wenty-feport shows that ove pamphlets and maps have been issued during the past two years and nearly all distributed. "Ho! To the Land of Sunshine" seems to be the most popular publica tion as three editions of this has been printed aggregating eleven housand copies. Other publications are, "How I Cured Myelf of Consumption," "Mines and Minerals of New Mexico,' several pamphlets devoted to dif ferent counties, a map of the Territory, and a book of 446 pages entitled "To the Land of Sunshine," containing 200 illus trations.
These publications described the resources, naturally advantages and progress made in the Territory relative to agriculture, horticulture, minerals, live stock, irrigation, school system, cities towns, etc. The desirability the climate and weather is com mented upon, and the opportunities for the homeseeker and in vestor are pointed out. These publications have been extensively distributed by the passenger departments of the various railroads.
The correspondence of the Bureau bas grown extensively as five thousand letters have been received and five thousand two hundred letters have been written by the Secretary. One stenogorapher was regularly em ployed by the Secretary during the time and another was given partial employment. The cost of the stenographers was paid by the Secretary out of his own salary and there were mant months during the two years when there was absolutely no pay for the Secretary and during which he received no comperisation for his labors.
The appropriation for the Bu reau for the fiscal year ending November 30,1905 , was $\$ 2,000$, and for the fiscal year ending November 30,1906 , it was $\$ 4,000$ Besides this the Secretary has

To the Land of Sunshine" seems to be the most popular publication as three editions of this has been printed aggregating eleven thousand copies. Other publications are, "How I Cured Myself of Consumption," "Mines and Minerals of New Mexico," several pamphlets devoted to different counties, a map of the Territory, and a book of 446 pages entitled "To the Land of Sunshine," containing 200 illustrations.

These publications described the resources, naturally advantages and progress made in the Territory relative to agriculture, horticulture, minerals, live stock, irrigation, school system, cities, towns, etc. The desirability of the climate and weather is commented upon, and the opportunities for the homeseeker and inrestor are pointed out. These publications have been extensi vely distributed by the passenger departments of the various rail roads..

The correspondence of the Bureau has grown extensively as five thousand letters have been received and five thousand two hundred letters have been writ ten by the Secretary. One stenogorapher was regularly employed by the Secretary' during the time and another was given partial employment. The cost of the stenographers was paid by the Secretary out of his own salary and there were many months during the two years when there was absolutely no pay for the Secretary and during which he received no compen'sation for his labors.
The appropriation for the Bu reau for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1905, was $\$ 2,000$, and for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1906, it was $\$ 4,000$. Besides this the Secretary has obtained by personal application $\$ 200$ from the A. T. \& S. F. Ry., and $\$ 100$ from the Rock Island. This was turned over to the treasurer and regularly ac counted for.
It seems with this showing of good work performed and the economy shown there is no faul to be found. Besides this much good has been accomplished by our Bureau of Immigration as the rapid development of south eastern New Mexico especially shows. We believe the best in terests of this Territory would be by continuing the Bureau.
