# CHARLEY HART BUYS THE GREATHOUSE RANCH AND G50HEADOF FIINE pale faced cattle 

## The Price Paid for This Proposition Would Make

 a Hole in a Forty Thousand Dollar Bank Roll Large Enough to Give Any Ordinary Man a Severe Cise of Cold FeetTwo Years Ago This Place Was Mot Paying a Reasonable Interest o an Investment of $\$ 5,000.00$ as a Dry Farming Game, Nom, as a Cattle Ranch, It Has Paid Big Dividends o an Investment Many Times Greater Than $\$ 5,000.00$

Another nice little transaction was closed this week through which Mr. C. S. Hart becomes the owner of the I R. Greathouse ranch, at Upton, and about six hundred fifty head of choice cattle. This is a very desirable ranch prop osition, and the sum of money Mr. Hart unloosened from left mighty little change coming back from a $\$ 40,000.00$ check.

About two years ago Mr. Greathouse and sons decided that there was some money to be made in the cow business, and, as they had plenty of grass land, they took to t, borrowing about two thousand dollars for that purpose Up to that time their holdings had managed to make them a living, but that was about the extent of their success With the closing of the beal this week, they are enabled to quit with something close 20 thirty thousand dollars in their poke, the gross price being sufficient to leave them about that amount to the good. This makes a noise like a big story, and it is a big one, furthermore, it is fully warranted by the facts, and Mr. Greathouse has the diner in his kick to prove it. Two years ago they borrowed two thousand dollars, with which they bought steer calves at nine dollars per head and, within the year, sold them for twenty-four dollars a round. The cost of keeping them was, practically, nothing, grass anb water, consequently the net profit was about fifteen dollars a head, or three thousand dollars profit on a two thousand dollar investment. A CERTIFICATE OF HEALTH AND IN DEFAULT OF RECIS
tRATION PAPERS MUST BE ADVERTISED AS GRADES
Under a law enacted by the last legislature, parties who keep male animals for sale or for breeding purposes ted by the proper authorities, which veterinary must furnish a certificate showing the physical condition of th animal. Also if registered, the certificates of registra
tion must be shown. Where animals are not registered osters bearing the name of the anımal must be put in a conspicuous place, the name of said animal immediately preceded by the word "grade," in letters not less than wo inches high. The Santa Fe New Mexican, bearing date of April publishes what purports to be an oration delivered before a bunch of kids, students at the state institution located at Roswell, the "Queen of the Alkali Flats," in which he attempts to romp on the administration for not going into Mexico and breaking into the war now in progress there. Playing at war and delivering spread eagle harangues before a bunch of uniformed school kids may tend to tickle the vanity of the hero of three or four state encampments where many a daughty warrior fell before the fierce onslaughts of the intrepid John Barleycorn and his cohorts of gayly bedecked warriors, but it is scarcely probable that these exploits have qualified him to sit in judgment on the acts of the Wilson administration. There is some slight difference between the duties of a major of state milisitia and those of a president who controls the destinies of ninety millions of people. If Mr. Bujac is so ardently thirsting for glory on the battlefield there are opportunities open in various parts of the world wher
