



A PIONEER CALLED HENCE.

Was Here Many Years Before the

Iren Horse Came. Dalias, Nov. 12.—Mrs. Catherine W. Polk Crockett, wife of Col. John Mc Clannahan Crockett, died on Sunday evening at 6:20 o'clock at her res idence at Kosse, Texas. She was of the Polk families of the Carolinas and of Tennessee. She was married to Col. Crockett in Western Tennessee on March 17, 1837. Ten years later they came to Texas settling first for a short time at Paris. In 1848 they came on horseback from Paris to Dallas and made their home there. As the wife of a man who served when Dallas County was a large part of North Texas, who was afterward in the Legislature of the State and was a wartime Lieutenant Governor, Mrs. Crockett had a large acquaintance all over Texas and had always been a woman of wide information and great popularity.

Deplorable and Inexplicable Tragedy. Houston: About 8 o'clock Saturday night Maurice Gombert, a well known saloon man, shot and instantly killed his wife at their home in Brunner. The dead woman was about forty years of age and very beautiful. A cloud of mystery surrounds the shooting. Gombert surrendered to the officers, but refused to talk. Two pistols were found in the death chamber, one loaded and the other with four empty shells, indicating that to have been the weapon used by the husband, as four bullets had found lodgment in the woman's body.. Rio Grande, Tex., Nov. 10 .-- As a re sult of an attack by armed men or Captain McDonald and his Rangers. four of the assailants are dead, one dangerously wounded and two are in

The Rangers were at the Casita ranch, on the road to Rio Grande City at about 9 o'clock Thursday night. They met a back full of armed men who opened fire without warning.

The Rangers then returned the fire and a pitched battle followed. The team ran away, Capt. McDonald firing from it. Finally he jumped out and fought on foot. While the firing raged in Iront, the Rangers were fired on from a house at the back.

After one hundred or more shots were fired, the assailants apparently fled, one remaining dead on the ground McDonald's driver was shot through

the shirt and undershirt, but his body was not touched. Three Rangers were left to hold the battlefield, Captain McDonald and the others comng to town. The Sheriff, Deodro Garcia, immediately organized a force and went out, leaving the Rangers on guard. who meanwhile had captured two men believed to have been engaged in the attack.
