Tax Roll Being Made Out.

County Assessor J. E. Morrison has had a force of men at work the last three weeks making the assessment roll. The first of this week he put on a second set of men, one set working during the day and the other at night. He was thrown behind with the work on account of the school district levies. The levies for about forty or fifty of the country districts had not been reported till last week, and as part of the assessment had already been spread on the rolls, this made it necessary to do a lot of the work over.

The roll is being made in duplicate. One copy is for the use of the county treasurer and the other is to be sent to Santa Fe. Mr. Morrison is being assisted in the work by John Ballow, W. F. English, W. E. Marsh, M. F. Parker and T. J. Taylor.

Movement for Incorporation.

The movement to incorporate the town of Portales has reached the stage where the census of the town is being taken. The petitions praying for incorporation were duly presented to the county commissioners last week and \$100 was raised by the petitioners and deposited with the county to pay the expense of having a census taken and other necessary expenses as required by law. The commissioners then ordered the sheriff to take a census of the town.

Sheriff Lang appointed Flue Anderson, of near Bethel, and G. I. Poindexter, of near Carter, to make the enumeration of the citizens of Portales. In this census only citizens who have lived here six months or more are being taken and owing to this fact,

it will not show the complete population of the town by considerable. Later:—The result of the enumeration is 675.

Roy Smith Gets Scholarship.

Under the act passed by the last Territorial Legislature, making an appropriation to pay the expense of one student from each county to attend one of the territorial institutions of learning, the commissioners at their meeting last week, appointed Roy Smith as the lucky boy to secure this special advantage from Roosevelt county.

Roy Smith is the son of Mrs. Maude Smith, a widow, and lives in Portales. He is fifteen years old, a bright young man and a very worthy boy. All things considered, the commissioners made a very wise appointment. He had the choice of attending any one of the territorial schools he wished and he chose the Territorial University at Albuquerque. The university begins on August 19th and he left Friday for Albuquerque. He was given a farewell party by his young friends Thursday night.

The provision under which his appointment is made gives him free tuition, \$200 per year for pens and continues four years.

A Foul Murder Committed at Roswell

The body of Leland S. Terhune was found buried in an irrigation ditch, on a farm near Roswell, last week. The discovery was the result of a search which followed the mysterious disappearance of the man, and finding of blood in a wagon.

Upon removing the body from the ground, it was found to have had the head mashed, one eye being entirely mashed out. It had been buried four feet in a ditch and the water turned on. Afterward the water was turned out of the ditch and then the dirt settled in the grave, leaving a hole that led to the discovery of the body.

The dead man was twenty-four years old and leaves a wife and one child. He and Moses L. Lewis were farming in partnership on the Bowman and Bud Wilson farms, near Orchard Park.

Owing to suspicious circumstances Lewis was arrested for the crime and placed in jail. Later he confessed that he had committed the deed.

"It was a clever ruse," says the Roswell Record, "that brought out the confession. The murdered man's widow was brought to Lewis' cell, bound in hand cuffs and in the custody of the officers. With tears streaming down her face, she begged him to tell the story of the killing, that she might not be implicated and that she might be freed to return to her baby. At sight of the woman in this pitiable condition, Lewis broke down completely and made a plain statement that he killed Terhune in a heat of passion and that the woman had nothing to do with it. Her arrest had been a mock affair merely for the purpose of making

her act her part the better."

According to Lewis' story, he and Terhune had gathered a load of vegetables they had raised in partnership, when they became involved in a quarrel over Terhune's wife. Lewis says Terhune spoke disrespectfully of his own wife, and in a heat of passion that followed, Lewis hit Terhune over the head with a spade, crushing his skull. It seems that Lewis was very fond of Terhune's wife.

Lewis then hauled the body to an irrigation ditch, buried it four feet beneath the bottom and turned on the water. Terhune's throat was cut and Lewis admits having done this about half way between the scene of the crime and the grave, on account of Terhune showing signs of returning to life. When this story was told there was some talk of lynching.

Synopsis of the Game Law

Following is a synopsis of the game laws of the Territory of New Mexico, as amended by the 37th Legislative Assembly and in force from and after March 21st, 1907:

OPEN SEASON FOR GAME.

Deer with horns, with gun only; October 15th to November 30th of each year. Limit, one deer; penalty, \$100 fine and 60 days imprisonment.

Elk, mountain sheep, beaver, ptarmigan; killing, capturing or injuring prohibited at all times, penalty, \$500 fine and 90 days imprisonment.

Antelope, pheasant, Bob White quail, wild pigeon; protected until March 13, 1910. Penalty, \$100 fine and 60 days imprisonment.

Turtle dove, with gun only; July 15 to May 1 of each year. Penalty, \$100 fine and 60 days imprisonment.

Wild turkey, mountain grouse, prairie chicken, with gun only; October, November and December of each year. Penalty, \$100 fine and 60 days imprisonment.

Quail (native or crested), with gun only; November, December

and January of each year. Penalty, \$100 fine and 60 days imprisonment.

Song and insectivorous birds, killing or injury prohibited. Penalty, \$50 fine and 30 days imprisonment.

Miss Adelia Nichols Married

Miss Adelia Nichols, of Texico, who was here a short time in charge of the Herald, was recently married, an account of which is given by the Texico Democrat, as follows:

"Dr. J. T. Webb and Miss Adelia Nichols, of Texico, were married at Fort Worth last Monday morning. The wedding was no surprise to their friends here, who have been expecting that it would take place most any time. Miss Nichols left here a month ago to spend a few weeks in Colorado, where she was supposed to be until the news of her marriage was received. Dr. Webb left Texico the latter part of the week and went to Fort Worth, where he was joined by Miss Nichols. They were married at the depot and left immediately for Cisco, Texas, their future home.

A Very Unique Well

One of the most unique wells in the history of irrigation is being excavated by Sylvestre Spore, a prominent land owner living three miles east of Estancia, New Mexico. Spore, by the use of teams and scrapers, and later by hand work, has excavated a well forty by eighty feet in width and length and twenty feet deep, which brings him to the first strata of water which underlies the country around Estancia. This of itself would supply him with a fine supply of water for irrigation, but he intends to dig and drill down still further, through the sixty foot and down to the 125 foot level of water.

The water from these immense underground reservoirs will come within about twelve feet of the top of the reservoir well and will be lifted to the surface by gasoline pumps. Spore, who owns over 800 acres of land in a body, not only expects to be able to irrigate his own land in this way at a minimum of cost but will supply water to neighbor farmers.

Work Going On at Clovis

From Clovis News.

The construction gang for the depot arrived last week and work on the large two story, concrete depot was begun Monday. It is said that this will not be completed before the latter part of September. The next in line in the way of improvements will be the magnificent \$60,000 Harvey House, on the construction of which bids are now being considered. Messrs. Carter and Curtis, who built the round house, have been asked to submit a bid, and it is possible that they will secure the contract.

Did You See the Comet?

Scrap Over a Claim at Texico

Robert Fox versus Hattie McClain was the title of a case called before Judge Sam Alford Wednesday afternoon, and the cause of action was assault with a deadly weapon with the intent to kill by shooting, and the circumstances as given under oath, were as herein follows:

Last February, Fox deposed, he bought a claim thirteen miles north of town, and then returned to his home. August first he visited his claim, fully expecting to see same had been jumped by some enterprising homeseeker, but seeing no one around he commenced making arrangements to improve. He was having lumber hauled to the place when Martin McClain, brother of the defendant, appeared upon the scene and questioned his (Fox's) right to proceed with said improvements, averring that he had bought the property. Few words passed between them, and on being told that he might recover by law, McClain left Fox in complete control, and he (Fox) thought the matter was there ended.

The following Sunday however, as Fox was preparing a tooth-

some bite for breakfast over his camp fire, the defendant, Miss Hattie, put in an appearance and questioned Fox's rights to the property. Fox went on preparing his breakfast, ignoring the lady's presence, when she caught sight of Fox's Winchester laying on the ground and asked, "Is this thing loaded?" Fox, with his back turned to her, answered modestly, "Well, it was the last time I examined it," and when he turned round he found himself peeping into the barrel of his own weapon and heard the lady sweetly sing, "Approach and I'll blow a hole in you." He told her to "Shoot and get through with it." She accepted the invitation and blazed away, striking nothing but thin, thin air at an altitude of some 3,600 feet. He immediately ran toward her and grappled for possession of the fire arm, in which he was the successful candidate.

No witnesses were called and Hattie McClain denied his statement in toto and swore Fox shot at her. Attorney Weatherby defended, and the case was dismissed for lack of corroborative evidence.

Thirdly. That the boards of education be asked to provide our schools with better and purer water and to enforce better sanitary conditions.

And further, That we extend our heartfelt thanks to those who have so pleasantly entertained us with talks, recitals and singing.

An invitation has been sent out to all the editors and newspaper workers in this part of the territory to meet at Roswell, on August 21, to organize the Pecos Valley Press Association. The Bar Association will meet at Roswell on the same date.

Portales is growing right along and business is improving. There are two new brick business houses in course of construction and many residences. Portales has many advantages which insure that it always will be one of the best towns in southeastern New Mexico.

The United States is now in the throes of one of the biggest strikes among telegraph operators ever known in this country. It started last week in California and has extended to all the big cities, practically putting a stop to all commercial telegraphing. The daily newspapers have felt the effects of the strike severely, as they have not been able to get their news dispatches.

Attorney General Bonaparte indirectly threatens to jail a few criminal trust magnates in addition to the fines imposed for law violations. This is excellent weather to incarcerate some of the trade highwaymen, and about sixty days in a stuffy jail might recall to their minds the long forgotten Golden Rule and several of the Ten Commandments. Try it, Mr. Attorney General.

Captain George Curry was duly inaugurated governor of New Mexico, at Santa Fe, last Thursday. The oath of office was administered by Chief Justice William J. Mills, of the Territorial Supreme Court, in the presence of a mammoth gathering of people, many coming from different parts of the territory. The address of welcome was delivered by Judge A. B. Fall, of Otero county. Governor Curry was given the glad hand by all New Mexico, as the people have great confidence in him. He is well known by the old residents of the territory and they all say he is a level headed man and will make good. We believe that he will make us a good governor.

As to Governor Curry's plans for the government of this territory, so far, he has little to say. He says he will endeavor to give New Mexico a good, clean administration and carry out the wishes of President Roosevelt. As to appointments he said he would make but few, at least, very soon. It has been rumored that he would appoint Nathan Jaffa, of Roswell, to succeed J. W. Reynolds, secretary of the territory. Also, that A. B. Fall, of Las Cruces, would be appointed attorney general, to succeed George W. Pritchard, who was appointed temporarily by Acting Governor Reynolds. Louis O. Fullen, attorney and postmaster at Carlsbad, will likely succeed J. M. Hervey as district attorney of the Fifth judicial district, as Mr. Hervey is in bad health.

GOVERNOR CURRY'S INAUGURAL SPEECH.

The speech made by Governor George Curry, at the inauguration ceremonies at Santa Fe, last Thursday, was, in part, as follows:

"Twenty-seven years ago I came to the Territory of New Mexico. I have had my ups and downs. Financially they have usually been downs. I have been honored by my fellow citizens with some of the most important offices in the gift of the people of New Mexico. I tried to fulfill them all to the very best of my ability. As a criminal officer I did everything I could to establish law and order in the county which I was sheriff of. And as a member of the New Mexico Legislature I voted for economy. I voted against every unnecessary appropriation and I never accepted a position while I was in that Legislature from the Governor, nor any recompense except that I could return to my constituents and feel as though I had performed that duty to the very best of my ability.

"Nine years ago last April I marched away from your beautiful city with 400 other citizens of New Mexico to fight the battles of our country. But after Colonel Wood and Lieutenant Colonel Roosevelt, then, sized us up they concluded that I would make a better horse herder than a scrapper. So during the Spanish-American war I was left at Tampa to fight flies, and my friend Muller, my friend Llewellyn and my honored friend who gave up his life for his country in the Philippine Islands, went to the front, together with 300 other New Mexicans and reflected credit upon themselves and the country that sent them there. It was always one of the few things that I had against Colonel Roosevelt and Colonel Wood that I was compelled to remain at Tampa while my other friends went to the front. I think it was on that account that I accepted a commission in a subordinate capacity to go to the Philippine Islands. I felt as though I should have a little San Juan Hill of my own. I went to the islands with my regiment expecting to return with it. But while still in the service I was detailed by the then military governor, General MacArthur, as the military governor of a large province. When my time in the army expired Colonel Roosevelt wired to me, offering to secure for me a commission in the United States army. I declined that commission, but accepted the civil government of the City of Manila.

"All I want to say is that I am not at all ashamed of the record that I made in the Philippine Islands, and that when I left there I had the good will of the people, and feel as though I did my share of the duty that the American people are all trying to do in benefitting the Philippine people. No one on earth was more surprised than I was when I received a telegram from the President of the United States, asking me if I would accept the governorship of the Territory of New Mexico. It came as a complete surprise. I wired back that I could not accept it at that time, as the mission that had been given me in the Philippine Islands was not finished, and I wrote to the President and stated that while I intended to return to New

Mexico and felt highly complimented by the offer of this position, I doubted very much my ability to fill it, and I would prefer, if he possibly could, he would select some one else, but the President insisted on my accepting the appointment, and I did.

"I want to be very brief, and say that as long as I am Governor of New Mexico, I will carry out the policy of Theodore Roosevelt and give the administration the most loyal support that I possibly can. That I will do everything that I possibly can do to promote the interests of the Territory of New Mexico, and the proudest ambition of my life will be to be the last Governor of the Territory of New Mexico, and that my term will be shorter than Governor Hagerman's.

"I am on the Territory question like my friend Governor Taylor was on the financial question. He had been away on a lecture tour, and one of the charges against him was that he was not a strong enough silver man. So, in his opening speech, he stated that he had not been able to give much time to the study of the financial question, but briefly his position was that he was in favor of the free and unlimited coinage of silver at the ratio of sixteen to one or any other ratio that the people would take it; that he was in favor of gold, in favor of national banks, state banks, and if that wasn't money enough, he was in favor of a little right good counterfeit. He believed that his creditors would take counterfeit. So I believe I am in about the same position as Governor Taylor. I am in favor of Statehood for New Mexico, joint statehood if we can't get any other, but I believe if we will all get together and settle our little differences without annoying the President and the other friends at Washington by the little formalities that we ought to settle for ourselves and go back to that great man Theodore Roosevelt and say to him: We accepted your policy before; the people of New Mexico were not a year ago and are not today in favor of joint statehood, they never were in favor of it, but we voted for joint statehood because it was your policy; now Arizona, by almost an unanimous vote, refused to become a part of the State of Arizona with us. Now, it is not just to punish us. I believe that that just man will say in his message to Congress: 'The people of New Mexico are entitled to single statehood.' And I will go to Washington at any time and assist the delegate in securing the passage of that bill."

Much Care Taken in the Drilling of Cavalry Horses.

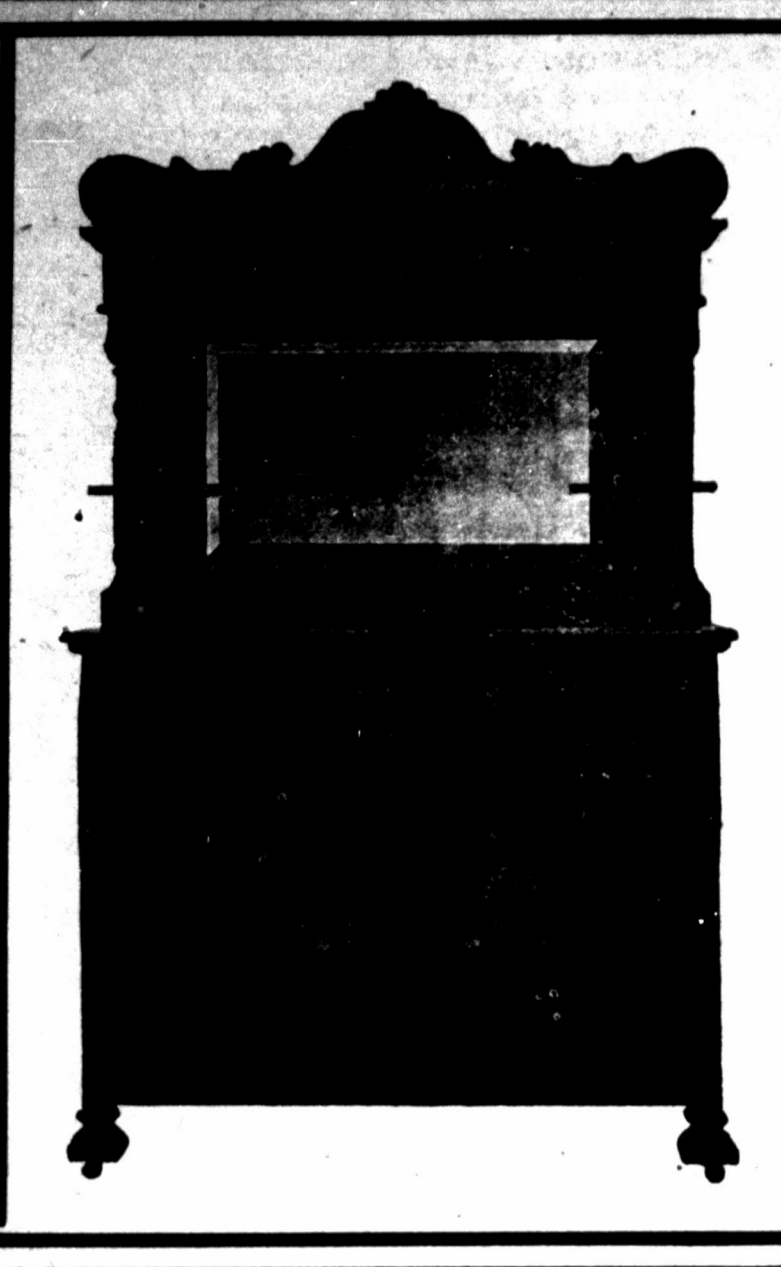
