Killed by Lightning.

About ninety miles west of Portales, a man by the name of Tom Lemay was struck by lightning and instantly killed on Thursday. September 19th. He was walking along on his claim that evening between sundown and dark, when he was struck fairly on the head by the lightning, which passed through his body into the ground. His clothes were torn into shreds and were scattered around for twenty or thirty feet. He had on a cap which was torn into bits and even his shoes were bursted and torn from his feet. His body was scorched black in streaks.

He was a man about 45 or 50 years old and had lived there about four years and was a bachelor. The remains were buried on his claim the next day by the settlers in his neighborhood. He was walking out to meet some teams which were just coming in from Roswell, bringing him some supplies, when the incident happened, so he was found right away. A brother of his, living in east Texas, has been notified and is expected here right away




