A FACTORY TO MAKE BROOMS

A Good Enterprise to be Established at Portales.

Machinery has Been Ordered and the Brush Bought.

W. F. Shaw, formerly of Cleburne, Texas, has completed arrangements to establish a first-class broom factory in Portales. He has bought the equipment heretofore used by Logan Bros., at Arch and, in addition to this, he has ordered sufficient new and modern machinery to make a first-class broom factory. This is a sure thing and it is expected that the factory will be in working condition in a few weeks.

The business will be organized as a stock company, and most of our business men have subscribed to its capital stock, making it a strong corporation. The capacity of the factory, to begin with, will be twenty-dozen brooms per day, with ample facilities to double this out put should conditions justify it. Mr. Shaw has purchased all the brush available and is in the market for all that may be offered for sale.

Mr. Shaw is an experienced broom maker and will have charge of the factory and he promises to make this one of the best broom factories in the southwest. He will be glad, at any time, to talk to the farmers of Roosevelt county regarding the crop, as to how it should be planted, gathered and

prepared for market, also the yield and price. He can be found either at the Portales hotel or Joe Howard & Sons' office.

A building was expected to have been commenced this week for the factory. This will be an enterprise that will be a great benefit to the town and to the farmers. Portales is very glad to welcome an enterprise of this character.

Portales is making a good healthy growth. A new house is being started nearly every day and new people are coming in all the time. Time is all that is required to make this a booming little city.

Some good butter cows is what we need in this part of New Mexico right now. There hasn't been enough butter to supply the demand in Portales all winter. There is nothing that will pay the farmer better in proportion to expense and labor, required than good cows.

Legal time has been decided by the United States supreme court to be sun time and no other. As the time kept in Portales is railroad time and is nearly an hour ahead of sun time, it would be well for people to remember this. As the stork's visits frequently happen along about the time one day changes into another, this discrepancy of time might make a difference of a day in the age of some person. There is one thing in particular that we don't like about this railroad time, and that is it brings seven o'clock around too early in the morning.

Six states in this great and glorious Union have had the back bone to come out and pass laws this winter with the intent and purpose of cutting the passenger rates on railroads to two cents a mile. These states are Alabama, Missouri, West Virginia, Pennsylvania, Nebraska and Mississippi. The railroads have given notice that they don't propose to have these laws go into effect as they are going to put up a plea in court that two cent passenger rates would place the income of the road below a paying basis. We believe, though, from our limited experience we could make more money if we had a good railroad and plenty of passengers to carry at two cents a mile than we can printing newspapers at one dollar a year.

We would like to suggest that a not very expensive arrangement could be made by the business men of Portales that would add, very much, to the comfort and well being of the business part of town, and that would be to have the streets sprinkled. This town can not afford to neglect this duty much longer. We are just now at the season of the year when we particularly need this and, if each business house would stand its equitable share of the expense it would not cost any one very much. It would be a great benefit in keeping the merchants' goods clean, and would be a great comfort to their customers when the wagons are stirring the dust in the streets and the wind blowing it into the people's faces. We believe an arrangement should be made at once for sprinkling the parts of Main street most used, and fail to see why anyone who would be benefitted thereby

should refuse to help support it. The Times will willing pay its share towards having this work done.

The best time for planting crops in the spring is something not very well determined here, according to such observations as the editor of this paper has been able to make. According to our opinion one of the best things a farmer could do would be to commence very early to make preparations to have his ground in proper shape for planting when the time comes. If the ground had been plowed good and deep just as soon as it got dry enough after the wet spell in the early part of the winter, then gone over with a subsurface packer, and then lightly harrowed and reharrowed after each shower, we believe a condition of soil would have been secured that would be in good shape for planting to corn very early this spring. Ground put in that condition would bring the corn up early and hold enough moisture to keep the plant growing. Each shower would boost it along, and the ground could be harrowed after each shower till the plants got so big the harrow would injure them. Corn planted in this way would have very much the advantage of corn planted on ground that is not plowed till the spring rains set in, especially if they happen to start in rather late.

President Roosevelt will in the near future visit the Southwest. The press dispatches say that he will spend considerable of his time in this part of the country. His primary objective point will be Prescott, Arizona, to attend the unveiling of the monument to "Bucky" O'Neill, the Rough Rider who was killed before Santiago. Not so long ago, the President expressed a desire to visit the cliff dwellings and if these are not included in his itinerary, it will not need much urging, it is believed, to induce him to pay the Pajarito Park a visit of a week or two, for hunting is good in that part of New Mexico and the cliff and cave dwellings are an interesting study.—New Mexican.

POINTS ON AGRICULTURE

Some of the Ideas Expressed by Professor Tinsley of the Agricultural College

The Elida News wrote up a very good article in its issue a few weeks ago concerning the visit there of Prof. J. D. Tinsley, which we copy as follows:

"The soil of this vicinity is ideal for farming with a limited amount of rainfall, and if the farmers will only use methods to take care of the water that falls, they should obtain satisfactory yields." Thus said Prof. J. D. Tinsley, field expert of New Mexico Agricultural College and Experiment Station. It is expected that the Legislature will make an appropriation for holding farmers institutes in the various localities and also for carrying on experiments in cooperation with the farmers.

In other counties visited he has organized Farmer's Institute Societies and if the appropriation is obtained it is expected to hold Farmer's Institutes in each county and also to arrange for the experiments through them. The idea is to adopt plans for experiments which will be acceptable to the society and for them to select farmers who are willing to carry on the experiments.

If an experiment costs more than the farmers would usually spend in raising the crop then they will be paid for the extra expense. The Professor is not decided yet as to whether the work in this locality will be carried on through the Farmer's Union or whether an Institute Society will be organized here to carry on the work. A mass meeting will be held later, probably in April, to consider this matter and the plan adopted that will be most acceptable to the majority of the farmers.

"I endorse," said the professor, "The Campbell system as containing the principles that will have to be adopted for farming in this locality. While almost any way of handling the soil will work in the years when the rainfall is as large as it has been in the past few years, but the dry seasons, when they come, will show the advantages of careful farming. For instance, most of the farmers are now breaking land and leaving it rough, this will be all right if we get good spring rains, but if we do not get them then there is danger that the spring winds will dry out this plowed layer worse than if the land had not been broken and there will not be enough moisture left to sprout spring crops. If this land were harrowed down smooth as soon as broken, (the plow should never run more than half a day ahead of the harrow) and a dust mulch made on the surface the land would probably hold enough of the moisture now in it to carry the spring planted crops for some time.

"The main points in handling these soils are to break deep enough to allow all of the water that falls to be taken up so that none will run off, next to keep the surface fine and loose so that evaporation from the surface of the soil will be reduced to the smallest amount. There is danger that when this light sandy loam soil is plowed deep the lower part of the plowed layer may not settle back firmly enough and it is for the purpose of packing it back that the surface packer is available. A thorough working with the disc harrow will help to take the place of the packer."

"All crops should be planted as deep as possible and listing should do well. All cultivation should be shallow. Do not cultivate with shovels or any tool that will stir the soil deep and tend to turn the wet soil up and the dry soil down to the roots. In the spring and summer harrow until the crop is high enough to be damaged. The ground should be stirred every two or three weeks and after every shower just as soon as dry enough to get on it. When corn, milo, etc. is too high then a cultivator with spiked teeth may be used.

"In preparing ground do not leave the surface slick and firm as the roller and drag tend to leave it, but always follow up with the spike toothed harrow, for the slick firm surface is the one which dries out most rapidly." The professor favors early planting as the one which will probably yield the best results. In years like this when the moisture now in the ground is sufficient to insure a good growth at

the beginning. He also advises Macaroni spring wheat as the one which will yield best results here, and the Kerson sixty day and Texas Red as the best varieties of oats—also that a sixty day barley should be a good crop.

Continuing he said: "As a rule it will be best to plant seeds from dry farming districts further north, say Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska. In ordering or buying seed always specify seeds that have not been raised under the ditch. Seeds raised on irrigated lands will not produce in dry farming districts, unless an abundance of rain should fall"
