AGRICULTURAL DEMONSTRATION TRAIN WEDNESDAY

This Visit Should be Made a Great Event—Business Houses and the Schools Will Close and Everybody Should Turn Out.

Portales people and especially the farmers from the surrounding country should generally turn out and meet the Agricultural Demonstration train run by the Santa Fe railway which will be at Portales next Wednesday, January 24th, from 8 a. m. to 10:15 a. m. Arrangements are being made to close up all the business houses in town and the school will be dismissed for the occasion. It is desired to have a good showing of people to meet the train and have all get the benefit of this educational work which is being done at the expense of the Santa Fe railroad and the New Mexico college of Agriculture and the experiment station. Every person within twenty-five miles of Portales should not fail to meet this train.

This train has been on the road this week making stops at towns in the western part of the state, and everywhere large crowds of people have attended the lectures and looked at the exhibits and demonstration work. The report from Deming states that over eighteen hundred people visited the train at that place besides five hundred school children passed through the cars and each child had a pencil and tablet taking notes to enter a letter writing contest on "What I Learned From the Demonstration Train." Further regarding the visit of the demonstration train at Deming, we copy the following from the Albuquerque Journal:

"Those five hundred children asked questions until the faces of more than one college professor turned blue. President Garrison, backed up against his silo, had to explain in two languages that it was just a model and that real silos fed more than

one cow. Superintendent W. T. Conway of the extension department, was rescued bodily from a car load of youths, in order to deliver a lecture on organization to another car load of enthusiastic farmers. The lecture was effective for immediately after the departure of the train the farmers met in the Chamber of Commerce and organized the Mimbres Valley Farmers association. The Deming people crowded the stock cars until Viola Birthright, the aristocratic Guernsey heifer, was gasping for air, and Laddie, the yearling Holstein, was vigorously protesting against being crowded out of his stall. It was a serious, question-asking crowd deeply interested in the exhibits and the livestock, eager for information, demanding lectures on every subject connected with farming activity. From the minute he got out of the train until it left Professor Fabian Garcia was backed against one the cars lecturing on horticulture and answering volleys of questions. In the livestock car, Professor Simpson, the expert in animal husbandry, was equally busy. Professor Bixby, the irrigation expert, left the exhibit car in despair. He could not run his model pumping plant because the crowd was too great and he feared to drench some of the gaily dressed ladies who helped to swell the crowd. Dr. Garrison and Prof. Tinsley delivered no lectures. They had no time. They were too busy, with the crack train crew, in helping the people in and out of the cars and in answering questions. But Prof. Conway finally succeeded in drawing the school children away from the exhibit cars and lecture room where he entertained them to their complete satisfaction. In the course of his lecture to the grown ups, Prof. Conway delivered an extemporaneous boost for New Mexico in verse that is likely to become standard."

Chas. M. Martin, our successful real estate man, last week sold forty acres of the W. C. James irrigated land east of town to O. A. Wilkinson of Kansas, and Mr. Martin bought the other forty himself. Mr. Wilkinson will move here in the spring to locate.

IRRIGATION POWER PLANT IS BEING IMPROVED

Two Car Loads of Repair Parts and Steel Received and a Machine Shop is Being Equipped With Large Lathe and Tools.

Mr. S. E. Ward, who returned early this month from his visit at Columbus, Ohio, commenced work the first of last week at the irrigation power plant with the regular operating force repairing and improving. A car load of structural steel has been received to construct an overhead traveler over each engine for facilitating rapid repair work. Also a car load of new repair parts have been received and are being installed. The Addington frame building which has been standing on lots near the power plant has been purchased and moved back of the plant and is being fixed up and petitioned off for a machine shop and office. The shop will be equipped with a complete set of tools, including a seventeen foot lathe, drill press with eighteen inch table, power grinder, and other tools, and the shop will be equipped with both motor and gasoline engine power. Evidently the power plant will be in better operating shape the coming year than ever before. It is expected to run the plant in February if the conditions are such that the water is needed. If the water is not needed in February the plant will start in March anyway. It is believed with Mr. Ward in charge of the plant there will be no difficulty in manner of operation, especially after he is equipped with these improvements and machine shop so he can make quick repairs.

Roosevelt County Teachers Association.

The teachers of Roosevelt County, New Mexico, will meet in regular session at La Lande, New Mexico, on the 26th and 27th of this month. An interesting program has been prepared, and all teachers of the county are urged to be present to take part in the discussions of the leading questions pertaining to educational progress in eastern New Mexico. Statehood inspires the hope, long delayed, of a school system, furnishing a more complete curriculum, requiring special equipment and specially trained teachers, and other desirable conditions that have not been attainable in the rural schools of the past.

The teachers of Curry and other adjacent counties are cordially invited to attend this important meeting, to aid and inspire by their presence and words of counsel their fellow workers in this great crusade for an educational revival in the Sunshine State of New Mexico.

C.N. Joyner is Enthusiastic Booster.

Mr. C. N. Joyner, of South Liberty school district in Blackwater draw, was in town Monday with sugar beet contracts for twenty quarter sections all in a body located in the neighborhood in which he resides. Mr. Joyner has worked hard for this factory, as he has for all other projects that has been offered for the development of our country. He was one of the first to begin agitation for irrigation in this county, and having failed to get in under the electric power plant put in by the Western Construction company, he helped form a stock company known as the Farmers Irrigation company of Langton, of which he was elected president but gave that up for the Briner sugar beet proposition. Now he has worked hard with the same zeal for Mr. MounDay and his company. He says if Mr. MounDay fails he will go right in for the next offer to develop this country. Mr. Joyner has great faith in this country, and says we have the soil, the climate, the water, and he feels sure there is oil under us. He also has good faith in Mr. MounDay and his company. Mr. Joyner came from Manhattan, Kansas, forty miles west of Topeka, where Mr. MounDay and his company live, and he says when Kansas people undertake to do anything they do it. There are other energetic citizens living in Mr. Joyner's neighborhood, including L. M. Tinker, G. W. Tinker, James M. Taylor, J. L. Brown, Harry Brown, Lelia Brown, Hannah C. Brown, A. H. Heneise, all Kansas people. L. M. Tinker has bought out five people who had rather go to Texas and pick cotton than raise sugar beets and alfalfa, and he has signed all these farms and his home place under the sugar contracts. J. M. Taylor signed the first contract at the first meeting Mr. MounDay held. Mr. Joyner says look out for South Liberty this year, with a railroad, sugar beet dump, post office, store, church, thirty-two hundred acres under irrigation and eight hundred acres in sugar beets. It will be one of the sweetest places in the county.

New County Officials Installed.

Judge J. T. McClure and the former clerk of the court, S. I. Roberts, both of Roswell, were here this week and Mr. Roberts turned the records of the district court of the Territory of New Mexico over to Judge McClure and C. P. Mitchell. Mr. Mitchell was sworn in as county clerk by Judge McClure, and part of his duties as county clerk is to be clerk of the court. S. E. Johnson of Elida, D. K. Smith of LaLande and C. V. Harris of Portales met Monday as the new board of county commissioners and organized by electing C. V. Harris chairman. They only transacted a little business and adjourned. The other new county officers, having qualified, took their seat Monday.

MORE ACREAGE YET NEEDED TO INSURE SUGAR FACTORY

Mr. MounDay Very Anxious to Secure Required Acreage—Time is Short and Those Holding Back Should Sign Up at Once.

Mr. and Mrs. MounDay are still working securing acreage under the sugar beet contracts. The Times was not correct in stating last week that they expected to leave for Topeka Saturday, and they state they have not yet sufficient land signed up to insure the factory. They have a flattering prospect and think they can push the deal through, but they are very anxious to get the sufficient acreage and close up as soon as possible and insist that all who expect to come in will do so at once. They report that those who have land encumbered by a small mortgage that they are taking up the mortgage and will carry it without interest and will allow the farmers to pay it out of the sugar beet crop in the same manner as the pumping plants. This certainly is quite a concession to the farmers. Mr. and Mrs. MounDay have been working hard on this proposition, riding out over the country interviewing the farmers during all this cold weather when it has been a real hardship to be out. They are remaining in the office today but will go to House, in Quay county, tomorrow. They expect to be back here and be in the office all day Saturday, and they would like to have those who have not yet signed to come in and close up their contracts that day. While they are out of their office Miss Nelle Carter will be ready to make out and acknowledge contracts at any time. She takes the acknowledgments

free of charge and in this way has helped the work considerable. They say this work must be closed up soon as it is time to commence work on drilling the wells and putting in the pumping plants.

Knocking Means a Boost.

Evidently the increasing attractiveness of Portales Valley as a promising agricultural district and its splendid opportunities for investment are being felt by surrounding towns in the way the newspapers are beginning to knock on Portales. Last week an item with a Clovis date line was run in the Roswell and Albuquerque papers containing the astounding information that flat cars containing four houses passed through Clovis, being shipped from Portales, N. M., to Slaton, Texas, by the W. B. Reid Land company. Mr. W. B. Reid disclaims any knowledge of such shipments, and the facts is there was no such shipments. The Clovis correspondent of these papers must be partaking somewhat of the qualities of practicality the only wet town in this part of the state. The only house we ever heard of being moved from one town to another in this part of the country was one house moved from Clovis to Portales by Mr. Cassidy.

Further, a Roswell paper had an item last week with a double column headline reporting to be hold up of the Santa Fe railroad. The item states that Portales business men, citizens, ranchmen, squatters and homesteaders held up a local freight and compelled the Santa Fe to switch out a car of coal which had been consigned to the yards at Roswell. The fact is we did get a car of coal owing to a shortage in Portales on the account of extra cold weather and the failure of regular shipments to arrive, but our people went about getting the coal in a business way, telegraphing the fact to the officers of the railway company at Amarillo that we were out of coal and needing it very much, and the accommodating railroad company set the car out for our local dealer. This was merely a business procedure and there was no occasion for the Roswell paper to show it up in the light of a hold up.

The art exhibit being held at the Commercial club rooms this week is attracting considerable attention. The exhibit consist of about 200 photo gravures of the world's masterpieces in art. Some of the space is devoted to architecture, Egyptian, Greek, Roman and Gothic, a few are pictures of Statuary, but the majority are reproductions of the world's famous paintings by the old Italian masters and modern German, French, Dutch and English masters, including a few American pictures. There are some portraits, some historical pictures and pictures of famous places. This exhibit has been arranged for by the Mothers club for the benefit of the Portales schools. Orders are being taken for pictures the proceeds of which will go to buy pictures for the school which will be a benefit as good pictures have an uplifting influence on the pupils.

H. B. Ryther has sold his interest in the Portales Herald to his former partner, J. R. Darnell, who is now in charge and is managing and editing the paper. Mr. Ryther and family left Sunday for Pasadena, California, to visit Mrs. Ryther's sister.

The inauguration of W. C. McDonald as the first governor of the State of New Mexico was duly accomplished at Santa Fe Monday.

Proposed Ordinance. No. --

An ordinance declaring certain acts when committed in the Town of Portales to be misdemeanors and providing a penalty for their commission.

Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the Town of Portales, New Mexico.

Section 1. Any person who may hereafter break into any public school building, church, or other public building with intent to do any mischief, to pilfer, or to commit any crime or misdemeanor therein, shall for every such offence on conviction be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Sec. 2. Any person who shall intentionally break any street light, chop or otherwise injure any electric light, telephone or telegraph pole, cut or break any electric light, telephone or telegraph wire; break display or carry away any water tap or part thereof or shall in any way molest or tamper with any service box, service pipe or service cock except with authority from the proper officer in the Town of Portales, shall for every such offence on conviction be punished by a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, or by imprisonment in the town or county jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 3. Any person who shall throw stones or other objects at any street light; or shall throw stones or other objects through any window or door light; or shall throw stones or other hard objects upon the roof of any building or against any water or oil tanks, within the Town of Portales, shall be punished for every such offence on conviction by a fine of not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars or by imprisonment in the Town or County jail for not less than five nor more than thirty days.
