"Concrete examples are often more convincing than general statements. Up at Texico, a point on the boundary between New Mexico and the Panhandle of Texas, there is a bank which started business last spring with first day's deposits of \$4487.11. He hunted high and low for one of the weeds but could not find any anywhere. Finally in desperation he pulled out a plant closely resembling the kind he was looking for and began chewing the roots in an effort to slake his thirst. To his surprise the roots began assuming a gum like consistency and collected in a ball in his mouth. The similarity of the substance to rub in its crude state lead him to make experiments with the weed upon his rewill be glad to get other samples for turn to his home at Denver. The result of the tests was his application a patent covering the exclusive right to manufacture the substitute for rub ber from the weed and the subsequent organization of the Western Patent Crude Rubber company.
This rubber weed grows prolificly all

over the Rocky mountain region. It is found in greatest abundance in the high altitudes. It is probably beet known as pingue, a name given to it by the Indians. According to an estimate made by one of the officers of the company there are two hundred the sand acres of these weeds in New Mexico.
