## DISTRICT COURT WARD AT WORK

Amount of Business Notes Continuing the Session Over Into Next Week

Jury Made Their Final Report Monday

It was proved to be a great amount of work for consideration this term of the district court. Work has been pushed, both day and night sessions being held, and still the term will continue over into next week.

The grand jury completed their report Monday and made their final report, as follows:

The Hon. William H. Pope, Judge of the Fifth judicial district.

The grand jury for this term, March term of 1909, in and for Roosevelt county, beg to submit the following final report:

We have faithfully examined all matters coming before us and have found true bills in all cases where the evidence so warranted. We have visited all the county jails and, so far as we are able to ascertain, are being conducted in an acceptable manner.

That the jail and premises are in good condition, except the cell in which the prisoners are confined, which cell we recommend be put in better sanitary condition at once. That these cells be provided with more light and ventilation.

Having finished all the business before us, we beg to be excused.

Among the true bills found by the grand jury are the following: Charge of larceny was made against Hallee Ballou and Ballou. These are two young men who were arrested at Pecos, charged with stealing horses and burros at Buchanan in Guadalupe county. They both plead guilty.

Charge of murder was made against Arthur C. Adams. This charge is for the murder of Guy Porter, who was found shot in his claim near Melrose, December 31st. The defendant plead guilty and the case is set for Monday.

The case against Horace G. Jones, charged with larceny, rendered, to which the defendant plead guilty.

Fines for violation of the game law were rendered against James Cunningham, Patric Monahan and Sam Hamlin, to which the defendants plead guilty.

A bill was returned against W. Suddleston for operating a gambling place, to which the defendant plead not guilty.

Few no bills were also returned.

The case of the territory vs. Webb was dismissed, costs assessed against defendant.

Ed McDonald was granted temporary license to practice law.

A decree of divorce was granted in the following cases: Maude Douglas vs. Oscar M. Douglas, E. Fields vs. Charlie Fields, M. Bogardus vs. Park E. Bogardus, Charley H. Curry vs. M. Curry.

The divorce case of Carrie Miller vs. Wm. Cleveland Miller was referred to Llewellyn Carter to take testimony without any binding of fact.

## FARMERS RESOLUTE

### Meeting to Consider Proposed Co-Operative Experimental Work

According to notice published in the Times the farmers met in Portales last Saturday and considered the proposed idea of providing for experimental work by some farmer to be selected in each community. The idea seems to be in favor with the farmers of this county according to the following resolutions that were adopted:

Resolved, that in our opinion the experimental farm stations now conducted are limited in their benefits to a very small scope of country and to a very small proportion of our farmers, and that a comparison of costs and benefits show but little benefit in comparison with cost. For extensive and long continued experiments this large outlay of money is justified for only one station in the territory, but for direct and immediate benefits to the farmers we think the plan of co-operation as proposed by Prof. J. D. Tinsley is the most practical plan to get in touch with the progressive farmers and to bring about the best method of farming. Fifty or one hundred co-operative stations could probably be carried on as cheaply as one of our stations is now conducted. We do not know of anything that would be of greater benefit to the farmers of New Mexico.

### A Sermon.

I dropped into the Presbyterian church on Sunday, the last day of February, and heard a sermon. The subject was "Charity or Love." The speaker cited the 13th chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Corinthians love the beginning and foundation of human redemption. God so loved the world that he gave his Son to redeem and save it. The preacher taught that love was the propelling force of christian life. Without it all other action was as sounding brass and tinkling cymbal. He gave the simple and sublime illustration that went to the bottom of a human heart, and covered the christian life with a beauty and a charm that was irresistible. Lot, for a while, saved Sodom and Gomorrah, and such a preacher may be the humble instrument in the hands of God to finish the work of his Son and save a mercenary and cruel world in spite of the devil, the flesh and the hypocrit. Such preachers are the salt of the world and will stand clean and upright amid the wreck of matter and the crush of worlds."

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## ORDINANCES

Of the Town of Portales, Bernalillo County, New Mexico.

### ORDINANCE NO. 9

An ordinance relating to sanitary and health regulations in the town of Portales.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico: That the following be the regulations:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the town scavenger to move from the city, to a point not less than one mile from the limits thereof, all of the filth, trash, excrement, etc., under the provisions and in accordance with this ordinance, but nothing herein shall be so construed as to mean that those owning property within the town limits or renters thereof shall not keep the premises owned or rented by them in proper sanitary condition.

Sec. 2. All privies or water closets constructed or maintained in the town of Portales shall be furnished with a tight drawer or box for the reception of all excrement, which drawer or box shall be of such construction as to be easy of access and easy to remove for the purpose of cleaning the privy whenever the same shall be necessary, and such box shall be placed upon the surface of the ground, and pits for such purposes are prohibited, and anyone who shall refuse to construct such drawer or box shall be guilty of maintaining a nuisance.

Sec. 3. All persons, whether owners, renters or users of any property in the town of Portales, where there may be any privy, water closet or cess pool or pit, are hereby required to clean and purify the same every fifteen days from April 1st to November 1st, and every thirty days from November 1st to April 1st, in the residence district, and every seven days from April 1st to November 1st, in the business district, or oftener if necessary, such cleaning and purifying to be done between the hours of 9 p. m. and 4 a. m. except at night, and lime or crude carbonic acid shall be kept and used in all water closets and cess pools in the town of Portales.

Sec. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to construct, build or excavate any cess pool or pit for water closet, privy or other purpose within the town of Portales, New Mexico.

Sec. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit or permit to remain any slops or waste water, refuse or rubbish, manure or other unwholesome thing in or upon any of the streets or alleys or on any of the lots or blocks in the town of Portales, and it shall be the duty of the scavenger and town physician of the town of Portales to inspect the town every seven days, or oftener if necessary, and all the lots, blocks, streets and alleys within said town, and if a bad sanitary condition exists any where upon the property or in front of the business houses or residence of any person, the town physician shall give notice of the same to the party occupying the premises, or the user or owner thereof or his agent, and in the event the same is unoccupied, of such condition and require the occupant or owner or agent, as the case may be to remove such condition within 24 hours, and if not so removed, he shall file a complaint under the provisions of this ordinance in the proper court against such person so notified, for maintaining a nuisance, and such person shall be liable to the penalties of this ordinance for such offence, and a like duty as here imposed upon the scavenger and town physician is also imposed upon the town marshal of the town of Portales, whenever he shall observe or his attention is called to a condition existing described in this section, and if such condition has not been removed within the time specified, then the scavenger, himself shall clean such premises and file his bill with the board of trustees for such cleaning, which sum shall in no event exceed the sum of five dollars, and it is hereby made the duty of the said board of trustees to pay said bill when so filed and found to be correct.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to maintain any slaughter house or other place for the slaughter or killing of animals, or any hog or pig pens, within the limits of the town, and such slaughter house shall not be maintained within one mile of the town limits, and a hog or pig pen not within the town limits.

Sec. 7. All stables, barns, corrals, cow stables or like houses where any filth or excrement of any kind or character may accumulate, shall be kept clean and disinfecting shall be done every thirty days, or oftener if in the judgment of the town physician the same shall be necessary, and all barn yards must be properly drained.

Sec. 8. Any stable, sheds or barn in which any liquid discharge is allowed to accumulate, so as to generate or cause any offensive smell or odor, except where said manure is spread upon the ground for cultivating purposes, shall come within the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to maintain any unhealthful or unclean water in wells or cisterns, any carcass of any dead animal, or any sick animal upon any of the public highways or streets of the town, or vend, sell or offer to sell any impure milk or adulterated or impure food of any description, or to burn vegetables, trash or old clothes, on any of the public streets or highways of the town, which will pollute the atmosphere within the limits of said town, or to throw any glass, bottles, trash, paper, peelings or skins of fruit upon the streets or alleys or sidewalks of the town of Portales.

Sec. 10. All ditches, gutters and drains, used for conducting water within the town limits shall be used and controlled as to prevent any overflow or flood upon the streets, public highways or alleys, and such ditches, drains or gutters used for water shall be kept in good order by the party using the same, the ditches kept clean and a proper outlet for the water running through the same.

Sec. 11. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons within the town limits, or within one mile thereof, to keep, cure, dry or expose any green hides except by the use of proper observance of all sanitary conditions; and all carcasses of dead animals which shall die within the limits of said town shall be, by the proper owners thereof, removed at least one mile from the limits of the town, and buried not less than three feet below the ground; and the same shall be done within twelve hours after the death of said animal.

Sec. 12. It shall be unlawful for any person to commit an act, or permit any condition prejudicial to the public health or safety of any person in the town of Portales, not especially mentioned in this ordinance.

Sec. 13. The town scavenger shall, under this ordinance, be allowed and permitted to charge the following following prices per month for cleaning closets: 50 cents for residences, to be cleaned every fifteen days from April 1 to November 1 and every thirty days from November 1 to April 1, of each year; hotels of twenty rooms or more, \$5.00 per month, to be cleaned every seven days from April 1 to November 1, and every fourteen days from November 1 to April 1, and as often as necessary when ordered by the town physician; hotels of ten rooms and less than twenty rooms, \$3.00 per month; restaurants and business houses, 75 cents per month; wagon yards and boarding houses, \$2.00 per month; hotels, restaurants, boarding houses, wagon yards and business house closets to be cleaned in accordance with the regulations providing

for the cleaning of closets for hotels of twenty or more rooms; and every business house or firm not maintaining a closet shall pay 50 cents per month; provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent any owner, renter or user of property in the town of Portales from cleaning any closet for such property, but such owner, renter or user shall comply with all the provisions of this ordinance in reference to the disposition of the contents of such closet or closets, and failing so to do shall be liable and subject to the penalties set forth in this ordinance, and the same fee shall be allowed the scavenger for cleaning any lot in the town of Portales. This fee shall be paid by the occupant, owner or user of the premises at the time the work is performed.

Sec. 14. All violations of the sanitary ordinance coming under the observation of the scavenger shall be by him reported to the marshal, whose duty it shall be to promptly serve notice on the offender and, in event of failure to obey notice within twenty-four hours, to arrest said offender, and cause his prosecution through the regular channels by the town attorney.

Sec. 15. It shall be the duty of the town marshal to visit each meat market in the town not less than once a week, reporting all unsanitary conditions to the town physician, who shall inspect and, if necessary in his judgment, cause prompt prosecution.

Sec. 16. Every hotel, restaurant, boarding house, butcher shop, soft drinks stand, bakery, etc., in the town of Portales shall be supplied with a metallic covered receptacle, in which shall be placed all slops, such receptacle shall be emptied once a week, or oftener, if necessary, by the town scavenger, for which he shall receive a fee of 25 cents per month. This shall not be construed as interfering with the rights of every property owner or tenant to make such disposal of said slops as he may see fit, providing the same is done in a proper and sanitary manner, in accordance with the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 17. It shall be the duty of every practicing physician in the town of Portales, and every hospital, or other place where consumptives are treated, to report all such cases to the town physician within twenty-four hours, and shall make report of the residence of all such cases where known.

Sec. 18. The board of trustees may, from time to time, make and establish by ordinance, resolution or order, such rules and regulations as they may deem necessary, or as emergency may require, looking into the health and sanitary condition of the community and town, the abatement of all nuisances tending to endanger the public health, and the removal of all sources of filth and causes of sickness, and they may take such steps as, in their judgment, is necessary to restrain, stamp out, eradicate, check the progress of, and isolate all contagious diseases.

Sec. 19. It shall be the duty of all physicians practicing in the town of Portales to notify the town physician within six hours after having knowledge or suspicion of any infectious or contagious disease, which shall include measles, rubeola, chicken pox, small pox, typhoid fever, diphtheria, ileo-colitis, membranous croup, scarlet fever or any other contagious disease under their treatment and it shall likewise be the duty of any owner, or tenant, or occupant, of any house, or other place, who shall know of, or have cause to believe that there is a case of contagious or infectious disease upon their premises to at once notify the town physician of such fact, and any physician, property owner or other person who shall neglect, fail or refuse to report such case of contagious disease as here provided for shall be guilty of a violation of this ordinance.

Sec. 20. It shall be the duty of the town physician, when it shall come to his knowledge that any person within the limits of the town is infected with small pox, measles, varioloid, scarlet fever, scarletina, diphtheria, membranous croup, cholera or any other contagious or infectious disease to have such person taken to some proper place without the corporate limits of the town of Portales; provided, however, if there be no such proper place, or if the removal would endanger his or her health, then the town physician shall order the marshal to quarantine the place where such person is located, and thereupon it shall be the duty of the marshal to immediately post in three conspicuous places upon and about such premises notices printed in large type, notifying all persons of the existence of such contagious diseases, and after posting of such notices no person shall enter or leave said premises except the attending physician, and such notices shall remain posted for at least twenty-eight days, or longer, in the discretion of the attending physician. Quarantine may be dissolved, however, at the discretion of the town physician. All suspicious cases shall be quarantined until the nature of the disease is determined absolutely.

Sec. 21. It shall be unlawful for any person to wilfully mutilate, destroy or tear down any of the notices mentioned in the preceding section, or to leave or enter any premises upon which said notices have been posted.

Sec. 22. The board of trustees may, as often as they deem necessary, by order or by resolution, require all persons within the corporate limits to be vaccinated against small pox, and failure, neglect or refusal to so do will be deemed a violation of this ordinance. Vaccine matter shall be provided at the cost of the town but each person shall bear the cost of his or her vaccination; provided, however, if any person shall make affidavit that he or she is unable to pay such cost, it shall be the duty of the town physician to vaccinate him or her free of charge.

Sec. 23. In all cases of contagious diseases, such as small pox, varioloid, scarlet fever, scarletina, measles, diphtheria, membranous croup or cholera, the town physician, upon the termination of the quarantine, or upon the removal or death of the patient, which must be reported by the attending physician, or upon the death or removal of tubercular or typhoid patients, shall cause disinfection to be made in the following manner: Each room shall be tightly closed, articles of clothing strung therein, thoroughly wet with a solution of forty per cent. formaldehyde, and there shall be placed in each room an open earthenware dish containing not less than sixteen fluid ounces of formaldehyde and permanganate of potassium seven and one-half ounces, and the room shall remain so closed for a period of time sufficient, in his judgment, to thoroughly disinfect the same. In extreme cases the health officer may direct the removal and burning of wall paper, scrubbing the floor with a solution of formaldehyde, the burning of clothing, bedding and other materials as is more fully provided for under the laws of the territory relating to health. The specifications herein outlined are for a residence room, fifteen feet square and ten feet high, containing two thousand two hundred and fifty cubic feet. Larger rooms shall have the same proportions. The fee charged for disinfecting a room of such dimensions shall not exceed one dollar and fifty cents, and larger rooms shall be charged for in proportion. The duty of disinfecting all such premises shall lie equally on the owner or agent of the premises and the attending physician, so far as report is concerned, and it shall be the duty of the town physician to investigate all cases reported to him and prescribe such disinfection as is contemplated under this ordinance, and any refusal to so disinfect, persisted in for more than twenty-four hours after written notice by the town physician shall subject such tenant, owner or agent to the penalties hereinafter provided.

Sec. 24. The work of disinfection shall be done by some competent person, who has a technical education in the business, but in event such person is not obtainable, by any person who shall satisfy the town physician of his competence.

Sec. 25. This ordinance shall not be construed that any correct form of formaldehyde burner may not be employed, if in the

judgment of the town physician it is advisable, or to prohibit any person from disinfecting his own premises at any time and in any way provided, however, if in the opinion of the town physician said premises should be disinfected, the same shall be done according to the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 26. When any contagious disease which has existed upon any premises in the town has ceased to exist thereon and such premises have been thoroughly cleaned and fumigated as herein provided, it shall be the duty of the town physician to deliver a certificate of such fact to the attending physician or to the owner or occupant of such premises, which certificate shall be presented to the town marshal and thereupon the town marshal shall make the necessary removal of the placards and file such certificate with the board of trustees.

Sec. 27. Whenever any nuisance, source of filth or cause of sickness shall be found on private premises within the town of Portales, the town marshal shall order the owner or occupant or the person or persons who permit such conditions, to remove the same within twenty-four hours, and any person who shall fail, or refuse to obey such order shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this ordinance, and each day such conditions shall remain shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

Sec. 28. If the owners or occupants shall not comply with the order of the town marshal, he may summons sufficient assistance and remove such source of filth and cause of sickness, and if admittance to the premises is refused, the town marshal or any person interested shall make complaint before the justice of the peace of the town of Portales, stating the facts of the case, and the justice of the peace shall thereupon issue a warrant to the town marshal commanding him to take sufficient aid, and between the hours of sunrise and sunset to proceed to such place and remove such nuisance, source of filth or cause of sickness, and the town physician may attend and direct the town marshal in the service of such warrant.

Sec. 29. Every physician practicing medicine within the corporate limits of the town of Portales, shall within twenty-four hours after the death of any patient under his charge, report the same to the town physician, giving the name, age and occupation of the deceased and the cause of death, who shall thereupon issue a permit for the burial or transportation, and no undertaker or other person shall bury or transport any such corpse without such burial permit. The town physician shall receive a fee of \$1.00 for such permit from said applicant.

Sec. 30. In case of death from small pox, varioloid, diphtheria, membranous croup, scarlet fever, or measles, no public funeral shall be held aside from members of the family, and no child shall attend such funeral.

Sec. 31. Any person who shall conceal, secrete or hide upon his or her premises any source of filth prejudicial to the public health, or any source of filth or cause of sickness, or shall fail or refuse to make known to the proper authorities the existence of any contagious disease within twenty-four hours after the same becomes known to him or her, or shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance in any manner, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and subject to the penalties thereof.

Sec. 32. It shall be unlawful for any person to spit upon any of the sidewalks, or upon the floor or wall of any public building within the town of Portales. Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of violation of this ordinance and subject to the penalties thereof. This section shall be printed in large type upon colored card-board with an appropriate heading to call the attention of the public thereto, and one of such cards so printed shall be posted in at least twenty of the most conspicuous places in the town of Portales. It is hereby made the duty of the town marshal to post such card boards as provided for by this section.

Sec. 33. Whenever any nuisance or growth of weeds herein prohibited shall be found to exist on private property within the town of Portales, the town marshal shall order in writing the owner, lessee, or occupant, or the person or persons who permit such nuisance to exist, to cut and remove the same within five days after the service of said notice upon them, and any person who shall fail to or refuse to obey such order shall be deemed to have violated the provisions of this ordinance, and each day such weeds shall remain after said five days notice shall be held and deemed to be a separate offense.

Sec. 34. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to convey within the limits of the town of Portales, any fresh meats for the purpose of sale, in any vehicle, unless said meats are properly covered or screened, so as to be free from contact with flies, dust or other impurities.

Sec. 35. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the town or county jail for a period of not less than five days nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court trying the case.

Sec. 36. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after five days from the date of its publication, and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

President Taft weighs 280 pounds, his private secretary weighs 120 pounds. This remarkable team will, therefore, still average 200 pounds, despite the diminutive size of Frederick W. ## PRESIDENT WILLIAM H. TAFT.

Thursday, March 4th, at Washington, William H. Taft became president of the United States, taking the oath of office in the supreme court room, the same being administered by Chief Justice Fuller. The elaborate outdoor program arranged for the occasion had to be condensed owing to the severe blizzard. However, thousands of people congregated in front of the capitol building regardless of the blinding storm, while the new executive was being installed within. President Taft, Vice President Sherman and members of the inaugural committee stood for three hours at the court of honor while the inaugural review

was in progress, the president refusing to leave the stand till the last file of troops had passed. The one regret of the president was that he could not deliver his inaugural address to the multitude assembled outside. The day will truly be designated as the Washington Snow Storm, and go down in history as such, as it proved to be one of the worst storms of the season. After the inaugural exercises Mrs. Taft accompanied her husband on the drive to the executive mansion, she having the distinction of being the first wife of a new president who has taken such a drive immediately following the inaugural exercises.





The term "cabinet officer" has no legal origin, declares United States Senator Money. They are not constitutional officers nor officers under the constitution of the United States. A man can be a cabinet officer without being a head of an executive department. There is no law on the statute book which makes the postmaster general a member of the cabinet of the president of the United States. What made that officer a member of the cabinet? It was a note of three lines from Gen. Jackson to Mr. Barry, then postmaster general, requiring him or inviting him, to attend the cabinet meeting the next day and thereafter. That made him a cabinet officer. The president can make every assistant attorney general, every assistant postmaster general, every assistant secretary of the interior or assistant secretary of the treasury, or elsewhere, cabinet officers if he chooses to call them into council.
