## County Farmers Make ... Top Yields In Wheat Cutting

A survey of grain elevator operators in the Dimmitt area late this week revealed they expect Castro County to reach a whopping 40-bushel average on irrigated wheat when the harvest is over.

Estimates on the stage of completion of the harvest ranged from 80 to 90 percent Thursday as heavy-laden trucks continued to stream toward county elevators.

With a 40-bushel average, Castro County should reach a fabulous production record this year of about four million bushels, worth at market prices, about \$6,720,000 to the county's farm economy.

## East Dimmitt Has Free Treat to Big Fireworks Show

Citizens of East Dimmitt were treated to a free fireworks display about 9:30 Saturday night when a small fireworks stand caught fire, igniting most of the merchandise.

Observers said there was a tremendous show as whizz-bangs, rockets, firecrackers and dozens of other types of fireworks went off.

The fire was caused when a light bulb exploded and portions of the melted filament fell into some of the fireworks. There was a \$350 loss, according to Dimmitt Fire Chief Willie John Word.

## Two Fires Monday Night at Hart Cause Property, Electrical Damage

Volunteer fire departments from Hart, Dimmitt and Olton were called out Monday night to extinguish two costly fires at Hart.

At 9:30 the Hart department was summoned to the Homer Hill residence to control a fire in a large pile of crossties. These ties were stacked around and near a Southwestern Public Service power line that carries electricity to the entire city of Hart.

The highline pole and the cross-arm were both aflame and the power had to be cut off at about 10:25, just minutes before the lines snapped under the intense heat. As a result the water supply was cut off, and the Dimmitt and Hart fire department trucks had to depend on the watersupply at the Panhandle Compress and Warehouse in Hart.

Just as the two departments were beginning to make headway with the cross tie fire, another blaze broke out in the southeast part of the town in an army barracks owned by Claude Ray and occupied by a custom harvesting crew from Richland Springs, Hart and Dimmitt departments answered this call and summoned the Olton Fire Department. The barracks was a total loss as the flames spread rapidly in the frame building. Attention was centered on the home of Ray Warren and surrounding neighbors. A Ford car owned by T. R. Warren was parked near the barracks and was completely destroyed by the flames. All belongings of the South Texas men were lost in the fire.

After the barracks fire began, the attention of the fire departments alternated between the two fires until both were under control. A Southwestern Public Service crew from Plainview and Dimmitt worked steadily all night until the burned power line was repaired and electricity was again available in Hart after a six-hour loss.

While the fires were blazing a group of Hart citizens prepared and served sandwiches and coffee to firemen and linemen. Among them were Mrs. F. A. Bauman, Mrs. Stewart Newson, Mrs. Bob

The small section, jutting toward the lower left corner, is the lobby and will face due south. West of this lobby portion is the operating room, emergency room, laboratories, x-ray rooms and maternity patient rooms. The wing facing north contains, among other things, the kitchen, laundry, storage and dining rooms. The east wing is all general patient rooms. The tentative floor plan will be presented next week in the News.

## Hospital Drawings Presented

### Commissioners Accept Tentative Plans To Show Voters Before Election July 9th

The Commissioner's Court Monday reviewed tentative plans for the hospital. If the election passes, the court and hospital board will work out the definite plans for the building, based on what the county wants in its hospital and the demands which must be met to qualify for Hill-Burton federal hospital construction assistance.

The bond election is for \$225,000, which according to arrangement, will not be used for construction of a hospital until it can be matched with an equal amount of federal funds. This means the county voters will get a hospital at about half price if the election passes.

The plans which have been submitted call for a brick building with 18,000 feet of floor space in three main wings. Planned by the architectural engineering firm of Haynes & Kirby of Lubbock, the plans as submitted pretty well meet Hill-Burton requirements. The firm has designed other West Texas hospitals.

If approved, the new hospital will have a parking place for 48 cars in two lots and will be situated on the same block adjacent southwest of the present hospital.

One of the feature attractions of the plan is that it can be conveniently added to on three wings and still retain the one window per patient room ideal. It is planned presently for a 28-bed normal occupancy with a maximum occupancy of 35 beds. This is considered operationally adequate for now and the next few years and more can be added at relatively little cost later on. By adding one small addition the normal occupancy can be increased to 45 beds.

The Commissioners Court on Hospital board may change the plans considerably yet after consulting with architects, hospital experts and other interested persons. However, the general floor plan on display at the county judge's office will probably remain about the same. The News will probably carry a layout of the floor plan next week.

The News will also carry a tax study next week so voters will know how much it will cost them in increased taxes if the bond election carries. For an average wage-earner the cost should run less than \$10 a year. Overall county

taxes will be raised about 20 percent if the issue passes.

Both the drawing of the artists' conception of the building and a floor plan of the proposed hospital can be seen in the Commissioners' Court Room adjacent to the County Judge's office in the Court House any time from 8 to 5 daily.

In an interview with the architects Monday any serious attempt at tornado-proofing a hospital it was termed impractical. The building as planned would be capable of withstanding a more than 300 mile an hour wind, but since no one knows the wind velocity inside a tornado there is no assurance that this strength factor is adequate. To positively tornado-

proof a building or a portion of a building would not be worth the cost and inefficiency of design the engineers said.

### Lions Club Hears Of State College Needs and Troubles

The Dimmitt Lions Club Tuesday noon heard Dr. Gerald W. Thomas, Dean of Agriculture, Texas Technological College in Lubbock, discuss the needs of higher education in Texas.

"Everyone in Texas must someday come to realize that the quality of our higher educational system is not up to par," he said, "and it's mostly because teachers and professors in this state receive too little for wages and have too little to work with."

Dr. Thomas, interspersing his talk with jokes and other humor, went on to tell how Texas, with 145,000 college students in 18 state colleges, had no colleges ranking superior or excellent when compared to Eastern schools. "Texas is trying to get by on colleges ranging from mediocre to good," he maintained.

Pointing out what research had done for agriculture, Dr. Thomas said "There is not one variety of wheat planted now that was planted in 1900 and 70 percent of the wheat varieties we plant now were not even in existence before World War II. Research in agriculture has changed farm life tremendously."

### Rev. M. A. Smith New Member of Baptist Board

The Rev. M. A. Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Dimmitt, was elected to the 191-member executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas here the past week.

He was one of four new members elected to replace men who had moved out of the state. The executive board, Texas Baptists' highest policymaking body short of the BGCT state convention itself, meets quarterly. It is composed of pastors and laymen from across the state. Dr. James H. Landes, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Wichita Falls, is board chairman.

The board also elected several men to administrative positions with the BGCT at its June meeting.

### Water District Plans Lawsuit for Farmer Water Depletion Allowance

In 1954, the High Plains Water District filed with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service a request for a ruling that would establish ground water in the southern High Plains of Texas as a depletable natural resource and allow a deduction on federal income-tax returns for its depletion.

The request for such an administrative ruling has been denied. A lawsuit is now being planned to establish through litigation the District's contention that underground water in this area is a natural deposit and that it is being depleted; and that individuals and institutions using water to produce income should be allowed a federal income-tax deduction for the depletion of this resource. Such depletion shall be calculated under cost rather than percentage depletion methods.

The District is gathering information that will be used during the trial to establish facts pertaining to the underground water and to the reservoir. The facts will prove that the underground water in the southern High Plains is gradually and surely being depleted and that the use of underground water in the production of crop income has a definite economic value.

An individual irrigation farmer will be selected by the Water District and the Revenue Service for test case purposes.

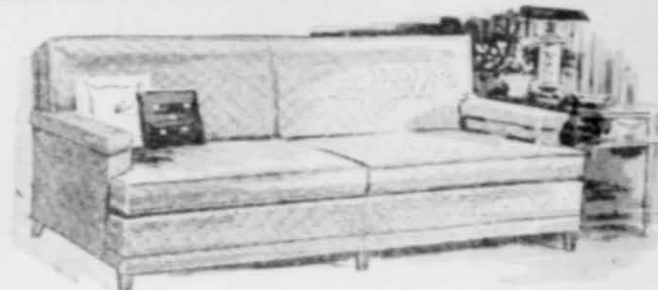

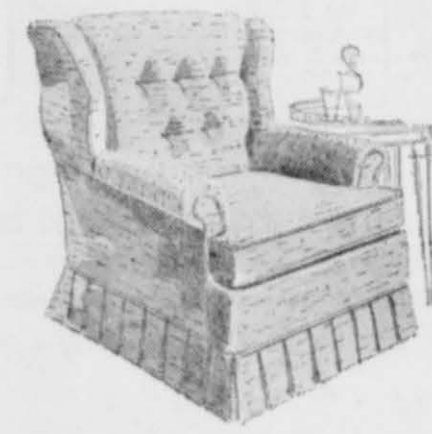
