

At St. Petersburg, Russia, March 15, the ceiling of the hall where the Lower House of Parliament meets, collapsed at 6 o'clock in the morning, causing a widespread wreckage among the seats below. An examination showed that the nails and other fastenings binding the ceiling to the rafters had not been replaced since the time of Catherine the Second, and broke under the weight of the new decorations. A terrible catastrophe would have resulted if the fall had occurred during a session of the House.

A Texas paper says: "Oklahoma may be the youngest state in the Union, but it has already produced a crop of politicians who would do credit to a Commonwealth grown gray in statehood. After laboring for months on a Constitution at an expense of over \$150,000, the delegates have evolved a document which the Republican members assert will never receive the approval of the President. The citizens of Oklahoma may yet be compelled to turn their Constitution over to a national board of arbitration, the members of which are not inoculated with Oklahoma politics." D. C. Grav, a Galveston negro who was an enlisted man in Company B. Twenty-fifth Infantry, one of the battalion that shot up Brownsville Aug. 13 last, has made what purports to be a full statement of that affair. The gist of the statement is that one of the negro soldiers started out from the fort to avenge himself upon a white man who knocked him down at the home of a negro woman and other soldiers went with him. The general shooting followed and the men banded themselves in secrecy refusing to betray the men who did the shooting. Gray says all hands helped clean the rifles of the marauders and when the inspection was made by lantern light only a few guns were said to show dirt. 

When the Territorial educational institutions flourish. then do the people prosper, and the really patrotic and respectable citizens of New Mexico will not grudge the pittance of one-sixth of one mill on the assessed valuation of their property for the great object to be attained.

At the close of the last Congress Senator Edward W. Carmack of Tennessee talked the ship subsidy bill to death, and the "fatality" brought fourth considerable inquiry about the freedom of speech in the Senate which makes it possible to strangle legislation in this manner. The Senate rule of unlimited speech has been in effect since 1806. While many important bills have been done to death on account of it, the three most important measures killed in this way were the Federal election law, popularly known as the "Force Bill," in 1891; the rivers and harbors bill, carrying about \$50,000,000 appropriations for waterways, in 1901, and the ship subsidy bill a few weeks ago .---







CLERK OBEYED THE ORDER. Beautiful Example of "Red Tape"

Comes from England.

The Aldershot (Eng.) News narrates a curious occurrence at Worth Camp, Aldershot, due to the recent removal of the war office from Pall Mall to the new building in Whitehall.

The officer in command of a battalion quartered on the Marlborough lines was amazed one morning to find on his parade ground a traction engine and several trucks. Stones, gravel and material were deposited on the ground, and in due course of time the engine and trucks returned with more.

Going to headquarters for an explanation, the commanding officer was informed that the instructions had come from the war office to send the material there. Not satisfied with this explanation, the officer pursued the matter further, with the result that the original requisition for the material was produced and was found to be dated 1856.

In moving out of the old offices in Pall Mall a clerk had found the requisition in a pigeon hole, and see, ing that it was for 100 tons of road material he had the order executed and the material dumped on the only available spot at North Camp.

# "BLIZZARD" IS AMERICAN.

"Blizzard" is an American word. The date and circumstances of its origin are obscure. Though it was first commonly used by the American newspapers as a good word for a snow squall in the winter of 1880-1881, it is said to have been known to the west in that sense nearly 20 years earlier. From an English writer of 1834 this sentence is quoted: "A gentleman at dinner asked me for a toast, and, supposing he meant to have some fun at my expense, I concluded to go ahead and give him and his likes a blizzard." Here "blizzard" might well mean a metaphorical volley, which would square with the evidence of a correspondent of an American paper, who recalled that in the '40s a "blizzard" was a particular kind of volley-a rattling one fired in quick succession, as opposed to a simultaneous "broadside"-affected by sportsmen on the Atlantic coast, who shot at flights of migratory birds from behind screens.





broom corn last year says the fodder of Plainview country people talked about the broom corn is better feed for cattle than either kafir corn or corn fodder. Also that the broom corn seed is good feed. This being the case broom lots of cotton raised there, and he corn is surely a profitable crop.

So many people having come here with stock and without feed has made a great demand for the surplus feed raised by our farmers last year. Kafir corn in the head is now selling at twelve to fifteen dollars a ton. One farmer told us he was offered for kafir corn fodder, suitable for baling, fifty cents per sixty pound bale, and the purchaser would do the baling.

Mr. Turner, who carries the mail out to Arch reports that most all the farmers out there have their ground broke and ready for planting. He says Mr. Lot, an early settler there, expected to plant corn this week. Mr Lot is a man sixty-seven years old and has raised good corn every 'year. Last year be sold 500 bushels at one time in the field, besides selling several other batches.

S B. Cox, the barber, who has a claim twenty-four miles south of Portales says there is about forty acres of his place partially covered with shinnery. Shinnery is a low growing oak and produces a prolific yield of acorns that makes good hog feed. Last week he took out a quantity of artichoke tubers and planted them around among the shinnery. He expects to have .a fine hog pasture there later on.

Peanuts have been sold here in town by farmers who have raised them at eight cents per pound. There are twenty pounds to the bushel, so that akes the price one dollar and sixty





The gubers that have been brought in by the farmers are the finest we have ever seen. They are an easy crop to raise except the picking and machinery has been devised for this purpose. Peanuts are always in demand on the market and we hope that lots of them will be raised in this county this year.

An old and true theory is that any community that consumes a considerable amount of a given product, and has that p roduct shipped in from some place else when it could just as well be raised at home, is wasting or throwing away the money that is paid for the product. The product ought to be produced in the community, then the money that otherwise would be sent away would stay in the community and would be there as capital to do business with. A product to which this theory will apply is the common old Irish potato. How many places are there where potatoes can be successfully grown, at least in quantities sufficient for home sunsumption, where the farmers are doing well and purely and simply neglect to plant sufficient potatoes for their own use. Colorado potato growers are pocketing lots of

money that goes to them from farmers who ought to have raised their own potatoes. We would like to have every potato grown in Roosevelt county that is demanded for consumption in this county, and some extra. Let those farmers who have land adapted to potatoes plant plenty of them. Then when they are raised let tatoes insist on the local merchant

handling home grown potatoes instead of shipping them in.






