### THE CANTALOUPE AND PRODUCE ASSOCIATION

Incorporation Papers Have Been Returned from Santa Fe. The Association Will Meet Saturday Afternoon.

A Market Has Been Secured for Sweet Potatoes. Dry Farmers are Enthusiastic Over Bean Culture.

The papers of incorporation of the Portales Cantaloupe and Produce association have been received this week from Santa Fe, and were not published merely because of the lateness of their getting into our office. The association is now on a financial footing equal to that of any other similar organization in the state and no doubt will soon grow larger than most of the others which have already advanced as far as they can. This is only a starter for this valley and when the whole thing is developed there will be several organizations as large as this one here in the valley with headquarters at Portales.

The association is going after the markets without standing back and they have already had offers for our products from several of the leading commission men of the southwest. Denver wants our cantaloupes for her choice trade. Think of what that means when Denver lays within an hours ride of several of the largest cantaloupe producing regions of the United States and she is offering us fancy prices for our product which will have to travel one day to reach them. All the other large cities of the southwest want our beans and sweet potatoes. They are giving the secretary some fancy offers for early beans and for our fall crop of Jersey sweet potatoes. They not only want to handle the stuff for us but they say they have fancy trade which calls for such products as the Portales valley produces. Of course Roswell is below us and raises great quantities of this stuff but they do not get rid of it in these fancy markets. They hold everything until spring and then get rid of it to those markets that can do no better and yet the people used to go to Roswell and pass this place up. But they have at last decided that they have made a mistake and all those that can are gradually turning loose down in the valley and drifting this way, while the rest are stopping as they go through.

There will be a call meeting of the Portales Cantaloupe and Produce association at the court house, Saturday March 30th, at 2 o'clock. All members of the association are urged to be present and all those who are interested in the organization of such a body and who are not members but who wish to see what the association is going to do for them whether they are members or not are invited to be present.

We have noticed while looking over the files of the Cantaloupe & Produce association that there are a great many dry farmers

who are getting in on the bean deal which the secretary has put through for the association in the last week.

We are certainly glad to see that the association is spreading out and not only trying to do good for the man right in next to town who has every advantage over the man out a distance but that they are reaching out and giving the people of the county a chance to market their products, which we will admit, has been a hard proposition up till now.

Any man of ordinary business judgement would never fail to try a few of these beans after talking to the secretary or any else who knows anything of the cost of planting, picking, selling handling and etc. It seems to us that since the cost of planting an acre is not over a couple of dollars at the most and the association has offered to get crates for the farmer without him being out a cent until he has received some returns from his crop, that he certainly would tackle the bean business whether he raised anything else or not. If he loses all he will only be out very little while if he makes as much as one hundred pounds off of his acre he has more than for his seed. If there are only two beans on each vine during the growing season he will therefore come out some to the good. You had better plant beans is our advice.

#### Inez on the Boom.

Uncle Polk Williams of Inez dropped into the office last Monday and paid the editor a dollar for what he called the best paper in the town, and as well as leaving the dollar he left some information as to what that part of the county is doing toward making a crop for the next year.

Uncle Polk says that their long suit is plowing deep. The wheat which was put out on deep plowed land has now covered the ground and he says that they have one of the best wheat crops assured that he has ever seen.

He also says all the the people who have left for work in the last year or two are all back and that they are willing to give their land another trial because they believe that it will produce the stuff. Besides the two or three hundred acres of wheat which is now green and growing they are getting ready to plant cotton, corn, and all other crops that are staple to this country. Heres wishing the Inez people all the rain and good luck which can come to them and we believe that their country is developing at the rate it is merely because the people are willing to do the necessary work.

### ENTHUSIASTIC OVER THE PORTALES VALLEY

J. S. Ross Can See Only Great Things Here. Tinsley, Santa Fe Demonstrator Will Hold Meeting Saturday.

Realizing the Great Resources of Portales Valley and Sure Prosperity Santa Fe Will Build New Depot.

J. S. Ross, of Wellston, Oklahoma, was one of the many visitors in Portales this week, and made the Times a pleasant call. In speaking of the possibilities of the Portales Valley, Mr. Ross was very enthusiastic, especially so of our enormous water supply and the other natural resources. He said that he had been out to see the alfalfa field on the J. B. Sledge place and stated, frankly, that he had never seen anything like it in his life before. He also remarked that the miniature river running away from the well on that place was a sight the like of which he had never witnessed until then. He also stated that the clay deposits under this second water strata would make the finest pottery in the world, superior even to that of Virginia, and that, in his mind, this lime stone that is so plentiful here would make an excellent fertilizer. In speaking of crop possibilities, he said that the Portales Valley looked to him like it should develop into the greatest vineyard in America, California not excepted. Why, said he, you not only have the exact soil for the culture of the grape, but you have this lime stone that makes the best known fertilizer in the world for grape vines. Mr. Ross actually went plum wild about this country and gave it out cold that if he could possibly dispose of his river bottom farm in Oklahoma at most any old price he would take the first train for Portales and annex one of our irrigated farms for his own use. Also he visited our big irrigation plant and, also, he went into extacies over that, pictures of which he ought to take back to show the folks at home.

Professor J. D. Tinsley, agricultural demonstrator for the Santa Fe railway company, is in the valley for the remainder of this week and will be glad to meet with as many of our farmers as possible.

He will meet with the farmers at Arch school house today and at Bethel school house tomorrow Friday 29th, and will be in town at the commercial club room Saturday the 30th at 1:30 p. m. and we urge upon the farmers to come out and give him a good audience for he will have something to say to you that will benefit you materially and will be glad to answer any questions that you may ask him.

The Santa Fe railway company is carrying on this demonstration work for the benefit of the farmers along its lines at a great cost to itself and the service is absolutely free to you and you should not fail to avail yourself of it.

At last Portales is to receive at the hands of the Santa Fe rail-

road company a gift. The said company has at last decided to build the long looked for depot which Portales has been needing these many years and which has never been given her merely because she would not ask for it from the right parties and because these right parties have overlooked the fact until recently when they were given notice that Portales certainly needed the new depot. When Clovis first went to breaking up and going to pieces in general, the division superintendent wanted a place to move his family and after taking them to California in the winter and Colorado in the summer they eventually decided to come to Portales to make their home, liking this temperate climate much better than the wet California and the cold Colorado climate. As soon as they came here the first time they noticed the condition of the depot and now not only will we get another family from the windy city but we will also get a new up to date depot, second to none in Eastern New Mexico. Welcome Mr. McMahon and family and the depot as well.
