A New County Commissioner.

G. W. Carr has been appointed county commissioner of this county, to succeed J. B. Crawford, who has resigned.

J. B. Crawford has been chairman of the board and is one of the best men in the county. He says that owing to the rapid progression of the county, the duties of chairman of the board has become so extensive that to properly look after the duties of the office, it conflicts with his own business. Therefore, he sent in his resignation to the governor of the territory, and upon good and sufficient recommendations, Acting Governor Reynolds appointed G. W. Carr as his successor.

G. W. Carr is manager of the Portales Lumber company and is a worthy successor of Mr. Crawford. No one else could have been found who has better qualifications and in whom the people has more confidence than Mr. Carr for this important office.

Having a member of the board living here in Portales will be an advantage as he will be here all the time to look after any business that needs attention between sessions. Mr. Carr will take his office as soon as his bond of \$5,000 is made out and accepted.

The board will meet next Monday, elect a new chairman and transact other business.

The rain which came Sunday night and Monday was a soaker and came just when it was needed. Between two and three inches of water fell here at Portales and in some parts of the county more. The rain was followed by cloudy weather, which allowed the crops to get the best possible advantage of the water. If the late summer rains come on, as they usually do in this country, we will have a banner crop. Evidently, Roosevelt county is again going to prove itself a great producer of agricultural products.
