County farmers now eligible for four drought aid programs

Castro County farmers and ranchers are now eligible for four federal drought assistance programs, according to Sen. John G. Tower (R-Texas).

FARMERS and ranchers in 147 Texas counties, including Castro, are eligible for hay transportation assistance and Commodity Credit Corporation owned feed grains at reduced prices.

The Agriculture Department has ruled that the new hay bank program can be effective now, in that farmers growing forage on irrigated set-aside lands may put up hay from 25 percent of their set-aside acreage or 25 acres, whichever is greater, and may use or sell that hay immediately without penalty. The hay must be grown, put up, used and sold within the drought-designated counties.

Castro is one of 155 Texas counties in which farmers and ranchers are now eligible for grazing and haying privileges on non-irrigated set-aside lands without penalty.

USDA has designated 69 counties, including Castro, in which farmers and ranchers are eli-

gible to share in \$5,450,000 in federal funds made available to the State ASC Committee to assist the cost of deep plowing and other conservation measures designed to reduce wind erosion. The Farmers Home Administration has designated 235 counties of Texas in which farmers and ranchers are eligible for low-interest emergency loans. The Small Business Administration is continuing to make economic assistance loans to businesses in Castro and other counties which have suffered substantial economic hardship due to drought.

A&M renames its water institute

Texas Water Resources Institute is the new name for A&M University's Water Resources Institute.

DR. J. R. RUNKLES, Institute director, said the name change more accurately reflects the statewide scope and research activities.

He said the Institute program now includes 33 research projects. Research program activities include water resources planning, conservation, water quality, economic impact of water development, ecology and recreation. Examples, Runkles said, are irrigation studies in the High Plains region and recreational use of the San Antonio River in the city of San Antonio.

The TWRI also sponsors the annual Water for Texas Conference at A&M. It is also responsible for administering the entire Title I research program in Texas for the US Department of Interior, Office of Water Resources Research.

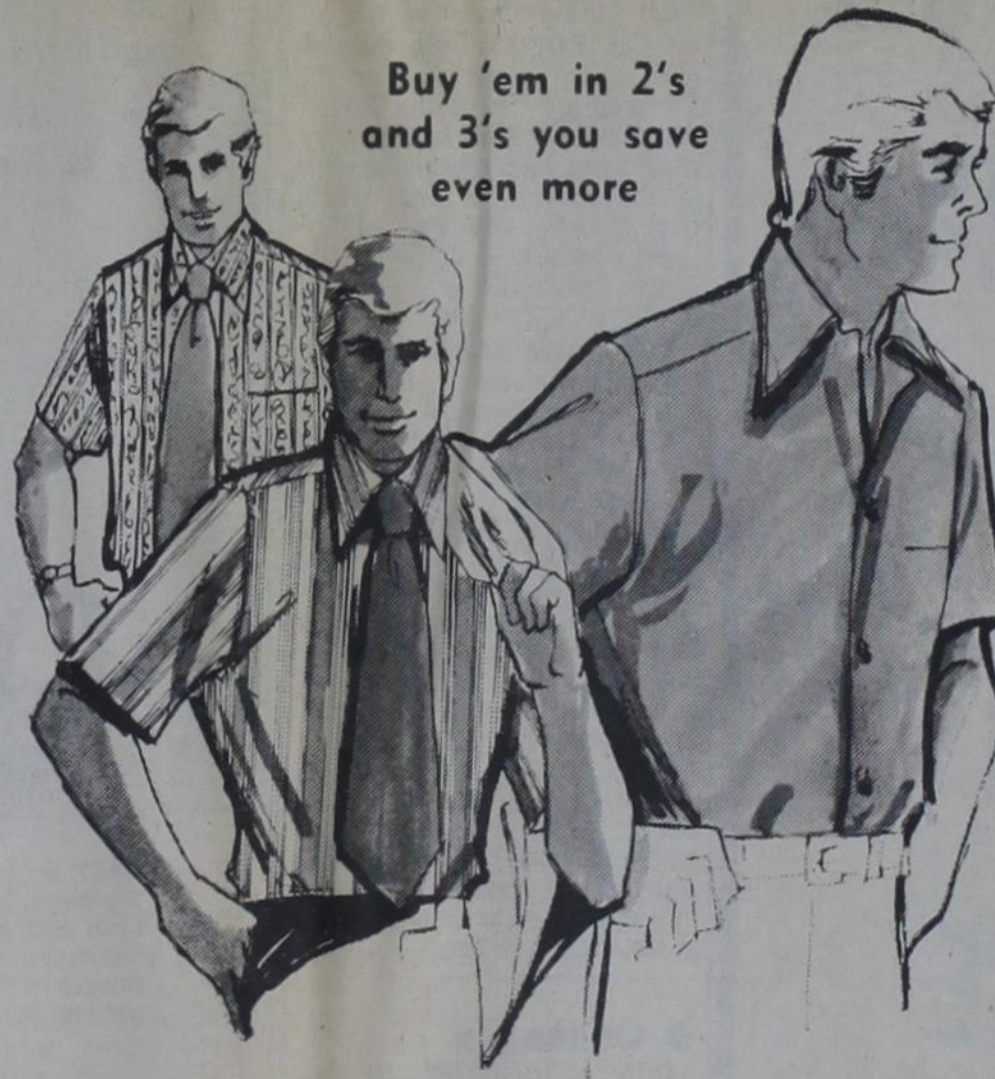

This is the time of year to eat many fresh vegetables, fruits and good salads. Here are some tips on fresh pineapple:

When shopping for fresh pineapple, remember that the larger the fruit, the greater the portion of edible flesh. But size alone will not indicate how edible the fruit inside is. Don't buy pineapples that look bruised or dry, and avoid ones with unpleasant odors or with "eyes" that look watery.

Select pineapples that are a lively dark green color, signaling the mature hard stage. When fully ripe, the fruit may also be golden yellow, orange yellow or reddish brown, depending on the variety.

Ripe pineapple also has a fragrant, tangy odor. Select a pineapple that is heavy for its size. For a medium-size fruit weighing from two to two and one-half pounds, plan on six half-cup servings.

Strawberries are popular year-round and this strawberry pie is one reason

Strawberries are the fruit favorite of many. Their bright red lumpiness makes you want to taste them.

Improved processing and growing has made strawberries a year-round fruit for the housewife. In the frozen food section, you can find them sliced or whole, sweetened or unsweetened. These low calorie berries are excellent choices for the dieter — only 55 calories per cup.

Strawberries can be served in many ways. Shortcake with strawberries is an American favorite. Whole fresh berries are excellent on fruit trays for bunches and teas. Strawberry pie is a colorful, refreshing dessert, and here is my recipe:

STRAWBERRY PIE (Makes 6 servings)

- 1 cup sugar
- 6 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup water
- 2 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice
- Few drops of red food coloring
- 3 cups strawberries
- 1 baked 9-inch pastry shell

- 1. MIX SUGAR, flour and salt in a saucepan.
- 2. Pour in water, lemon juice

and red coloring, and mix.

3. Cook at medium heat, stirring all the time, until clear and thick.

4. Cool mixture a few minutes.

5. Arrange the berries in the pie shell.

6. Pour the cooked mixture over the berries.

7. Refrigerate the pie, top with whipped cream if desired.

(You may substitute well-drained frozen strawberries. It makes a better filling when using frozen berries to mix them with the cooked filling before pouring into the pie shell.)
