Notice to Directors of Schools.

To provide the necessary funds for school purposes, it shall be your duty to make an estimate for a tax levy on the taxable property of your respective districts, on or before the first Monday of May of each year, you are empowered to levy a tax not to exceed (5) mills on the dollar in any one year, which levy must be certified to the board of county commissioners, and shall then be collected by due process of law as other taxes.

Any tax above (5) mills must be voted upon by the qualified voters of each respective district. Also, no portion of the 3 mills territorial levy, shall be apportioned by the county superintendent to school district, which does not levy a special tax annually of not less than 3 mills on each dollar of the taxable property of that district for school purposes.

ORDINANCES

Of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

ORDINANCE NO. 13.

An ordinance providing for the levying, assessing and collecting a tax on property within the town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico in order to obtain money to pay for a certain engine purchased by the town of Portales and for the purpose of defraying the expenses of maintaining the government of the town and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. There is hereby laid and levied a tax upon all the property within the town of Portales in the amount of one-half of one per centum for the purpose of obtaining money and paying for certain gasoline fire engine purchased for the said town of Portales and for the purpose of defraying expenses of the government of the said town and making improvements therein as provided by the ordinances of the said town.

Sec. 2. The provisions of Section 1 above of this ordinance are hereby certified to the county commissioners of Roosevelt County, New Mexico to be by them ordered and referred to the assessor for Roosevelt county, New Mexico to be by him spread on the assessment rolls for collection as other taxes are collected in Roosevelt county, New Mexico and to be paid by the treasurer of the town board of trustees for the town of Portales to be as stated in this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 14.

An ordinance fixing the fire limits in the town of Portales and determining regulations for building within the said limits, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. The fire limits for the town of Portales shall hereafter be, extend over and include the following, to-wit: Blocks 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24 in the original town of Portales, according to the plat now on file in the office of the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder of Roosevelt county, New Mexico.

Sec. 2. No person shall construct, place or caused to be constructed or placed, within the fire limits of the town of Portales, any building or part of building, or make or cause to be made any alterations, additions to, or repair on any building now standing within the said fire limits, without first obtaining a written permit from the town board.

Sec. 3. All applications for permits to construct, alter or add or repair any building within the fire limits shall be in writing, signed by the owner of the property, or his agent, and such application shall state the lot and block, or tract of land upon which the building is, or is to be, located; the purpose for which same is intended when completed, and shall be accompanied with an outline of the specifications and plans of such proposed building, alteration or repair.

Sec. 4. Such application must be filed with the town clerk at least two days before they will be acted upon by the town board, when granted the town clerk shall, upon receipt of 50 cents from the applicant, issue the permit to him.

Sec. 5. No person shall construct, place or caused to be constructed or placed within the fire limits, any building, or part of building, unless the same shall come within the following requirements:

First. The walls shall be not less than nine inches thick for one story buildings; thirteen inches thick for first story walls of two-story buildings and eighteen inches thick for first story walls of three-story building, and said walls shall be constructed of brick or stone, and all sides and party walls shall extend not less than 36 inches above the roof.

Second. The cornice shall be of brick, stone or metal the frame or structural part of such cornice shall be of metal, and the whole be backed up with brick or stone.

Third. The roof shall be covered with tin, iron or other metal, tile, slate or tar and gravel, and the gutters and down pipe shall be of metal and the building or repairing of tin or iron warehouses within the fire limits shall not be permitted. Provided, that nothing in this ordinance shall be construed so as to prevent the construction or erection of an awning in front of any business house within said fire limits; provided, however, that said awning shall be constructed of iron or steel uprights or supports and the roof thereof be of substantial metal or the said awning be hung with iron supports securely attached to the building wall above said awning; and any person constructing such awning shall not use combustible material, and provided further, that all outside steps or stairways, leading from business houses erected within the fire limits of the town, shall be constructed of brick, stone or metal.

Sec. 6. No person shall repair, or cause to be repaired, any building now standing within the fire limits of Portales in the same shall have, from any cause, been damaged or injured to the extent of 50 per cent of its structural cost and value.

Sec. 7. No person shall store or pile any wood, lumber or other combustible material, upon any lots or open space within the fire limits of Portales without first having obtained a permit therefor from the town board.

Sec. 8. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail a period not less than thirty days nor more ninety days, or by such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the same, and each day any such building, or structure, is in process of erection, alteration or repair, or is allowed to stand after completion in violation of this ordinance within the fire limits of the town of Portales, and each day any violation of any provision of this ordinance is allowed to remain and continue within the fire limits of the town of Portales, shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the town marshal to see that the spirit of this ordinance shall be carried out and that violations thereof are promptly reported to the board.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 15.

An ordinance for the creation of the chief of the fire department of the Town of Portales, New Mexico, regulating the action of the fire department, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the Town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. There is hereby created the office of Chief of the Fire Department of the Town of Portales.

It shall be the duty of the board of trustees of the Town of Portales at the first meeting after organization in each and every year or as soon thereafter as practicable to appoint a chief of the Fire Department for the Town of Portales. Said chief to hold his office for the term of one year from the date of his appointment and until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified, unless he shall have been sooner removed by the board of trustees, and in case the office should have become vacant at any time from any cause, the board of trustees shall at the first regular meeting after said vacancy occurs appoint some person to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the chief, as soon as possible after his appointment, to take or cause to be taken an inventory of the machines and all tools and other equipments therefor and therewith, placed in his care, said inventory shall be verified by the town clerk, and from the date of such verification the chief shall be considered the custodian of all machinery, tools and appliances belonging to the fire department, and at any time the property becomes damaged or any tools or appliances are lost, the chief shall immediately notify the town clerk of the loss or damage sustained or repair necessary; or in case of any tools or appliances being lost by the carelessness of the chief, he shall be required to pay for the same.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the chief to have full supervision and control of the fire department of the Town of Portales which shall be divided into three subdivisions or companies, viz: The engine company, the hose company, the hook and ladder company. Each of said subdivisions shall once in every year elect a foreman for such subdivision or company, and the names of such foreman elected shall be submitted to the board of trustees for approval.

Sec. 4. The chief and foremen before entering upon their duties shall subscribe to an oath of office before the town clerk as soon as possible after appointment or election; failure to do so within ten days after appointment or election shall be sufficient cause for removal.

Sec. 5. The board of trustees shall have full power and authority to remove the chief or any foreman at any time for cause by a majority vote of the board of trustees.

Sec. 6. The chief of the fire department shall attend all regular meetings of the board of trustees and shall report the condition of the department. He shall be held responsible for all actions of the several subdivisions or companies while on duty.

All rules and regulations or amendments to rules and regulations adopted by the several subdivisions or companies shall be submitted to the board of trustees for its approval.

Sec. 7. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to give a false alarm of fire in the Town of Portales, either by usual bell alarm or otherwise, the party knowing at the time that no fire exists which would endanger life or property, and which alarm calls out the fire department.

Any person guilty of the violation of this provision shall be punished by a fine not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25), or by imprisonment in the county or town jail not to exceed fifteen (15) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the case.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person, except he be a member of the Portales Fire Department, to handle or attempt to handle or in any way interfere with the operation or handling by proper authority any of the apparatus, tools, buckets, hose or appliances, belonging to the fire department, whether it be in case of practice, fire or while the apparatus is housed in the place provided for that purpose, unless such person is called upon or requested to do so by the chief of the fire department or by the foreman of any subdivision or company.

Sec. 9. It shall be unlawful for any person except the chief or foreman to give any of the working signals, adopted by the department while same is on duty, either at a fire or at practice.

Any person found guilty of violating any section of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00), nor more than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00), or shall be imprisoned in the county or town jail for not less than ten (10) days or more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the case.

Any fine collected under the provisions of this ordinance shall be paid to the treasurer of the fire department for the use of said fire department.

Sec. 10. It shall be the duty of the companies under the supervision of their officers, to keep the hose and all fire apparatus clean and in good working order, at all times, and at fires cause the same to be managed skillfully and effectively for the extinguishment of such fires. The hook and ladder company shall discharge the customary duties of hook and ladder men at fires. It shall be the duty of the hose company to act as hosemen, to attend to taking the hose to fires, manage and protect it while there, and, after the fire is extinguished to properly put it in its right place; and all companies shall perform such other duties as are necessary or may be required by the chief, his assistant, or foreman of their respective companies.

Sec. 11. The different fire companies under the direction of the proper officers, shall, upon every alarm of fire, repair to the place of fire with the fire apparatus under their care, and there work and manage the same under the direction of the chief and his assistant. If any company shall without permission of the chief, or other person in command of the fire department, leave any fire, with their fire apparatus, the officer in command of such company, shall forfeit and pay the sum of \$25 for each and every such offense.

Sec. 12. If any member of the fire department wilfully disobeys, or refuses, to obey any order or direction of any proper officer, at any fire or going to or coming from the same, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not less than two dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars for every such offense.

Sec. 13. The chairman of the board of trustees or town marshal may prescribe limits within which no person shall be admitted unless by order of the chairman of the board of trustees or town marshal, to aid in carrying out the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 14. Any person knowingly or wilfully driving any vehicle across or upon any hose, while in use for the extinguishment of any fires, or for inspection, or exercise of the fire department (such hose not first having been protected from injury), shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum of not less than ten dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for a period of not more than three months, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 15. No person having charge of any hose, hose carriage, or other fire apparatus, shall suffer the same to be applied to private use without the consent of the committee of the board of trustees on fire department and buildings, under a penalty of not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each of-

fense, and he shall be personally liable in addition thereto for any injuries thereby happening to such apparatus.

Sec. 16. Every fireman of the fire department shall when on duty, wear a suitable badge, to be provided by the Board of Trustees of said town, with the name and number of said fireman's company engraved or marked thereon, and any person or persons wearing such badges unlawfully shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars and costs of prosecution.

Sec. 17. Any persons violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance may be immediately taken in charge by any officer of the fire department, and brought before the Justice of the Peace of said town. And the officers of each fire company, when on duty, have full power to summon a posse for their assistance. All fines and penalties collected by virtue of this ordinance shall be turned over to the treasurer of the fire department.
