AN EIGHTH AIR LIBERATOR STATION, ENGLAND — Master Sergeant Oral V. Williams, Dimmitt, Texas, wire chief at this B-24 Liberator Heavy Bomber Base, is among the men honored at a special view commemorating the service of those who, through faithful performance of their duties, have supported the combat fliers of the 445th Bombardment Group in the course of 280 bombing missions during the past seventeen months in England.

NOTICE

STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF CASTRO —
The following resolution was duly passed by the Commissioners Court of Castro County, Texas, in regular session:

BE IT REMEMBERED, that the commissioners court of Castro County, Texas met in regular session on the 28 day of May, 1945, with the following members present: Commissioner, Precinct No. 1, T. R. Davis; Commissioner, Precinct No. 2, A. O. Thompson; Commissioner, Precinct No. 3, J. O. Ayers; Commissioner, Precinct No. 4, John Stork; and there came to be considered the matter of various farmers in the county permitting waste water from irrigation to go from their lands in and onto the county roads of Castro County, Texas, sometimes in the bar ditches, and sometimes on the roadway itself.

And Whereas, in some instances, this condition is permitted to continue for months at a time.

And whereas, this prevents in some instances the care of the road by the county commissioner of the precinct so affected. It permits the luxuriant growth and seeding of Johnson grass, which is an undesirable plant and very prone to spread, and the court feels that with a little thought and care, the natural blessing of irrigation water could be better utilized and the supply preserved.

Wherefore, he it resolved that request be published in the "Castro County News", three times, that persons desist from the practice of letting excess irrigation water into the bar ditches or on the roads of Castro County, Texas, and that the public also be hereby informed that anyone who persists in this practice shall be prosecuted in accordance with and under existing penal laws, it being distinctly understood that this notice does not apply to farmers who, at the request of the county or the State of Texas, turn irrigation water to bar ditches for the purposes of irrigating trees. Motion being put, all members voted "aye" in favor of the resolution.

Lt. G. F. Holland Gets 5th Bronze Service Star

435TH TROOP CARRIER GP. FRANCE—1st Lt. Garnett F. Holland of Dimmitt, Texas, a glider pilot with one of the squadrons in this organization, has recently been awarded his fifth bronze service star for battle participation in five major campaigns within this theatre.

With miles-long trains of gliders on double tow, Lt. Holland's unit recently crossed the Rhine under heavy anti-aircraft opposition to land elements of the American 17th Airborne Division in the Wesel area of Germany.

The campaigns in which Lt. Holland and his unit, the veteran 435th Troop Carrier Group, have played a key role, include the battles of Normandy—for which the group was cited by the President—Southern France, Rome-Arno, Northern France, and Germany.

Overseas 19 months, Lt. Holland's unit is part of Maj. Paul L. Williams' U. S. Troop Carrier Forces, air component of Lt. Gen. Lewis H. Brereton's First Allied Airborne Army.

Ration Calendar

June 1 to July 1
SUGAR: Stamp No. 36 is good for 5 pounds sugar through August 31. Stamp No. 35 will expire June 2.

MEATS AND FATS: Book IV, red stamps E2 through U2 are good for 10 points each. V2 through Z2 become valid June 1. Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2 and D2 expire June 2, and E2, F2, G2, H2 and J2 expires June 30.

PROCESSED FOODS: Book IV, blue stamps N2 through Z2 and A1 through C1 are good for 10 points each. D1 through H1 become valid June 1. H2, J2, K2, L2 and M2 expire June 2, and N2, P2 Q2, R2 and S2 expire June 30.

SHOES: Book III, stamps one, two and three, with airplane pictures, each good for one pair of shoes indefinitely. A new stamp will be validated August 1.

GASOLINE: (Coupons must be endorsed on front) A coupons, 4 gal. each with No. 15 expiring June 21. No. 16 coupons become valid June 22 and will be good for six gallons each. B-6, B-7, B-8, C-7 and C-8 rations have a value of 5 gallons each. R-2 and R-3, 5 gal. (Valid for bulk delivery only); T coupons designated. "Second Quarter" good for 5 gal. through June 31; D one and one-half gal.; and E-2 and E-3, one gal. each.

TIRE INSPECTION: T book holders every six months or every 5,000 miles, whichever comes first. New Mileage Rationing Record required to obtain gasoline rations. Application for passenger car tire replacement must show condition of all tires in use.

FAT SALVAGE: Every pound of waste kitchen fat is worth two red points and 4 cents.

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES (by Leila Petty, County Home Demonstration Agent)

Take three cups corn syrup; boil until it begins to form a thread. Add one pint of strawberries and cook ten minutes, add another pint of strawberries and one cup of sugar sprinkled over the top; keep this constantly boiling and boil about ten minutes, or until it reaches a jelly stage. Remove from the fire and gently shake the kettle until the foam forms in the center and can be removed easily. Then pour into a flat container and let cool before putting into the jars. Place into hot sterilized containers, cover with wax and seal at once.

Note: In using honey with this recipe, take 2 cups honey and boil until it thickens, then follow the remainder of the recipe as stated.

With the amount of sugar available for canning so low, it is likely that much corn syrup will be used in canning. The following proportions for using corn syrup in canning have been found quite satisfactory, according to Mrs. Winifred Leverenz, Extension specialist in Food Preservation:

(1) 1 cup corn syrup to 1 cup water.
(2) 1/2 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup sugar to 2 cups of water.
(3) 1 cup corn syrup, 1/2 cup sugar to 2 cups of water.

H. J. R. No. 11 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas as to provide for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed fifty cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the nearest and most direct route of travel by land, regardless of railroad or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distances to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The provisions of this Constitutional Amendment shall be self-enacting, and if a majority of votes at said election shall be cast for same the Governor shall, within thirty (30) days after said election, issue a proclamation declaring this Amendment to be a part of the Constitution of Texas.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7
 proposing an amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas providing that any person in the United States Maritime Service, or the Armed Force Reserve of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or any other person who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified elector of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment."

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 2. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding of any such election, was a member of the armed forces of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or of the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified elector of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment."

a certain stated time thereafter; provided that members of the regular Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States shall not be permitted to vote; providing that other members of the armed forces be entitled to vote under certain conditions; providing the form of the ballot for voting on said proposed amendment; fixing the time for holding an election; directing the Governor to issue the necessary proclamations; and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. There shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas the matter of amending Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new section which will modify the present restrictions concerning voting. This new section shall be inserted between Section 2 and Section 3 of Article VI, and shall read as follows:

"Section 2a. Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to require any person, who at the time of holding of an election hereinafter referred to is, or who, within eighteen months immediately prior to the time of holding of any such election, was a member of the armed forces of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or of the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified elector of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Article 6. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; provided, that when the business of the court may require, the court may sit in sections as designated by the court to hear argument of causes and to consider applications for writs of error or preliminary matters. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this state, and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer, or a lawyer and judge of a court of record together at least ten years. Said Justices shall be elected (three of them each two years) by the qualified voters of the state at a general election; shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall each receive such compensation as shall be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of any Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election of state officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the state. The Justices of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Judges of the Commission of Appeals who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that such assistance shall be paid on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother or father has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother or father has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother or father has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance."

H. J. R. No. 13 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III so that the same shall consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas who are aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons, over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such assistance; providing that the payments of such assistance from State funds shall never exceed either the payments from Federal funds or a total of more than thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) per year; providing for a special election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication; and making an appropriation to defray the necessary expenses of proclamation, publication, and the payment of State funds to be held throughout the State of Texas as on the 28th day of August, 1945 at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"For the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended for such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Section 51a, 51b, 51c, and 51d of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended and the same shall hereafter consist of one section to be known as Section 51a, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application; provided that the maximum payments per month from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

"(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over One (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother or father has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother or father has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance."

Section 2. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1945, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members," and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this State.
