### BOND FIXED AT \$10,000

Result of the Preliminary of Byron B. Parrish

Preliminary Presided Over by Judge Wm. H. Pope

The preliminary in the Parrish case was concluded late last night. Judge Pope binding the defendant over to await the action of the grand jury, fixing the bond at \$10,000. The defendant, Byron B. Parrish, is charged with the murder of W. E. Tipton, deputy sheriff, which occurred at Texico on Thursday of last week. The preliminary commenced Wednesday afternoon and was conducted by Judge Wm. H. Pope, judge of this judicial district. The case was heard here by Judge Pope as a result of a contention between the two sides of the case as to whether it should be heard here before C. W. Morris, justice of the peace, or at Texico, before the justice there. The prosecution wanted to take the case to Texico and the defense maintained that it should be heard here, Judge Morris ruling to that effect. Deputy District Attorney Spencer, of Roswell, was here Monday to assist Judge W. E. Lindsey, deputy district attorney at this place, in the prosecution of the case. The attorneys for the prosecution were not willing to take the case up before Judge Morris, so Attorney Spencer returned to Roswell and swore out a warrant before Judge

Pope. Parrish was re-arrested on Judge Pope's warrant. Judge Pope came up from Roswell Wednesday and at once called the case. Attorneys U. S. Bateman of Roswell and Judge Lindsey and W. O. Young of Portales conducted the prosecution. W. W. Gatewood of Roswell and G. L. Reese of Portales conducted the defense. A large number of witnesses have been in attendance, nearly all from Texico. Witnesses for the Territory occupied the time of the court up to Friday noon, in the neighborhood of twenty witnesses testifying. About eight or ten witnesses were called to testify on the part of the defense Friday afternoon. Taking of testimony was concluded about five o'clock. The attorneys briefly argued the case and decision was rendered as given above. Night sessions have been held each night and the preliminary was concluded about nine o'clock last night. The witnesses in their testimony, give the circumstances of the homicide substantially as it appeared in the Times last week. Parrish has been suffering considerably from the wound in his hand. He was unable to sit up all the time in the court room, so had a cot there to recline on during the session. Since Judge Pope has had charge of the case, Parrish has been under guard, R. A. Bain and W. H. Howell being deputized for that purpose, and he has not been placed in jail owing to the condition of his health. Parrish and his attorneys are getting up a bond today and there is not much doubt but what he will be able to secure the required amount all right. Among those who were from Texico and testified in the case are W. W.

Wells, D. W. Naylor, J. F. Green, E. W. Knight, Dr. Breeding, John Lewis, John Shahan, J. W. Thompson, A. J. Warnica, J. B. Williams, John Childers, K. W. Howard, Judge Sam Alford, Dr. Davis, Jack Harwell, W. Franklin, J. F. Deats, Chas. Dykus, John McGrupe, Pete Allie, Mr. and Mrs. Holmes and others. A. L. Hull, Judge Pope's official stenographer, was here and took the testimony. Mrs. Waldo Snyder, of Roswell, Judge Gatewood's stenographer, also took the testimony. Great interest has been taken in this case by the people and there has been deep feeling but no undue excitement. Both sides have strong friends. Everybody is willing to have the case tried on its merits and let the law take its course. The young ladies of the graduating class of the Portales high school went to Texico Saturday on invitation of the graduating class of the Texico high school. They were accompanied by their teachers, Miss Ora Kuykendall, Miss Mamie Eppler and Ben Smith. While there the class were the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Neely, and Mr. and Mrs. Tally. A reception was given the class and teachers Saturday night by Mr. and Mrs. Tally at which the Portales folks report a very enjoyable time. They returned home Sunday. Dr. C. E. Lukens, of Roswell, and C. E. Harris, of Texico, president and secretary of the Roosevelt County Telephone company, arrived in Portales Thursday on business connected with the affairs of their company. They left again Friday.

### DATE SET FOR ENTRY

Portales Forest Reserve Opens August 27th

Official Publication Has Been Made Giving Ninety Days Notice

The Times received a letter, dated May 1, from Hon. Howard Leland, register of the U. S. Land office at Roswell, which states that the Department of the Interior is publishing notice of the opening to entry on and after August 27, 1907, of the lands embraced in the Portales Forest Reserve. The official notice is being published at the local land office, and Mr. Leland authorizes the Times to make announcement of the fact for the benefit of the people of this vicinity. This forest reserve was established by proclamation by the President of the United States on October 3, 1905. On March 16, 1907, the president issued another proclamation revoking the above and restored the lands in the Portales Forest Reserve to the public domain. This proclamation contained the following clause: "The lands which are hereby released from reservation shall be open to settlement from date hereof, but shall not be subject to entry, filing or selection until after ninety days notice by such publication as the Secretary of the Interior may prescribe." This ninety day notice has now been made by the Secretary of the Interior,

and the date set for opening to entry or filing is August 27. As we understand it the land is now open to settlement and there is nothing to prevent settlers entering on the land and take squatters rights till the date filings are to be received. The Portales Forest Reserve comprises a tract of 172,680 acres of land, its eastern boundary being the Texas line, and extends in northwesterly direction, embracing a range of sand hills. The strip is from five to ten miles wide and the northwest end is in the neighborhood of Melrose. It passes between Portales and Texico and the edge of it is only three miles north of Portales. Dr. C. E. Lukens will lecture Sunday night at the Methodist church on the subject of the "Child Saving Problem." The address will be in a popular vein and will deal with one of the important questions before the American people today. The services will be a union of the churches and the public, irrespective of religious beliefs or affiliations will be interested to hear the subject discussed. Report comes to Portales that a fine girl has arrived at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Will Chesher at Lakewood. They were formerly residents of Portales and Mrs. Chesher is the daughter of Geo. F. Williams, the telephone manager. The Degraftenreid family, who live on a ranch about sixty miles northwest from here, were in Portales the first of the week to meet their son, who returned from Arkansas where he has been attending college.

It is bad form to rail at the high winds, and most of the indignation at the gales comes from persons with bad forms.

Five years from now Roosevelt county will have as large a population as any agricultural county in the United States.

There are now two hundred and seventy-two convicts in the Territorial penitentiary at Santa Fe, the largest it has ever been in the history of the institution.

Four cities will ask for the next Republican national convention, viz: Chicago, St. Louis, Seattle, and Kansas City. The latter place seems to be first in the race for the convention.

The Jamestown Ter-Centennial exposition was opened last Friday with great pomp and splendor, although the grounds and building still lack a great deal of being finished. President Roosevelt representatives of thirty-seven nations and a score of governors participated in the opening exercises.

In every town which wishes to become a business center the business men should all stand shoulder to shoulder in helping bring trade to the town. Too often, just a few of the business men do all the pushing and the others just stand around and wait, contenting themselves with the trade that just happens to drop into their place. Advertising is the power that brings the business to a store. This is recognized as a fact by all the successful and leading business men everywhere. Of course, to make advertising successful there must be an enterprising store behind the ad, but the ad is what brings the business. A town where all the business men advertise and pull for business is the town that will progress and push to the front.

We kick about our own government, and it is, doubtless, pretty bad, but what would we think if it took the taxpayers' money to pay every year a pension of \$50,000 to the Goulds, another of \$75,000 to the Astors and another still of \$25,000 to the Vanderbilts? That is what goes on in England. The English doctor, the English druggist, the English carpenter, all sorts of hardworking Englishmen, are taxed \$200 or \$300 a year, and the money goes to pay the huge pension of some ducal loafer who is already too rich. Charles II, for instance, granted an eternal pension of \$95,000 a year to the Duke of Richmond and Gordon. In all the years since Charles II's time that pension has been paid out of the taxpayers' pockets. To this day it is paid. The present Duke of Richmond and Gordon settles for his dinners at the Ritz in London or at Ciro's in Monte Carlo with money earned by English butchers, bricklayers and blacksmiths.—Baltimore Sun.

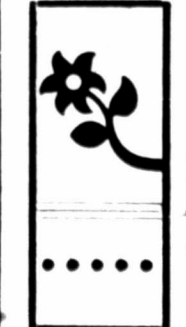

# Portales Times Commencement Exercises of Portales High School

BY G. V. JOHNSON.

## Farmographs

Professor L. R. Taft, horticulturist of the state horticultural college, pronounces the so called Spencer seedless apple a fake, pure and simple, and warns the farmers to let it severely alone. The claims made in its behalf are not sustained, says Professor Taft, as to size, color, texture of freedom from the codling moth.

The agricultural outlook for this part of New Mexico at the present time is simply splendid. The ground is now in fine condition for planting and the farmers generally are putting out large fields of corn, maize and kafir. If nothing happens we will have a bountiful harvest in Roosevelt county this fall. The farmers will have plenty of feed and products to market.

That we may appreciate the buggy condition of Southern Kansas, the Arkansas City Traveler relates that on the road coming to town, one morning a few days ago, Mr. Clark encountered two swarms of green bug containing millions of insects. In passing through them he was forced to hold his head down and was hardly able to breathe without considerable trouble. The horses, when they went into the swarms, shook their heads, coughed and otherwise made it apparent that they were being troubled not a little by the bugs. Mr. Clark thought the bugs were migrating.

Dry farming has been practiced in the vicinity of Las Vegas for several years. In the "Dry Farming" bulletin, recently published by the New Mexico experiment station, Mr. J. A. Baca says: "I have grown crops of oats without irrigation for ten years, with only one failure, that during the season of 1904. For only two of the years have I cut as little as one-half of a crop, with a good crop for the other seven years. In 1906 I threshed 40 bushels per acre. I believe that good crops can be grown by dry farming every year if proper cultivation is given. Will plow in the fall hereafter so as to store moisture."

A farmer writing from a part of Colorado in which the climatic and soil conditions are similar to Roosevelt county, says that fruit trees do well there with moderate irrigation, and that one good well with a good wind mill will irrigate ten acres of orchard. That will be the cheapest form of irrigation one could get. With this fact in mind and the example of fruit raised in the Pecos Valley under irrigation, it makes us feel jubilant over the fruit prospects of Roosevelt county because there will soon be a wind mill on every farm in the county. The only question in our mind is whether the wind mill will be needed in this county to raise the fruit—we hardly think it will.

Kafir corn, milo maize and sorghum are the cheapest and best feed for hogs that can be produced in Northeastern New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle, and why it is that our farmers do not plant more of these and feed more hogs is a question that the farmers must answer for themselves, as the editor of the News is up a stump for a reason. Hogs are always in demand and must always be until home consumption is supplied, and then an export trade may be tried for the surplus. There is no need of trying to farm in this country without stock in connection and, if the general demand for a money crop were answered by turning the hogs into money, it may help in the solution of the money crop problem.—Tucumcari News.

Professor Tinsley of the New Mexico College of Agriculture, who has been lately making a tour of New Mexico with a view of investigating soils and progress of the farming industry, expresses himself as astonished by the marvelous growth and development of farming in practically every part of the Territory. Even though farming has always been the principal industry of New Mexico, yet the results produced in the past are as nothing compared with what is being done at the present. The people of the Territory are beginning to realize that not nearly as much water is needed to raise crops as was thought necessary. This lesson is being taught them by the new comers

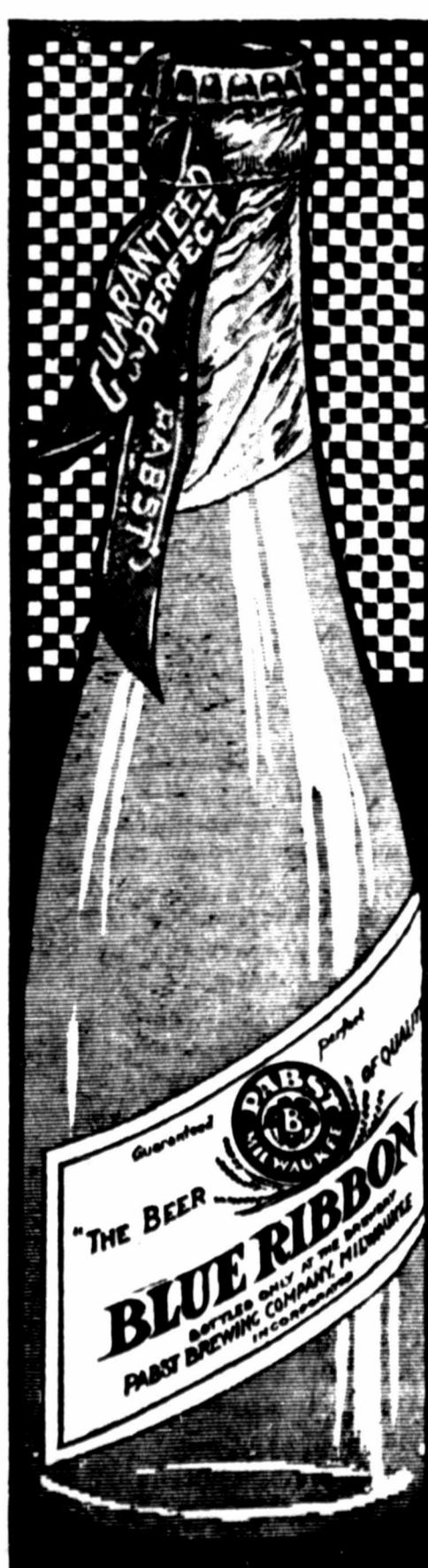

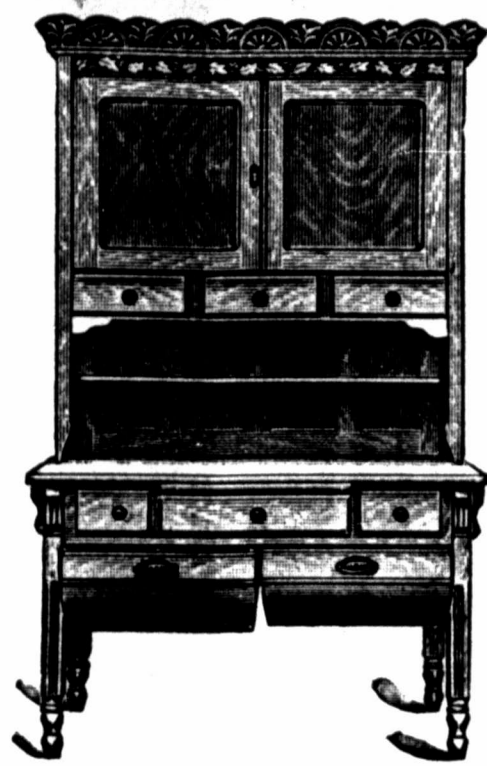
