### Constable in the Toils.

W. M. Hunter of Fort Sumner was convicted before Judge Seay in Portales Wednesday for carrying a six shooter, and also charged with larceny, and there-with goes quite a story. Hunter came here last week representing himself as a deputy constable of Guadalupe county, and having papers from a justice of the peace at Fort Sumner for the replevin of a couple horses. He found the horses in this county, and while he was out of his jurisdiction and without authority in this county, he took possession of them, under what he claimed and probably thought to be authority of law, and took them to Fort Sumner. The horses had been traded for by John Osborn of Portales and he had sold them to J. T. Bellington who lives at Nobe, south of Elida, where the horses were found by Hunter. Later a warrant was taken out at Portales for Hunter's arrest and it was served on him at Fort Sumner by deputy Charles Duncan and he was brought to Portales where a charge was brought against him before Judge Seay for carrying a six shooter. A jury was empaneled in the case Wednesday and the result was the jury failed to agree. An agreement was then made for a retrial before Judge Seay, who found him guilty and fined him \$50 and costs. He appealed the case to the district court. On

Thursday morning he was again brought before Judge Seay on the charge of larceny, but he waived preliminary. In this matter his bond was fixed at \$500 to appear before the grand jury at the next term of court. He promptly gave the bond.

### Off for Old Mexico.

A party left Portales Wednesday on a 2,000 mile trip to see the sights and investigate the opportunities in Old Mexico. The party consisted of J. B. Priddy, R. M. Sanders, W. V. Newton, and C. S. Hart, all of Portales, accompanied by W. M. Silver, a representative of the Mexico International Land Company of which W. O. Dunlap is local agent. Their destination is Palomeras which is south and east of Mexico City. The fare for the round trip including a Pullman berth both ways is \$88.85. The party went from here to Albuquerque over the Cut-Off and thence to El Paso over the Santa Fe, and thence over the Mexican Central. Mr. Dunlap announces that there will be a special car to leave on June 1st. Those wanting to make the trip should arrange for tickets by May 25th if possible.

### TERRITORIAL NEWS

Brief Items of Interest Gleaned from New Mexico Exchanges.

A movement has been started to induce President Diaz of Mexico to visit El Paso next November at the time that President Taft will be passing through the city.

A. Graham, secretary of Roswell's commercial club, has received from a sugar refinery at Cleveland, Ohio, sugar beet seed for free distribution, for a test by farmers, which if successful will result in the location of a beet sugar factory at Roswell.

The costly and magnificent Masonic Temple, contemplated for New Mexico will be built at Santa Fe. That matter is now an absolute and settled fact. The structure will cost over two hundred thousand dollars and no pains will be spared to make it one of the grandest in the United States.

A six hundred foot seven-eighth inch cable has been swung across the Canadian river at Logan, Union county, by J. B. Stewart, hydrographer of the Territorial Engineer's office, to measure the flow of that stream. A water gauge has been placed in Ute Creek in that same vicinity.

E. A. Clayton, of Artesia, who owns Spring Lake and the land surrounding it, is now making preparations to turn the place into a summer resort. The lake covers several acres, and is an ideal place for bathing and boating. Mr. Clayton will build houses and plant trees about the grounds so as to beautify the

place and make it refreshing to the weary who need a place to rest and recuperate in summer. A base ball ground will also be made and arrangements made for sport. Mr. Clayton has already made an order for bathing suits to be used at the lake. The lake is situated about three and a half miles northeast of Dayton. —Pecos Valley Echo.

El Paso county will build El Camino Real from El Paso to the Texas-New Mexico boundary 100 feet wide, says the Santa Fe New Mexican. It is expected that Dona Ana county will continue the road to Las Cruces, and the Territory from there up to Albuquerque and thence to a connection with the Santa Fe Las Vegas and Raton stretches of the same road. While New Mexico cannot make it one hundred feet wide for the present, especially not in the mountainous and hilly sections, yet, a hundred foot royal highway through the Territory, is a magnificent project and perhaps, some day, the greater part of the road will be that width. A good roads system is the most immediate need of the Territory and Governor Curry and the present Territorial administration are making the first systematic effort ever made to give New Mexico an adequate system of roads connecting with each other, and of real service to the settler.

Mr. John R. Hodges has the banner fish story—the important part of which is that it is absolutely true. Mr. Hodges uses a gasoline system for pumping water from the river to irrigate his land while waiting for the artesian well which is being

drilled. The water is pumped through a ten inch pipe. Tuesday when they attempted to start the pump it refused to work, and the supposition was that the valve had become dry, and for an hour or so they carried water and poured it in to soak up the valve. Not meeting with any success in this way, they decided to investigate, and upon doing so discovered, that a large cat fish, which had evidently been lying in the pool with its tail toward the suction pipe had been drawn in until its tail had passed through the valve, thus preventing its drawing, and all this time the many pounds of water they had been taking up the bank had passed right through into the river. Mr. Fish had found himself to large to escape from the pipe, and was fastened firmly head down in a little hole made by the suction. Messrs. Taylor, Florence and two or three others finally succeeded in extracting the fish, which, owing to its great size made a desperate fight. He was over four feet long and weighed nearly 40 pounds. Every family in the neighborhood dined on fish for two or three days. —Lake Arthur Times.

Arrangements have been made for Gen. Viljoen, the noted Boer general who now lives in the Rio Grand valley, to make an itinerary through the Pecos valley, making lectures at different points next week.

In the district court at Las Cruces next week, Wayne Brazel charged with the killing of Pat Garret at Las Cruces last year, will be tried. Brazel is out under \$10,000 bond.

Ordinances of the Town of Portales, Roosevelt County, New Mexico.

ORDINANCE NO. 16.

An ordinance amending No. 14 of the ordinances of the town of Portales, New Mexico, concerning the fixing of the fire limits in said town.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. That ordinance No. 14 of the town of Portales, New Mexico, be and the same is hereby amended as follows, to wit:

By striking out from the third line of section 1 of said ordinance the number "20" and inserting therein and in its place and read lots 1, 2 and 3 in said block No. 20.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect from and after five days after its publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 17.

An ordinance providing for the construction of sidewalks, the planting of trees, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. That all sidewalks hereafter constructed in the town of Portales, New Mexico, upon and abutting upon Main street, State street, Liberty street and Union street, where any of the following described blocks touch said streets or either of them, to-wit:

Blocks 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, shall be built of cement and according to the specifications prescribed in section three of this ordinance.

Sec. 2. The building of all cement sidewalks shall be under the direction and control of a town engineer.

Sec. 3. All cement sidewalks hereafter built shall be of the following widths: Ten feet on above described streets touching any of said described blocks and five feet on all other streets and avenues. The outside line of all ten foot walks to be ten feet from lot lines, and five foot walks five feet from lot lines.

Such sidewalks shall be built according to the following specifications:

1. Stakes shall be set by the direction of the engineer to denote the line of one edge of the walk with a grade mark thereon to indicate the top of the walk at said line. The transverse slope of the walks shall be one eighth (1/8) of an inch per foot and shall be determined by such means as said engineer shall direct.

2. The sidewalks shall be graded to a width designated by said engineer for the entire length including all wings and curvings, and a well packed sub-grade which shall be satisfactory to said engineer and must first be inspected and accepted by him.

3. Upon this sub-grade a pavement of the following description shall be placed:

The pavement shall consist of a foundation of gravel or crushed rock three inches deep, a layer of Portland cement concrete not more than three inches deep, both well rammed and compacted, and a wearing surface of Portland cement mortar one inch thick, except at on all streets and blocks stated in section one above the first course of gravel shall not be less than six inches deep.

4. All materials used shall be of good quality and must be inspected and approved by the engineer. The gravel or rock used in the foundation shall be of such size that the largest dimensions of any piece shall not exceed three inches, and of the gravel or stone used for the concrete shall not exceed one and one-half inches, and the sand or rock used shall be of the best quality, sharp and clean and free from dust, loam and other foreign matter as must also the gravel used.

5. The cement used shall be Portland cement of good quality.

6. The water used shall be fresh and free from earth, dirt or waste.

7. The concrete shall consist of one part in volume of Portland cement, three parts sand and four parts crushed rock or gravel.

8. The cement and sand in the specified proportions shall be thoroughly mixed dry in a tight box or on a platform with shovels or hoes until no streaks are visible; water shall then be added in sufficient quantity to produce a mortar of the desired consistency, and the whole thoroughly mixed until a homogeneous mass is produced.

9. The mortar, prepared as hereinafter specified, shall be spread upon a platform, the proper quantity of gravel or crushed rock, after having been thoroughly wetted, shall then be spread over the mortar and the mass thoroughly turned over not less than three times and until every piece of gravel is completely coated with mortar. Water shall be added by sprinkling during the process of mixing, if required to secure a better consistency.

10. All surfaces on or against which concrete is to be laid shall be cleaned and dampened by sprinkling with water just previous to placing the concrete.

11. The concrete shall be evenly spread upon the foundation, as soon as mixed, in a layer in such depth that after having been thoroughly compacted with rammers, it shall not be in any place more than three inches thick, and the upper surface of it shall be parallel with the proposed surface of the completed pavement.

12. The slab or flag divisions shall be formed by cutting the concrete clear through as soon as laid, the space made by the cutting tool shall be immediately filled with dry sand and well rammed.

13. Concrete shall not be mixed in larger quantities than is required for immediate use and no batch shall be larger than can be made of one barrel of cement with the proper proportions of sand and gravel.

14. The wearing surface shall be composed of one part in volume of cement to two parts of sand.

15. The cement and sand in specified proportions shall be mixed dry on a platform or in a tight box until no streaks are visible. Water shall then be added in sufficient quantities to produce a mortar of the desired consistency, and all being turned and mixed until a homogeneous mass is produced.

16. The mortar while fresh shall be spread over the concrete surface, before the latter has reached its first set, in such quantities that after being thoroughly manipulated and spread over the concrete it will make a layer one inch thick conforming to the required grade and cross section. It shall be smooth and present a nearly finished surface.

17. The surface shall then be cut in flags, the markings to be made directly over the joints in the concrete and cut clear through the wearing surface, with edges nicely turned, also edges at each side of walk shall be nicely turned as per plans.

18. The pavements shall be kept moist and protected from the elements and travel until thoroughly set. Mortar or concrete that fails to show a proper bond or fails to set, after in the opinion of the engineer, it has been allowed sufficient time, shall be removed and material of proper quality put in its place. Wooden frames or molds must be left in place until the cement sets properly and to the satisfaction of said engineer.

Sec. 4. All persons desiring to build cement sidewalks abutting any lot or lots within the town limits shall first obtain a written permit therefor from the engineer which shall be issued without cost.

Sec. 5. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for a period of not more than fifteen days, or by both

such fine and imprisonment; and each day any sidewalk which has been built, rebuilt or repaired in violation hereof is allowed to stand, and each day any sidewalk which has been ordered torn out is left remaining shall constitute a separate offense.

Sec. 6. Hereafter when any property owner or other person desires to set out shade, ornamental, or other trees upon the streets of Portales adjacent to any lot or block owned by such property owner or other person, such trees shall be planted or set out at a distance of seven feet from the lot or block line towards the centre of the street adjacent thereto, except in streets and blocks as stated in section one of this ordinance.

Sec. 7. Any person or persons who shall wilfully violate the provisions of this section, and shall set out or plant trees at a greater or less distance from his lot or block line on the streets of said town, may be required by the marshal of said town, upon three days' written notice, to remove said trees and place them the distance from his lot line as herein required; and any person, persons, or corporation who shall wilfully violate the provisions of the preceding section and refuse to comply with the demand and notice of the marshal of said town, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and may be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect from and after five days after its publication.

Passed April 22, 1909. Approved April 22, 1909.

ORDINANCE NO. 18.

An ordinance declaring certain acts when committed in the town of Portales to be misdemeanors, providing a penalty for their commission, and for other purposes.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexico:

Section 1. Any person who may hereafter be found lurking, lying in wait or concealed in any house or other building or in any yard or premises within the limits of the town of Portales, New Mexico, with the intention to do any mischief, or to pilfer, or to commit any crime or misdemeanor whatever, shall for every such offense on conviction be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than twenty-five dollars, or imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall aid, countenance or assist in the making any riot, disturbance or other improper diversion or who shall fight in any public place in the said town or who shall be guilty of any indecent or immoral or insulting conduct, language or behavior in the streets or elsewhere in said town, or who may remain prostrate in the streets or elsewhere in said town, and all persons who shall collect in crowds in said city for unlawful purposes or to the annoyance or disturbance of the citizens, shall for every such offense be punished by a fine not exceeding twenty-five dollars nor less than five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than five days nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall fire or set off any squib, fire-cracker, gunpowder or any cannon, anvil, gun or pistol in any part of said town shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than one nor more than ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court. Provided, however, that the chairman of the board of trustees may by public proclamation give permission to the citizens of said town to set off and fire squibs, crackers, gunpowder and fire-works, and to fire guns, anvils and cannons within such town on such day or days and in such places as shall be specified in such proclamation.

Sec. 4. Any person who shall be found drunk or disorderly within the limits of said town, shall, for every such offense be punished by a fine of not less than ten nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than ten nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 5. Any person who shall make any indecent exposure of their person or be guilty of any lewd or indecent behavior in any public place of said town, shall for every such offense be punished by a fine of not less than five nor more than twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 6. Any person who shall engage in any sport or exercise likely to frighten horses, injure persons or embarrass the passage of persons or vehicles, shall be punished by a fine of not less than two nor more than twenty dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than two nor more than twenty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 7. Any person who shall race horses, or who shall ride or drive any horse, team or other animal through the streets within the limits of the town at a speed or gait to exceed eight miles per hour, or any person who shall leave any horse or horses, or other animal attached to any conveyance in any street, alley, or public place within the limits of the town, without making such animal fast with a good and sufficient halter, or without leaving them with some suitable person to prevent their running away, and any person who shall tie any horse, mule or other animal to any living tree upon any of the highways or commons of the town, or any awning post or column, shall be punished for each offense by a fine of not less than one nor more than ten dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than one nor more than ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 8. It shall be unlawful for any person to ride, drive or lead any horse, mule, cattle, burro, hog, sheep or goat through or over any street or alley in the town of Portales without having same under complete control and securely fastened with a rope or halter; and if any person shall ride, drive or lead any such animal as aforesaid without having same securely fastened or if any such animal while being so ridden, driven or led shall break any tree or shrub or go upon or injure the property of another or shall injure any person, the person so riding, driving or leading such animal shall be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars and not more than twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not more than ten days, or by both such fine and imprisonment; and the owner of such animal shall be liable to the person injured or to the owner of the property injured for all such damages.

Sec. 9. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, to place upon the sidewalks in the town of Portales any chairs, benches, seats, boxes, barrels, kegs, plows or other obstructions which might interfere with the free and easy passage of persons upon and along the walks; provided, that nothing herein shall be construed to interfere with merchants unloading and handling goods in front of their places of business when necessary and when such handling and unloading is done promptly and without unnecessary delay. That any person guilty of the violation of this section or any of its provisions shall be fined not to exceed twenty-five dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail not to exceed thirty days for each offense, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court trying the case.

Sec. 10. It shall be unlawful for any person under the age of nineteen years to loiter or be found loitering on the streets, alleys, commons, public squares or on any unoccupied lot within the corporate limits of the town of Portales, at any time at night later than eight o'clock p. m. or earlier than four o'clock a. m. from

March 1st to September 1st, and later than seven o'clock p. m. or earlier than five o'clock a. m. from September 1st to March 1st, unless accompanied by his or her parent or guardian, or unless he or she shall have, and shall exhibit upon demand therefor by any other person, a permission in writing therefor from his or her parent or guardian and bearing the date of the day the same shall have been given; but no such permission shall be of any force for more than one day after the date thereof or after the same was given. Every person who shall violate this provision shall be subject to a fine of not exceeding twenty dollars, or imprisonment for a term of not more than twenty days; and in event the fine and all lawful costs adjudged against any such person shall not be paid within twenty-four hours after judgment, such person may be committed to jail by order of the justice trying the case, and shall be confined in jail until such fine and all costs are paid, provided that the limit of confinement shall not exceed said period of twenty days.

Sec. 11. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, or corporation to run or propel any automobile or auto carriage within the limits of the town of Portales, at a greater rate of speed than eight miles per hour. Any person or corporation violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed one hundred dollars, or by confinement in the town or county jail not less than ten nor more than thirty days in the discretion of the court trying the case.

Sec. 12. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to climb upon the roofs of any building or buildings within the town of Portales for the purpose of throwing stones into the streets or alleys of said town, annoying other persons, or with the intent to play and romp upon any such building. Any person violating the provisions of this section of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not to exceed ten dollars.

Sec. 13. This ordinance shall take effect five days after its publication.

Portales citizens should not brand Portales as a dead town by voting down the water works and sewer bonds on May 18th.

Some states have passed laws making it compulsory that the roads be dragged with some type of what is commonly known as the King road drag. This is a movement in the right direction. Some towns are also using this implement on their streets with good results.

Announcement has been made in the grand old city of Boston that a World's Exposition will be held there in 1920 to commemorate the three-hundredth anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims. The Bostonians are commencing early to make their arrangements and will endeavor to produce one of the greatest events of this kind the world has ever seen.

The Santa Fe railroad has let a contract to extend their Plainview branch from Plainview to Lubbock. L. N. Hoag of Malaga, Eddy county and the contract firm of Harrison & Hoag, has been awarded the contract for the construction of the road bed of this extension. There is also talk of the Brownwood branch of the Santa Fe being extended on in this direction.

Portales will on the 18th vote on the issuance of \$25,000 in bonds for a sewer system, and \$50,000 ditto for water. The indications are strong that both will pass, and if they do Portales will be a city of 5000 people in a year. It is the center of the best non-irrigated farming section in New Mexico, and only needs these modern features to become the city it should be. -Roswell Register-Tribune.

A very good idea on woman suffrage has been suggested by the Artesia Advocate, which is that the matter shall be submitted to the women themselves, and that if a majority of them want it, then it shall be so ordained. If they don't, then discussion of the matter is to be dropped altogether. The proposition is absolutely sound and economically wise, so much so as to admit of no discussion.

A movement has been started at Ft. Worth to induce William H. Pickering, the astronomer, to make arrangements for signaling Mars from West Texas. It is pointed out that the clarified atmosphere, level ground and large uninhabited areas make conditions perfect for experiments, as under these conditions the immense reflectors, by which Pickering hopes to communicate with the Martians, will not be disturbed. The scientist has agreed to take the matter up.

Articles of incorporation were published in the Elida News last week of the Mutual Relief Association of New Mexico. The incorporators are R. E. Covington, J. W. Youngblood, C. M. Murrell, and H. J. Anderson, all of Elida. The objects of the corporation, it is stated, is of a fraternal character, for the mutual relief and protection of its members by levying assessments and paying indemnity in case of accident, sickness, or death.

The trustees of Farmington at their last session denied a license to the last saloon in town, and Farmington, like Aztec, the county seat, is now dry and prohibition territory. There is now not a single saloon in the entire county.

An organization ought to be started in this county to raise cantaloupes. They can be produced here in quality and quantity and if proper arrangements are made they can be shipped and marketed to bring good profit to the farmers.

The Santa Fe New Mexican says that, almost daily, trains loaded down to the guards with soldiers for the Philippines, are being carried through New Mexico on the Santa Fe. On Monday there was a train passed Lamy from the east, carrying one hundred engineers of the signal corps and twenty-seven cars of infantry from Fort Wayne, Michigan, all bound for San Francisco, and from there to the Philippines.

It may not pay to advertise but here are the rates charged by the Ladies Home Journal and the Saturday Evening Post: Ladies Home Journal, \$7 per line, \$5,000 per inside page; inside cover pages \$5,500 and \$7,000 for the back cover page. Saturday Evening Post, \$5 per line; \$3,000 per inside page; inside cover \$3,300 and back cover \$3,600. The rate "per line" means agate lines, fourteen of which are required to make an inch. This makes the rate per inch \$98 in the Journal and \$70 in the Post. Both Publications are full of advertising all the time. -Sedan Lance.

President Taft has appointed Alfred W. Cooley and Merritt C. Meacham, both of New Mexico, to be associate justices of the supreme court of the Territory. Hon. Merritt C. Meacham has been recommended as judge of the new seventh district. He is a man of high attainments, his home being at Tucumcari in Quay county, coming from Arkansas about six years ago. He was a member of the council of the last session of the territorial legislature and is a staunch republican. Hon. Alfred W. Cooley was formerly assistant attorney general of the United States and was one of Roosevelt's closest friends. He came to New Mexico for his health and settled at Silver City. He will succeed Judge Edward A. Mann whose retirement was foreshadowed when his friends made a vigorous campaign for him for the nomination of delegate to Congress instead of W. H. Andrews who was re-nominated and re-elected.

The Earth publishes an account, taken from a Russian paper, of a Russian general who did some experimental farming. He planted one grain of durum wheat at the bottom of a funnel shaped pit, eighteen inches deep. As the grain sprouted he earthed it over again and again till the growth reached the surface. From that one grain sprouted 19,638 stalks of wheat, of fine, strong straw, and each stalk a healthy producer. Allowing, say, forty kernels to each head of wheat, in round numbers, that one grain yielded a harvest of 800,000 grains of wheat, a record heretofore, if made, never reported. Taking this as a suggestion, experiments are now being made by planting durum wheat in trenches, or furrows, the wheat planted in drills in the bottom of the furrow and, as the plants grow, the furrow is gradually filled up and, at last, hilled up like corn, which allows for cultivation. This is an interesting experiment and may determine a valuable way to produce this cereal.

## THE 320 ACRE HOMESTEAD ACT

The Bill in Full Republished—It is of Great Interest to Our Readers

Section 1. That any person who is a qualified entryman under the homestead laws of the United States may enter, by legal subdivisions, under the provisions of this act, in the states of Colorado, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington and Wyoming and the territories of Arizona and New Mexico, 320 acres, or less, of non mineral, non irrigable, unreserved and unappropriated surveyed public lands which do not contain merchantable timber, located in a reasonably compact body, not over one and one half miles in extreme length: Provided, that no lands shall be subject to entry under the provisions of this act until such lands shall have been designated by the secretary of the interior, as not being, in his opinion, susceptible to irrigation at a reasonable cost from any known source of water supply.

Sec. 2. That any person applying to enter land under the provisions of this act, shall make and subscribe before the proper officer an affidavit as required by section 2290 of the revised statutes, and in addition thereto shall make affidavit that the land sought to be entered is of the character described in section 1 of this act, and shall pay the fees now required to be paid under the homestead laws.

Sec. 3. That any homestead entryman of lands of the character herein described, upon which final proof has not been made, shall have the right to enter public lands, subject to the provisions of this act, contiguous to his former entry which shall not, together with the original entry exceed 320 acres, and residence upon and cultivation of the original entry shall be deemed as residence upon and cultivation of the additional entry.

Sec. 4. That at the time of making final proofs, as provided in section 2291 of the revised statutes, the entryman under this act shall, in addition to the proofs and affidavits required under the said section, prove by two creditable witnesses that at least one eighth of the area embraced in his entry was continuously cultivated to agricultural crops other than native grasses beginning with the second year of the entry, and that at least one fourth of the area embraced in the entry was so continuously cultivated beginning with the third year of the entry.

Sec. 5. That nothing herein contained shall be held to affect the right of a qualified entryman to make homestead entry in the states named in section 1 of this act, under the provisions of section 2289 of the revised statutes, but no person who has made entry under this act shall be entitled to make homestead entry under the provisions of said section, and no entry under this act shall be commuted.

Sec. 6. That whenever the secretary of the interior shall find that any tract of land in the state of Utah is subject to entry under this act, do not have upon them such a sufficient supply of water suitable for domestic purposes as would make continuous residence upon the lands impossible, he may, in his discretion, designate such tracts of land, not to exceed in the aggregate 2,000,000 acres, and thereafter they shall be subject to entry under this act without the necessity of residence: Provided, that in such event the entryman on any such entry shall in good faith cultivate not less than one

eighth of the entire area the second year, one fourth during the third year and one half during the fourth year after the date of such entry, and that after entry and until final proof the entryman shall reside within such distance of said land as will enable him successfully to farm the same, as required by this section.

### Altus, Roswell & El Paso Railroad.

Work is going ahead on the Altus, Roswell & El Paso railroad. Edward Kennedy, the president and promoter is already making an effort to secure part of the bonus money subscribed by the towns. He was at Roswell last week and called a meeting of the business men to lay before them his proposition that a per cent of the Roswell bonus be placed so he could use it in the construction of the road as the work progressed, and to make a report on the progress of the work.

This report, in brief, says the Roswell Record, showed that the greater number of the towns which had subscribed bonuses had placed about fifty per cent of the amount in bank to be drawn on by Mr. Kennedy as the work progressed. The balance to be paid as the steel is laid. In Oklahoma 43 miles of grading has been completed out from Altus, and a great deal of bridge work has been done. In Chaves county the amount spent to date for grading has been over ten thousand dollars. The total amount of completed grading is 138 miles. One mile of steel has been laid out from Altus and some three miles has the ties down ready for the rails. The road will be to the Denver Road in eight months.

Mr. Kennedy stated that he wanted to get things in shape here so that he could start in pushing things from this end of the line. Efforts would now be directed to pushing the line from Roswell and he wanted the right of way and terminal matters straightened out. The road had reached the point where he wanted the support of the people of Roswell. Up to the present the total amount of \$198,000 had been spent. He had in bank where he can draw on it for work to be done in certain places along the line the sum of \$320,000 and a large sum to be turned loose when rail laying was reached. As he desired to push things from Roswell to Lubbock, he would ask the people here who had subscribed to pay a percentage of the amount to be applied on the work in this section. This, of course, to be deducted from the total bonus.

The Roswell men, expressed themselves favorable towards Mr. Kennedy's proposition and a committee of seven was appointed to meet with the old railroad committee and Mr. Kennedy to make the necessary arrangements in regard to the payment of the installment of twenty-five per cent of the bonus and to arrange for its collection. It will not be necessary to pay over this percentage to Mr. Kennedy before forty days.

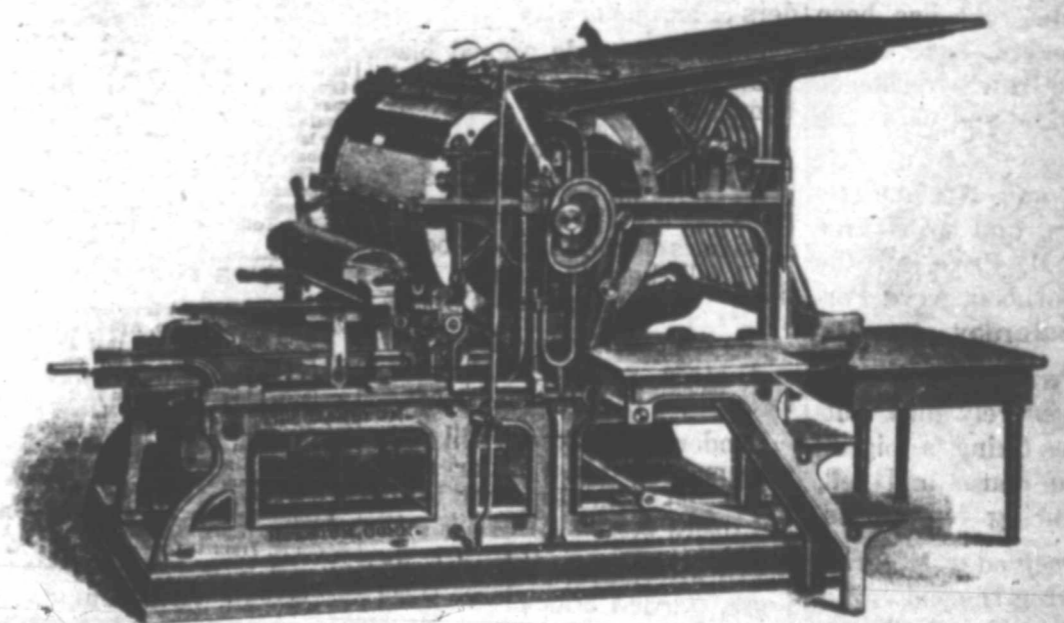

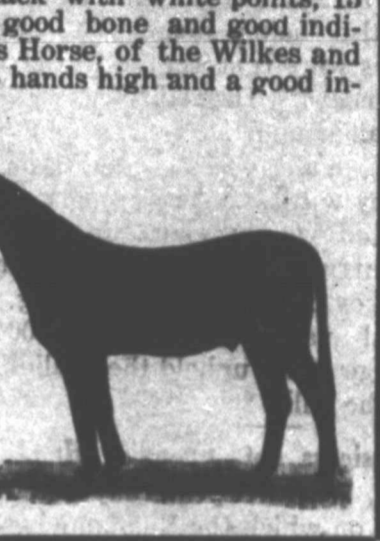
