The film was made available by J. B. Elliston of Hereford, who was introduced to the local group by John Fulfer, post adjutant.

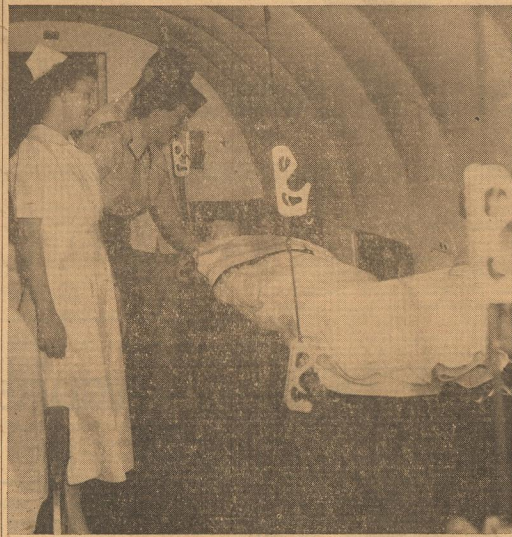
Six County Delegates Attend 5-Day State FB Convention at Galveston

Full slate of delegates represented the Castro County Farm Bureau at the State Farm Bureau Convention in Galveston Nov. 7-11.

Delegates making the trip to Galveston were Steve Taylor, Allan Webb, Fred Bruegel, Bill Hochstein, Fred Axe and Roy Pyeatt.

Probably of greatest significance to county bureau members is the fact that one of the state FB amendments concerning insurance rates and classifications, which had the sanction of the county bureau, was passed at the convention.

Whereas, the rates for rate classification promulgated by the Insurance Commission seem to be excessive in some cases, especially to married couples under age 25, be it resolved that the Texas Farm Bureau study and recom-

Lions Speaker Lauds UN and It's Efforts for World Peace

"Six-hundred and twenty million people have been given citizenship under United Nations sponsorship and still half of the population of the world is hungry, diseased, ill and illiterate," Joe Salem, retired Sudan businessman, told members of the Dimmitt Lions Club at their Tuesday luncheon meeting.

The Lions Club speaker, introduced by Rev. D. W. Brashear who invited him to address the members, gave an interesting and comprehensive talk about the United Nations organization and world peace.

The speaker described the UN as a 50-member organization which was founded in 1945 at San Francisco and compared it to the present 60-member nations group with 21 Communist nations and 13 Western countries seeking entrance.

Salem pointed out that the United States has half of the wealth of the world but that all nations must and can contribute toward promotion of world peace.

Postmaster Urges Early Christmas Mailing to Avoid Late Deliveries

Local residents are reminded this week that the Christmas rush to mail packages will soon be here and that postal employees will have their hands full assorting packages, stamping parcels and preparing the mail for delivery.

Postmaster Tom Bice points out that residents may assure themselves of safe delivery of packages by getting them ready now and mailing them early.

The attractiveness of the package counts but how it is wrapped, Bice explains. He adds that Christmas mail will be heavier than ever this year and that it is important that parcels be addressed properly and wrapped and tied securely.

In order to make mailing easier for the sender as well as the postal employee and to avoid late arrival of packages, Bice makes the following suggestions: "Select a mailing carton of cor-

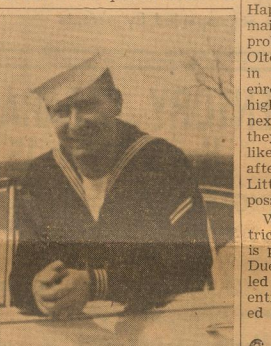
rugated fiberboard. Use a heavy wrapping paper and strong cord tied over and under several times. Christmas seals and do not open until Christmas stickers should be placed on back of the parcel, so the address remains easy to read."

"The package itself may not be sealed, unless the return address and this inscription appear: 'Contents merchandise—may be opened for postal inspection.'"

"All Christmas cards bearing a three cent stamp are sorted and delivered first, and they will be forwarded or returned if necessary. Cards going to other states should be posted not later than December 15 to insure delivery before Christmas."

Delivery of Christmas cards can be speeded up by placing them in two bundles, marked 'all for local delivery,' and 'all for out-of-town delivery.'

Parcel post packages should be in the mail by the first week in December if they are marked for out-of-state delivery.

Firemen Start Safety Campaign

Knowing the danger of fire and the destruction it causes, the Fire Department has started a campaign to put Fire Extinguishers in every home in Dimmitt. The Extinguishers they have selected are the product of Power-Pak Products Inc., of Buffalo, N. Y. who make the only CO-2 (carbon dioxide) extinguishers under the strict supervision of the Interstate Commerce Commission and include household units which are finished in white enamel and can be hung in any room in the house, fire alarms and extinguishers, for the automobile, barn, truck, tractor and combine.

Carbon Dioxide is the best known element for extinguishing gasoline, oil, grease and surface fires. It is perfectly safe to use, being non-poisonous and will not stain nor discolor the finest of wall paper nor linens and leaves no mess to clean up after it's use.

Reubin Mayfield, Chief of the Fire Department says, "We have mailed letters to all the homes in Dimmitt explaining that we will call on them with sample extinguishers so they may choose the kind of extinguishers they will want. We, the Firemen, know that every home in town should have an extinguisher handy in case of an emergency, because if a fire can be extinguished soon after it starts, hundreds of dollars can be saved in property damage and lives might be saved. He says further, "It may be that we have inadvertently overlooked someone in our mailing, if so it is a mistake on our part and we are sorry, so if anyone who has not received a letter wants an extinguisher will kindly call the Fire Department a Fireman will call on you with sample extinguishers so that you may select the kind of extinguisher you want.

Chief Mayfield also says, "Every farm home, barn, truck, tractor, automobile and combine should be equipped with one of these extinguishers, so we have placed on display in a show window at B & D Gulf Service a sample of each of these "packages of SAFETY" for you to see. You

may either leave your order at the place of display or at the Fire Department.

In doing this service for the community Chief Mayfield says, "We of the Fire Department are on the job twenty-four hours every day to put out fires and we always respond quickly as we can after an alarm has been received, to save as much of your property as is possible; but if you have one of these extinguishers handy you might extinguish a blaze without any damage, and we will be grateful if you will cooperate with us. You know we will come if you have a fire; but it takes time and fires don't wait.

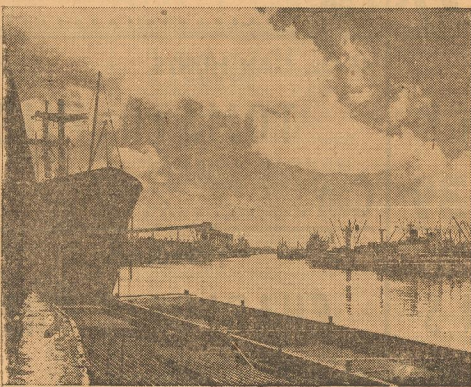

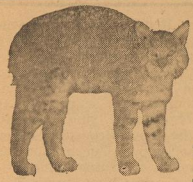
SHIP CHANNEL

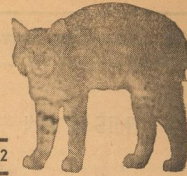

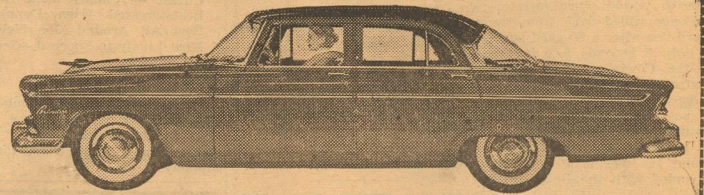
Already they are working with groups in planning for the annual Homecoming celebration which will take place Nov. 19-20 under the sponsorship of the Student Government Association.

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
