### JULY FOURTH AT PORTALES

A Grand Celebration is Being Arranged

Free Barbecue of Thirty-Five Bees and a Balloon Ascension

The business men of Portales met Monday night, pursuant to a call, to discuss the advisability of holding a Fourth of July celebration. Charles Woodcock called the meeting to order and placed George L. Reese in nomination for chairman and Mr. Reese was unanimously selected; H. B. Ryther was elected secretary. The chairman stated the object of the meeting and, after more or less discussion, it was decided to celebrate. Committees were appointed as follows:

On Finance—Chas. Woodcock, J. B. Priddy, S. A. Morrison, Dr. J. S. Pearce and F. W. Swift.

On Entertainment—C. V. Harris, Coe Howard, Keet W. Jones, J. R. Hopper and J. P. Stone.

On Grounds—J. A. Fairly, Inda Humphrey, Joseph Boggs, D. Hardy and W. L. McLaughlin.

On Bees—B. J. Reagan, Bryan Trammell and Joe Howard.

It was decided to have a barbecue and balloon ascension. The meeting then adjourned until Tuesday night.

Tuesday night the Finance committee reported that over \$500.00 had been collected in cash and some more promised that had not been as yet collected. It was then decided that sufficient encouragement had been met with to warrant the different committees in arranging and elaborating their plans for the biggest celebration ever pulled off in the Pecos Valley.

It was decided to have the barbecue on the school grounds, where there are three car loads of lumber which can be used for making shade and pavillions.

The balloon will go up from the north west part of town at or near six o'clock.

At the time of going to press the

question of fireworks had not been definitely decided, but it is thought that sufficient funds will be raised to have an elaborate pyrotechnic display at night.

The entertainment committee have not completed their program, but as soon as possible it will be finished and published.

The different committees have worked diligently and successfully and through their efforts, Portales will greet, with a warm reception, all her friends and visitors, and invites one and all to meet and partake freely of her hospitality.

J. B. Priddy has begun the preliminary arrangements toward organizing a military company at Portales. Mr. Priddy has had a large experience in military matters, both in the state guards and the volunteers, during the Spanish-American war. A good military company at this place would be a good thing and the Times wishes Mr. Priddy success in this matter.

The celebrated Orchard confession is the most disgusting pipe dream ever given publicity.

An Arkansas prosecuting attorney, while driving out to a country school house to prosecute a "boot legger" last Friday, was taken from his buggy and severely whipped by six masked men.

The state of Texas has taken the bull by the horns and rendered a verdict in court, fining the Waters-Pierce Oil company \$1,623,900 and cancelled the permit of the company to do business in the state. Score one for Texas.

The laws enacted by the Thirty-seventh Legislative Assembly have been printed and some of the copies have already been distributed by the Secretary of the Territory. One hundred and seven chapters, each containing a different law, are the result of the session.

Acting Governor J. W. Reynolds has appointed Oscar C. Snow, of Las Cruces, as a member of the Territorial Board of Water Commissioners to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of J. J. Hagerman, of Roswell, father of ex-Governor Hagerman. Mr. Hagerman declined to serve upon the retirement of his son as executive of the Territory.—New Mexican.

The two women who were convicted of murder in the first degree in the district court of Sierra county and sentenced to death by hanging, on June 7th, had their sentences commuted to life imprisonment by Acting Governor Reynolds. This action of the governor seems to meet with general approval. The women are both in their teens and both very ignorant. The names of the women are Mrs. Valentia Madrid and Miss Alma Lyons and they were convicted of the murder of the former's husband by putting rat poison in his coffee. They were taken to the penitentiary at Santa Fe last Saturday, where they are to spend the balance of their lives.

The poor old Portales Herald, in the hands of about the seventh different manager since the first of the year, made a grand stand spiel last week to the effect that "her present captain and family is here to stay." Notwithstanding, a new captain has stepped into the toils this week and the end is not yet. Evidently the term "carpet bagger," used by the Herald, applies very well to the management of that paper. The series of managers of the Herald, since the hopeless incumbency of Mr. Hornbeck, has caused the paper to go from bad to worse, and some of these managers have had past records which they were here to get away from. The failure of the Herald to secure support can only be laid to the character of the men who have been at the helm.

## DISLIKES NEW MEXICO.

"All is not gold that glitters, and a great many who left this section of the country to take up homesteads in New Mexico wish that they were back in Texas and the Indian Territory." This remark was made by Deputy United States Marshal A. J. Chapman, who has just returned from a business trip to New Mexico, where he went to fence his quarter section of land.

"It looks more like starvation than anything else in that section of the country, and people who left in and around Ardmore are wishing to be back. The country is dry west of Kansas and the weather is disagreeably cold. The few who left here with stock have lost their horses and mules and have spent about all the money they carried with them.

"The stock is dying off from lack of acclimation, and what few that are not dead are not eating and are virtually dead, being unfit for work. I never saw as gloomy a prospect in my life. You will find men breaking up land with jennets, cows, yearlings or anything that can possibly pull a plow.

"Instead of an egress to New Mexico as was last year from this section of the country you will find an ingress from that section to this section.

"Not only are the farmers blue, but the cattlemen are down in the mouth as well, as cattle are dying off in great numbers on account of the shortage of grass. The grass this season is the shortest that it has ever been and cattlemen are the sufferers.

"I found a number of people who lived in Ardmore and moved out there that want to come back. Labor is scarce and cheap, as a number of settlers are hunting work so as to be able to improve their claims.

"The Indian Territory is good enough for me just now"—Ardmoreite, Ardmore, Indian Territory.

The above lie has absolutely nothing to recommend it; it is not even an ingenuous falsehood, and must have originated in a very diminutive and weak intellect; an intellect thoroughly impregnated with the idea of its own profundity, and one incapable of seeing any good outside of his own personality. Generally speaking, United States marshals in the Indian territory have never been noted for their morality, integrity or veracity, but this is the first really malicious, willful, hopelessly idiotic damphool fabrication we have ever been able to trace to their door. The signer of this spiel was not invited to New Mexico and no tears will be shed should he fail to return. If he is a fair sample of the citizenship of Ardmore and vicinity, then it is devoutly to be hoped that he will not prove fickle to his first love, the home of the "dusky princess," where to be honest is to be lonesome, to be high toned is to be a half-breed and to be popular is to be a "squaw man." New Mexico has never before entered upon a more promising or prosperous year than the present. The grass is uncommonly good and crop prospects better than ever before. There is scarcely a cow brute on the range that is not marketable for butcher stuff. Roosevelt county has not lost ten head of horses or mules from any cause other than sale or shipment since last fall, and there has been no "die up" whatever on the range. All those people from the Indian Territory who are here are satisfied and say that they are in a better country, better climate and among better people than they left in coming here. The exodus from the Indian Territory must be something alarming when they are reduced to such heroic measures to stop the out-pouring from their gates of the best and worthiest of their citizens.

An erroneous impression exists in many sections of the Territory to the effect that Captain Curry will arrive in the Capital about the middle of July to be inaugurated as Governor of New Mexico. It is well to correct this at once. The latest and best information is that Captain Curry will not reach New Mexico until about August 20 or September 1. Circumstances and the press of important official duties in the Philippine Islands prevent his earlier arrival. In the meantime the local committee has commenced active work to make the inauguration ceremonies one of the grandest celebrations ever in this Territory if not the greatest and the most cordial one. The committee will do its level best in this line and it asks the co-operation of the good citizens from every section of the Territory in its laudable and proper undertaking.—New Mexican.

They killed some small game and, in their excitement and hilarity, disturbed the peaceful rest and slumbers of a beautiful specimen of young antelope. These Kansas men, having been informed that it was a violation of law to kill or injure one of these animals and of the penalty for such an offense, thought it best for their gups to remain silent.

But two of these gentlemen, whom, to prevent personality, we shall call the Fat and the Lean, having unbounded confidence in their speed and endurance, acting upon the impulse of the moment, started in pursuit of the swiftest quadruped that roams the plains of New Mexico. The start was decidedly in favor of the Lean man, but after following the antelope a distance of perhaps a quarter of a mile, he was passed by the Fat man. After this, the Lean retired from the race and gazed with mixed pleasure and disgust at his corpulent contestant while he sped through the breezes for a distance of perhaps another quarter of a mile, when they returned to the starting point. The Lean said he never would run another antelope, while the Fat said it might be against the law to catch as well as to kill the beast. Of course, there was no judge's stand, amphitheater or speed ring, but the few who were fortunate enough to be present say that it was a speed contest between the Fat and the Lean, in which the Fat was decidedly victorious.

When this party reached the Pecos river, not having had much experience with boggy streams, it was easy for the driver to lead them to believe that it was not safe to cross said stream in his vehicle, so they all, with the exception of the Fat man, proceeded to wade. Their long wade in the sandy stream thoroughly cleansed their feet, but the cattlemen claim their cattle would not drink below the crossing for three days afterward.

**Farmers Meeting at Elida.**

From Elida News.  
Below we print the proceedings of the farmers of the vicinity of Elida in mass meeting, assembled at the school house in Elida, Saturday, May 25, 1907. The object of the meeting was to consider the propriety of raising funds to test the herd law, or rather the so called herd law, which is in much dispute in the territory.

The house was called to order by J. E. White and upon motion the house resolved itself into a permanent organization with J. E. White as chairman, and Henry J. Anderson, secretary. The chair then proceeded to announce the business to come before the assembly and briefly detailed the circumstances under which certain farmers of this community had impounded cattle for trespassing upon their fenced fields and the reason for three replevin suits having been instituted against J. W. Denney, J. P., precinct No. 2, who had taken possession of the cattle upon the complaint of the above named farmers, after which a motion was made and carried that the farmers of Elida and vicinity in mass meeting assembled resolve to raise sufficient funds with which to defend these suits into the highest courts of the land and thereby be made familiar with their rights under the laws of the territory and United States relative to the trespassing of cattle upon cultivated fields which are unfenced.

The chair was then empowered to appoint solicitors in the various communities to raise the necessary funds. Those appointed were as follows, viz: north and northwest Hawkeye, Ed Miller and Fred Peebler; north of Elida, Jim Clark and D. M. Dull; Liston neighborhood, Mr. Shook; northeast of Elida, J. C. Fraser; east, J. D. Pendleton and J. W. Johnston; southeast, Fred Steig and Mr. Newcomb; Redlake, C. C. Price; south, John Luster and D. Osborn; southwest, M. C. Swinney and Attis Morgan; northwest, William Beard. And upon motion the house

selected J. W. Denney as solicitor for the town of Elida.

The chair was then authorized to appoint a finance committee of three, of which he should be chairman, and this committee is to receive all funds collected by the solicitors. The committee consists of J. E. White, J. A. Lane and M. B. McClain. J. E. White was made treasurer of the committee.

A motion was carried that the assembly request, through its secretary, that the proceedings of the meeting be published in the Portales Times and the Elida News. The secretary was also instructed to send Judge C. M. Compton, of Portales, a copy of the proceedings and ask his influence in soliciting the funds for the above mentioned purposes.

Meeting was then adjourned subject to call of the chairman.
