This is the time of year to eat many fresh vegetables, fruits and good salads. Here are some tips on fresh pineapple

When shopping for fresh pineapple, remember that the larger the fruit, the greater the portion of edible flesh. But kize alone will not indicate how cdible the fruit inside is. Don't buy pineapples that look bruised or dry, and avoid ones with unpleasant odors or with 'eyes' that look watery

Select pineapples that are a lively dark green color, signaling the mature hard stage. When fully ripe, the fruit may also be golden vellow, orange vellow or reddish brewn, depending on the variety

Ripe pineapple also has a fragrant, tangy odor. Select a pineapple that is heavy for its size. For a medium-size fruit weighing from two to two and ene-half pounds, plan on six half-cup servings.
