ORDINANCE NO. 20.

An ordinance providing for the issuance of the negotiable coupon bonds of the town of Portales, New Mexico territory, to the amount of \$50,000 for the construction of a system of waterworks, and to the amount of \$25,000 for the construction of a system of sewers in and for said town, prescribing the forms of said bonds and of the interest coupons to be thereto attached; providing for the levy of an annual tax to pay the interest on said bonds when due and to provide a sinking fund for the discharge of the principal thereof at maturity; and fixing the other details of the issue.

Messrs. Ulen, Sutherlin & Company, of the city of Chicago, Illinois, at a price above par and accrued interest; and

Section 1. That for the purpose of providing the necessary funds for the construction of said waterworks and said sewers in and for the town of Portales, Roosevelt county, New Mexico territory, pursuant to plans, specifications and estimates duly adopted by the board of trustees of said town, there shall be and there are hereby ordered and directed to be issued the negotiable coupon bonds of said town as follows: Waterworks bonds to the aggregate amount of \$50,000; and sewer bonds to the aggregate amount of \$25,000. Said waterworks bonds shall be designated "Waterworks Bonds of 1909," shall be 50 in number, numbered from 1 to 50, both inclusive, and of the denomination of \$1,000 each. Said sewer bonds shall be designated "Sewer Bonds of 1909," shall be 25 in number, numbered from 1 to 25, both inclusive, and of the denomination of \$1,000 each. Said bonds shall bear date of July 2, 1909, and shall become due and payable on July 2, 1939, shall bear interest from their date until paid at the rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on July 2d and January 2d in the state of the each year, which installments of interest to date of maturity of

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That the town of Portales, in the county of Roosevelt and territory of New Mexico, a duly organized municipal corporation, acknowledges itself to owe, and for value received hereby promises to pay to bearer the sum of one thousand dollars on the 2d day of July, A.D. 1939, together with interest on said sum from the date hereof until paid at the rate of six per centum per sangum payable semi-annually on the Countersigned and registered. rate of six per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the 2d days of July and January in each year, as evidenced by and upon the presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they severally become due. Both said principal and interest are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America, at the Chase National Bank in the city and state of New York. And for the prompt payment of this bond, with interest as aforesaid at maturity, the full faith, credit and resources of said town are hereby irrevocably pledged.

There is room for infinite improvement in the design and standardization of most of the appliances in common use about mine and mill plants. Who ever saw a perfect mine car? Bad ones are the rule; good ones rare; perfect ones do

not exist. And this remark applies with nearly equal force to head frames, self-dumping skips, cages, shaft chairs, dumping cradles, signal systems, etc.

Power is used about a mine ordinarily under the most unfavorable conditions for economy, due to extreme variations of load, and there is still room for much accomplishment in the direction of meeting these conditions.

There is room for improvement in the design of station pumps driven by steam or electricity, and a very real demand for an electrical sinking pump which shall be proof against rough usage, efficient and reliable.

As entirely new appliances, a practical machine for driving a heading without the use of explosives and a machine substitute for hand work in removing waste from working face would be hailed as boons by all

An explosive affording practically innocuous products of combustion would go far toward reducing mining risks and operating costs.

There is need for the development of timber preservation plants and methods for use in mine operation, and for conclusive investigation of the practicablilty of substituting steel or other materials for timber in order eo eliminate the constant tax for repairs in workings which must be kept open indefinitely.

President of Harvard Well **Qualified**

That the choosing of a successor to President Eliot should be regarded as an event of national importance measures the dignity to which Mr. Eliot has raised the presidency of Harvard and the range of his influence during the 40 years of his administration. At his election, the academic world understood so little the course of evolution for the higher education in America, and they had gauged so inaccurately Mr. Eliot's latent powers, that they did not recognize for a long time that in him they had the one man predestined for the task.

A very different reception has greeted Prof. Lowell's election. The needs of Harvard and, incidentally, of American universities are known, and, after the closest scrutiny of many candidates, his superior equipment is almost universally conceded. In old times it was thought that a college could be safely intrusted only to a minister or to a classical professor. Now the head of a great institution like Harvard must possess not only an interest in scholarship, but knowledge of affairs, executive efficiency. social aptitude, and ability to speak in public; he must enjoy the confidence of the alumni and of the outside supporters of the university; andif the gods are lavish in their gifts-he will know how to capture and hold the loyalty of the students.
