrete force now at work near Caney, I. T., was struck and killed by a north-bound freight train. He was mangled beyond recognition, but could be identified by papers and an identification slip.

North Dakota Solves the Adulteration Problem. North Dakota seems to have found the key to the question, "How shall we protect the people from frauds in manufactured products?" A new law has recently gone into effect designed to make it impossible to deceive people into buying inferior and adulterated paint under the impression that they are getting real paint, viz.: pure white lead and linseed oil.

The North Dakota lawmakers did not attempt to absolutely prohibit the inferior pigments, or mixtures of pigments. They adopted the slogan, "Let the label tell," and then left to the people to buy whichever they wished.

Under this plan, if any one wishes to buy a mixture of rock-dust, ground quartz and other cheap elements which are found in many paints and so-called "white leads," no one can object; for they do it with their eyes open. But if they prefer genuine white lead and linseed oil, they can be sure of getting it, for none but the genuine article can bear a label which says "pure white lead."

In all other States mixtures are often sold as pure white lead which contain little—sometimes no—real white lead.

It would seem that were this same principle applied to food, beverages and all other prepared articles, where deception is practiced upon the buyer, the question would be solved. It would leave us free to buy what we pleased, but would protect us from unwittingly buying what we did not want.
