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A Cotton Gin Needed.

The proposition to put up a cotton gin in Portales is something that ought to be pushed by all means. There is considerable cotton in the country and it is doing fine. A man living fourteen miles west of town had two stalks of cotton here last Saturday that showed up remarkably well, and those experienced in raising cotton said it was good for half a bale to the acre. The man who had the cotton reported that there was about one hundred acres in his neighborhood. There is also reported to be considerable out about Carter and more or less in all parts of the country.

That a gin be established here is a crying necessity. C. W. Morris, who has a feed mill in town, has made a proposition to put up one. Owing to the great expense of buying the plant and to the fact that the amount of cotton here is not sufficient to make it remunerative this year, he expects some financial assistance. He asks that the town raise \$350 to help him stand the expense of putting in the gin. We believe the town can raise this amount and it ought to be attended to at once.

The machinery for the gin will have to be shipped from Birmingham, Alabama. Mr. Morris already has an engine that can be used to run the gin. He proposes to buy a sixty saw gin and a press. This will cost \$350 in Birmingham, Alabama. Then he will have to buy a lot of belting, pulleys, shafts, etc. In order to get the machinery here and set up and put in operation in time to handle the cotton by the time it is ready, it will have to be ordered very soon.

Eleven Year Old Boy a Suicide.

One of the youngest cases of premeditated self-destruction on record is that of Lowell Cooley, the eleven year old son of E. P. Cooley, an engineer on the Pecos Valley railroad, who shot and killed himself at the family home at Roswell, August 15.

The boy had been called before Police Judge Metner about a month ago for disorderly conduct, and last Wednesday had been arrested again for stealing \$10 from a bicycle shop. He had been released to appear the following

morning before the judge with his father.

The boy went home and began brooding over the affair. He did not expect his father and stepmother would help him out of his trouble, as he complained to the judge that his home was not happy, and it is believed that his boyish mind could see no way out of the affair but by death.

CONSTITUTION OF ASSOCIATION.

We, the teachers of Roosevelt county, for the purpose of promoting unity among the teachers, increasing our professional ability, advancing the cause of education in our country and arousing interest among the people a greater interest in school work, establish this constitution.

ARTICLE I.

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Roosevelt County Teachers' Association.

Section 2. The membership will consist of the county superintendent and teachers of the county.

ARTICLE II.

This association shall assemble four times during each school year. On the second Friday and Saturday of October, December, February and April, at such places as shall be selected by vote of majority of members present at the meeting. Any number of members present at a regular session of the association shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE III.

Section 1. The officers of this association shall be as follows: President, vice president, secretary, assistant secretary, treasurer and chaplain.

Section 2. The tenure of each of these offices shall be for one year.

ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the association and appoint all committees.

Section 2. Vice president shall perform the duties of president in his absence.

Section 3. The secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of each meeting of the association and provide each member of the association with a copy of the program.

Section 4. Assistant secretary shall perform the duties of secretary in his absence.

Section 5. The treasurer shall receive and disburse all funds of the association and keep a record of same.

Section 6. The chaplain shall arrange for the devotional exercises of each meeting.

There shall be a program committee whose duty it shall be to prepare programs for each session of the year for which they are appointed.

Three brick business houses are being built in Portales.

The Texico Trumpet, the popular paper at Texico, started a daily edition last week. We wish it success.

The appointments of Nathan Jaffa, as Territorial Secretary, and A. B. Fall, as Attorney General, have been made by Governor Curry. These are pronounced by the press of the territory as good appointments.

The Pecos Valley is to be advertised by a moving picture machine, showing views on a canvas fifty feet square. Citizens of the central states will see pictures of men irrigating, cultivating and harvesting crops and gathering and packing fruit that will be almost as perfect as would the actual scenes on the ground. It is believed that it will prove the most effectual advertising yet done by the valley. The expense is to be borne out of funds subscribed by citizens of Roswell and other towns in the Pecos Valley.

The editors of the Pecos Valley met at Roswell, Wednesday, and organized the Pecos Valley Press Association. There were gathered there about twenty editors and newspaper workers, and a splendid meeting was held. Will Robinson, of the Roswell Register-Tribune, was elected president, and J. D. Wheelan, of the Artesia Advocate, was elected secretary. The next meeting will be held at Artesia, next summer, and it is contemplated that the editors will take an excursion at that time. The Territorial Bar Association met at Roswell at the same time and both the lawyers and editors were entertained Wednesday evening by Judge Pope in grand style. The representation from Portales to the Bar Association was Sam J. Nixon, and to the Editorial Association was Mr. and Mrs. Codrington, of the Herald, and G. V. Johnson, editor of the Times.

The people of Arizona are worrying over the governor problem almost as much as have the people of New Mexico. It is rumored that Governor Kibby will be replaced this month by some good republican who believes in joint statehood. If the territories could only be made states, or a state, there would be no more trouble about a governor serving out his term. Few Arizona governors have served the full four years, while in New Mexico it has been the rule for the governors to serve out their full terms, and Governor Otero served two of them. The record was broken by the dismissal of Hagerman, who had served but a little over a year, and the chances are that for the next few years if the men who are appointed governor in this territory do serve out their terms it will be because sufficient influence cannot be brought to bear to secure their removal.—Western Liberal.

THE MAN OF THE HOUR.

The endorsement by the Republican organization of Ohio of the candidacy of Secretary of War William H. Taft for the presidency, is of far reaching importance, for after all, the dominant political organization in each state is a power in which is concentrated the political ideal of the masses and through which it finds its expression. The endorsement by Ohio republicans of their favorite son for the highest office in the gift of the people is not a mere nominal expression but opens the presidential campaign in earnest. It will arouse much more comment than did the endorsement of Pennsylvania of Senator Knox, or than will be endorsement of Fairbanks by Indiana, or of Cannon by Illinois, for a peculiar fight has been made upon Secretary Taft in his own state, the outcome of which in his favor greatly clarifies the political atmosphere and gives him a great advantage in the presidential race.

It is of some consequence therefore to learn what matter of man is this who looms as the leading presidential possibility in 1908. In New Mexico, Secretary Taft is best known by Judge William H. Pope, of Roswell, who served in the Philippines as Judge of the First Instance, while Secretary Taft was head of Philippine Commission and therefore learned to know him more or less intimately. Judge Pope has repeatedly declared to friends in private conversation and before Secretary Taft was considered a presidential possibility, that in Taft the United States possesses a really great man, a man of marvelous industry, of the most unquestioned integrity; a man of the highest ideals and the broadest sympathies; a statesman of ability who towers head and shoulders above most of the other men whom the rapid crowding of events during the past decade has brought to the front.

This characterization of Secretary Taft is emphasized by two articles in the August Review of Reviews, in which it is said: "Mr. Taft is the very personification of energy. He is always busy. Work, and hard work, is his pleasure. He breathes good will and suggests mental, moral and physical wholesomeness. Yet, with all his pleasant informality and his frequent laughter, he has a dignity of manner and carriage that commands respect and attention. You feel that he is a man of brain power, one of the few men who seem to grow greater the more intimately you know them. He seems to take an interest in everybody he meets. He will go out of his way to avoid hurting the feelings of any of his fellow men; he does not like to inflict pain; but frequently, when it was to his personal and political advantage to be silent, he has spoken out, because silence would mean a misunderstanding of his attitude. He wanted everybody to know how he stood. Taft never bears malice. He hates a meddler. He will not tolerate a tattler.

There is no false dignity about him. Whatever he does, he does as part of the day's work, not hampered by any idea of his greatness. He is too busy to think about his own personality." That Secretary Taft possesses the "New England" conscience; that he has been a stern and fear-

less magistrate; that he is ready to acknowledge errors; that he believes in justice tempered by mercy, as the subheads of the article in question indicate, make him no less fitted to be president of the United States.—Santa Fe New Mexican.

AN ODD COMPARISON.

New Mexico contains 122,500 square miles. Among all the states and territories of this Union, there are only three larger than New Mexico. They are Texas, California and Montana. If New Mexico and Arizona were combined into one state it would still lack about thirty thousand square miles of being as large as Texas, but at that it would be too big for one state. New Mexico's population, according to the census of 1900, was 195,310. The same census gives the population of Nevada to be 42,335, still Nevada has been a state for 10, these many years.

Roosevelt county contains about three thousand square miles, being almost equal to the combined area of the states of Delaware and Rhode Island. While the population of Roosevelt county is probably about ten thousand, the population of the states of Delaware and Rhode Island is six hundred thousand.

**FARMERS' EDUCATIONAL
AND
CO-OPERATIVE UNION
OF AMERICA**

These are mighty hot and dry days
now, and it cannot be too strongly
impressed upon the minds of all who
have charge of any living things that
shade and water are absolutely essen-
tials of life, and their plentifulness
are essential to comfort and well-be-
ing.

Educate and co-operate are the ba-
sic words in the code of the Union
man. If you have a piece of knowl-
edge that others should know, go to
the Union and tell it; if you are losing
out in the race, ask of the successful
Union man, and don't be too stiff-
necked to take his advice, and then
pass it on to your neighbor.

If some of our Texas brethren could
drop in on some of the meetings that
are now being held in North Carolina,
they would be surprised at the in-
terest of the good old Tar Heels, who
have an idea that Texas is only a
home for the long-horn and the horn-
ed toad, and not the place for the
birth of the grandest and best order
that farmers have ever had.

The thing that is of primary im-
portance to the local Union is its own
harmony. This is apparent to the
thoughtful man, because it is from
things local that the major part of our
happiness and advantages in material
matters come. It is at the home that
all interests center, and the near
things to that center are of most vital
interest and value.

The extremely good results that
have come to many of the schools all
over the country from consolidating,
thus enabling the building of more
comfortable and comfortable houses
and the employment of more able
teachers, I shying the effect of mak-
ing friends to consolidation and to
the building of better roads, which is con-
comittant with the consolidation plan.

It is the business of the Union to
teach good farming in all that this
word means. It means good planting,
good seeds, proper laying off of the
crop, proper sorts of things to plant,
proper cultivation, harvesting, and
above all, the proper marketing. "For
what profiteth it a man if he maketh
a ho-ho-lot full of stuff, and the Philis-
tine gets it for a song." That is not
exactly according to the words of the
Scriptures, but it fits the case all the
same.

The fact is the Union has no eme-
lies, or at least mighty few. It is no
doubt true that there are some who
have sought for place or power and
have fallen down in their ambitions.
Some of these have little enough
sense and manhood to want to destroy
what they cannot control, but these
are few, and of comparatively little
influence. That man who has little
or no influence inside of the order will
have but little more outside of it.
Don't worry about that sort of people.

More and more we see the growing
need of some new land-holding system,
thousands upon thousands of acres of
land have been grabbed by specula-
tors and land-grabbers and held until
the settlement of adjoining lands have
made them vastly valuable, and then
sold at outrageous prices to men who
had to have land, the original owners
having done nothing to make them
valuable, and having gotten them
simply because they happened to get
there first. It is as true as that the
day follows the night that the land is
a gift of God to all His creatures, and
some day they are coming into their
own. Land and air and water are na-
ture's gifts to all her children, and to
all alike, and that one who hinders
her design is in imminent danger.

The Farmers' Union is not in polit-
ics, in the partisan sense, but it is
in politics all the time, in the sense
that it is the farmer who "pays the
freight," and is entitled to the deliv-
ery of the goods he pays for. It is the
business of the Union to see that he
does get the goods. The partisan vote
of the members of the Union is a
matter for each individual to settle for
himself, and is a matter that the Un-
ion will not meddle with.

Keep it in mind all the time that
the roads are made for the man in
the country. It makes no difference
who pays the money to the road build-
er for his work, the price ultimately
comes out of the farmer, the man who
most uses them. It is also well to re-
member that there is no better sign
of the right sort of a community than
to find a community working for good
roads.

It is well at all times to remember
that it is the local Union that is of
importance to you. You should be
personally present at every meeting
to see that there is the right sort of
business going on. You can send a
delegate to the State meetings to at-
tend to your business, but at the local
you must be there yourself, or else
either you or the local will suffer.
This is an easy proposition to see
through.

Anything that will add to the sum
of human benefit, is naturally a part
of the business of the Farmers Union,
and for this reason every good Union
man will be found, both as an individ-
ual and as a Union man, on the side
of the moral uplift. He is always
striving for the things that will mak
for the betterment of his fellow men.

The time has long since passed for
any sane person to argue about the
need of the Farmers' Union. The only
person that needs any arguing with
now is the fellow who has "not time
to attend the meetings." It might be
well to argue with him with an elm
club.

However the conflict may go on be-
tween the compress trust, it must ul-
timately end by the farmer getting a
gin-pressed bale packed and wrapped
in cotton. That is the logical and
natural end and no amount of sophis-
try will stop for all time this course.

Have you any deed this week to
your credit for helping to make the
Union better or stronger? If not, it
is to your discredit, for the field is
white unto harvest. Get out and do
something to prove that the Union is
what you and all the members claim
for it.

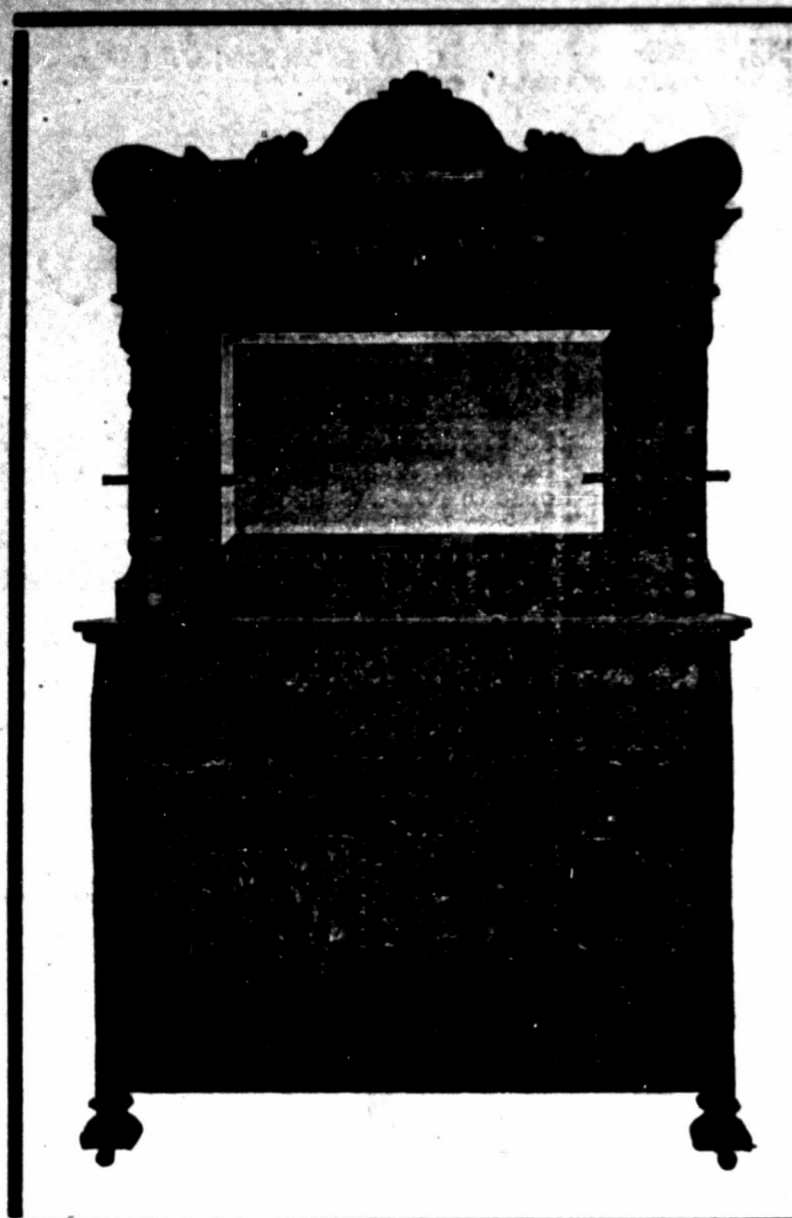
