New Law Relating to Formation of School Districts.

County Superintendent J A. Fairly received a letter from Attorney Gen eral Reid, giving the new law relative to the formation of new school districts. The new law is as follows:

Sec. 22. Whenever it is desired that a new school district shall be formed. a petition and statement of facts signed by a majority of legal electors residing within the proposed district shall be presented to the county superintendent of schools. Said petition and statement shall contain such a description of the boundaries of said proposed district as will be sufficient to definitely locate it; it shall also contain the names and ages of all persons of school age who are ac-

tual residents of the proposed district. Whenever a new district has been created, at the next regular apportionment, the county superintendent shall apportion to it its share of the school fund as provided by law.

No school district shall hereafter be created or divided unless there be at least twenty-five (25) children of school age in the new district and at least twenty-five (25) children of school age remaining in the district of each of the districts from which such district is taken; provided, however, that a board of school directors may maintain more than one school in its district for the better accommodation of the patrons of said district.

Upon the receipt of such petition and statement by the county superintendent, he shall create such new district. shall assign to it a number or other proper designation, appoint three persons as a board of directors, who shall serve until the time of the next regular election for directors, at which time a board shall be elected in accordance with the provisions of Chapter LV. Laws of 1901; provided that the territory of school district shall not be so reduced as to make its bonded indebtedness exceed four (4) per cent of assessed valuation.

After paying all indebtedness of the old district that is chargeable to the common school fund, if any balance remains the county superintendent shall divide the said balance between the old district and the new in proportion to White Leghorns, for setting of fifteen the number of children of school age eggs, \$1.00 and \$1.50. Have plenty of bonds; also all similar indebtedness

shall be divided between the old district and the new in proportion to the taxable property, according to the assessed value, in each. In making such adjustment, the superintendent, in cooperation with the board of county commissioners of the county in which such districts are situated, is hereby authorized to use such plans, or means as will best subserve the mutual interests of the two districts, and their decision snall be final subject to the right of appeal to the courts.

Circular Letter to the County Superintendents.

DEAR SIRS:-It is quite unfortunate that our educational bill was made one of the very last orders of business in the recent legislative assembly. Some very unsatisfactory conditions result from this fact.

A digest of school legislation of 1907 is mailed to you, and I wish to call your attention to certain points in as brief a way as possible.

You will notice that Section III dispenses with the county board of school examiners. The attention of the district judges and boards of county commissioners will be called to this point.

The county superintendent will hold examinations at such time, places, and in such manner as may be prescribed

Let me caution you against being too liberal in the use of permits. The law forbids issuing twice to the same per-

The new law requires every institute conductor and instructor to hold a certificate from the territorial board of

The county superintendents cannot make a legal contract for institute work with a person not holding such a

All institutes should be held late in the summer, in August, preferably Dates, places and wages paid to conductors and instructors must be approved by the superintendent of pubhe instruction.

We shall be very scrict in the matter of issuing excuses to teachers for non-attendance at fustitutes.

The territorial board of education will adopt text books June 10th. All schools, rural, village, town or city must use the books adopted. There will be no alternative. We shall secure lower prices on books by this plan.

All parents will appreciate this. The territorial superintendent of public instruction or his assistant will visit as many institutes during the summer as possible.

Aside from the conductor, an instructor in primary methods is recommended in every county where the "in-

stitute Fund" will warrant it. Note carefully the specific duties of the county superintendent as stated in Section XX.

Read with care the provisions of Section XXII.

Notify the clerks of boards of school directors that their statistical reports must be on file in your office within ten days after June 15th. Your reports to this office are to be filed on or before

Study provisions of Section XXV. According to this law, the election of school directors should have occurred Monday, April 1st. There can be no legal election this year. You will be instructed in due time how to meet the emergeecy legally.

Arrangements for the county instrtutes constitute the next order of business of this office. Your correspondence is solicited.

I have had no help in this office until today. I trust, therefore, that you will pardon my not having kept you in touch with plans.

Assuring you of my heartiest support in every effort to advance the interests of our public schools, I am, Yours very sincerely,





William R. Hinsdale of Orange, N. J., who has discovered the location of the "old Spanish tunnel" in the Shawangunk mountains, is to lay out a park there, according to the New York World.

Tradition said that from the tunnel ran a stream of living water, and Prof. Mathel, state geologist of Ohio, who investigated, accepted the theory that the work was done by Spaniards who formed a part of the Ponce de Leon expedition. After failing to find the fountain of youth in Florida, and following their leader's dying injunction to continue the search, they are thought to have made the journey northward.

When they came to a stream larger than a man's arm rushing out of solid rock, with no visible source of supply, they halted and began to tunnel to locate the pool whence it came. This was in the sixteenth century. The tunnel was known till recently only by Indian legend.

Hinsdale, finding a stream that never varied in its flow or temperature, employed a force of men, and uncovered an accumulation of debris. Then he located the mouth of the tunnel itself. It is perfectly formed and the stream gushes from a fissure at the extreme end.

The tunnel is 500 feet long, six feet high, four feet wide and


