### Preliminary Hearing

On Case in Which Both Men Were Shot

IAMES KNIGHT KILLED

Case Occurred Near Taiban in the Month of September

A preliminary was commenced Portales Tuesday on a case which occurred in a railroad camp near Taiban on September 14, in which James Knight was killed and H. Hale was severely wounded. The hearing was held in the Sheriff's office before Justice C. W. Morris. Deputy District Attorney W. E. Lindsey prosecuted the investigation and Sam J. Nixon

represented the defense. Three witnesses testified on behalf of the territory, two of whom were present and witnessed the affray. They were Heary H. Hasson, Jesse Dysinger and Emory Snowden, a negro. Hasson was carpenter foreman on the construction work on the new road. James Knight, who was killed, was

imekeeper. Hale had just come to the camp and commenced work. The trouble started in the mess tent. It seems Hale came in and sat down to breakfast without removing his hat. Knight objected to Hale's eating with his hat on and one witness testified that Knight took Hale's hat off and threw it on the floor. Hale refused to eat, left the mess tent and shortly af-WASHINGTON E. LINDSEY ter got his grips from the commisary

and started away. There was also evidence of a conversation between the general foreman and the timekeeper, the foreman asking the timekeeper if Hale owed anything. The timekeeper said something about blankets he had let Hale have. The foreman told the time-

oper to see if Hale had them in hi grips. Knight then demanded the grips of Hale, who refused to surrender them months. saying they were his grips. Knight attempted to take the grips and Hale exhibited a pistol, saying he would then went into the commissary tent and returned with a pistol and again demanded the grips. Shooting then began, the evidence showing both men commenced shooting about the same time, like the two barrels of a shot gun. Both men emptied their guns, and there was evidence to show that

into the commiosary tent and Hale was laying on the ground groaning. This happened on Friday, September 14. Knight was mortally wounded and died on the following Sunday. Hale had three flesh wounds, one in abdomen, one in the thigh and one in the heel. Hale came very near dying. He was kept at the railroad camp hospital until October 20, before he was

able to be brought to Portales. Since then he has been confined here in jail. The preliminary hearing was continued until next week in order to give the defense an opportunity to secure the atteddance of important witnesses.

relty of Care Has Reduced Pro

South McAlester, I. T., Nov. 24.-The continued and extreme scarcity of cars at all Indian Territory and Western Arkansas mines, which has pre vented their being operated over two or three days a week, has reduced the production of coal to so great an extent that many towns in Oklahoma and Texas are now confronted with a fuel famine, and should cold weather set in much suffering would result. Francisco. San Francisco, Cal.: With \$4,000,000 still on hand to be devoted to the re-Hef fund of the refugees, it is stated that the relief committee has held several meetings to determine what shall be done with this money. It is claimed that the directors of relief work find that the need of relief has passed except in such cases as can be taken care of by the regular charity organizations. Prairie Fires Very Destructive.

Santa Fe. N. M.: Reports have reached here that a prairie fire has swept from Western Texas into Eastenr New Mexico and over a million acres of grazing land and homestead land have been burned bare. No loss of life is reported in New Mexico, but it is believed that several people perished in Texas. It is estimated that on both sides of the boundaries between 50,000 and 100,000 head of cattle have been left without grazing.



The passengers of the German vessel will be transshipped and leave France for New York next Sunday. The Orinoco's passengers will be sent forward from Southampton on






