## Carranza Has Ordered the United States to Evacuate Mexico, the End Draws Near, Carranza Will be Suppressed

### WICHITA CREAMERY HAS PROMISED TO WITHDRAW AT EARLY DATE

B. F. Copley, Manager, Authorized the News to Make Statement in Name of His Company

Committee Selling Stock Reports a General Success and Everyone Up in the Collar Pulling

The news is authorized to state that, upon the completion of the new creamery, the Wichita people will retire from the field represented by Portales, Elida and vicinity. Mr. Copley, the manager, was here Monday, and made the above statement to this paper, promising, at the same time, to write a letter of confirmation for publication in the issue of next week. Mr. Copley talked very reasonably about the matter and expressed regret at the loss of the local institution. He told the News man, among other things, that there had been seven creameries established within the past year in his territory in Kansas, but that he had no intention of those fields. This leaves the field entirely free from outside competition and, with the contract the board of directors of the new creamery have with the management, that the farmers must be paid Elgin prices for their butter fat, there now appears to be no obstacles in the way of the Roosevelt county institution getting a sufficient amount of butter fat to run something like one thousand pounds of butter a day on the amount of cream being produced here at this time. It is also true that there will be added to the production something like thirty per cent more cream by reason of summer grass and more fresh cows to milk.

The creamery management reports that they are meeting with all the success they anticipated in the way of stock subscriptions and that they expect to be making butter within the next forty-five days. A committee, consisting of Porter Deen, J. L. Blunt, Sorenson, A. A. Rogers and others, went to Tucumcari Monday to look at the machinery and equipment of the plant at that place, with a view to buying, providing that it was in good condition and could be had at a price that would justify the committee in buying. Upon inspection, however, it found to be totally inadequate to meet the demands of this place and further consideration of it was abandoned.

Work of clearing the ground for the new building is progressing rapidly, and there will be nothing in the way of the construction work as soon as the brick and other material can be placed on the ground. The settlement with the insurance companies was accomplished within a few hours after the arrival of the adjuster and was very liberal and satisfactory to all parties concerned.

If the farmers who are cream producers will now put their best foot forward and help out on the stock subscriptions it will greatly facilitate matters and help to get the new building under way just that much sooner. Every day wasted in this matter is just one day longer to wait until you can patronize yourself. Every old stock holder will tell you that this

stockpaid him better than twenty-five cent profit, and that four cows will pay for the stock in the increased price alone, in less than one year, which means that at the end of twelve months you have a creamery that did not cost you one cent, and an institution that will be a dividend paying investment as long as you live. This listens like a mighty good proposition to the News man and one that should appeal to every farmer in the county.

## TIME IS A GREAT FACTOR IN ROOSEVELT COUNTY CREAMERY BUILDING AND PUSH THE WORD

Months of May, June, July, August and September are the Months of Maximum Butter Fat Production and Consequently the Time a Creamery Connects With the Money

"The Criminal Who Burned the Roosevelt County Creamery Represents the Lowest Type of Human Being, Whether Performed for Pay or to Satisfy a Grudge. It Was a Personal Attack Upon the Welfare of Every Family in the County"

There is a law not on the statute books, nor written in any constitution, state or national. It is, however, more effective than any man made law. It has been in effect throughout the ages, is sure of operation and impossible of evasion. This is the law of compensation. A criminal who performs an unlawful act is sure to reap the punishment for that act, either physically or mentally, and a majority of them are punished by the laws of man. The criminal who burned the Roosevelt county creamery represents the lowest type of human being, in that this act, whether performed for pay, or to requite a personal hate, was a direct attack upon the welfare and well being of each and every family in Roosevelt county. For an individual to attempt to operate against public opinion is as foolish an act as may be performed. Public opinion may be wrong, often is, yet it requires long years of untiring effort and exceptional ability to overcome united public opinion. It has been demonstrated that public opinion in Roosevelt county is overwhelmingly in favor of the re-establishment and continued operation of the Roosevelt county creamery. This institution, operating during the leanest portion of the year, has actually paid the farmers of this county more than one-third of its entire cost in the additional pay they have received for butter fat. The farmers realize this fact; there is nothing talks as effectively as money, consequently, everyone is ready and willing to put his shoulder to the wheel and rebuild the creamery. The board of directors are tabulating data and information on costs and will make every effort to have the creamery in operation in July. It will be necessary, however, to have cash with which to work, as the directors do not wish to contract any debts, rather, they prefer a cash working surplus. It is, therefore suggested that each subscriber pay in his subscription, in cash or by his negotiable note which may be cashed at the bank where he does business. If all you citizens will act, and each one of you, individually, see to this, your directors will get this creamery in operation within forty days. Whoever burned this creamery, or instigated its burning, undoubtedly waited the opportunity of destroying it when the maximum of revenue was possible. During the months of May, June, July, August and September, we could have made sufficient money to have piled up a surplus to enable it to operate through the lean winter months. It is, therefore, necessary that the reconstruction be made as early as possible in order to retain as much of this revenue as may be. The rebuilding of this creamery is the best demonstration which can be made of the united public opinion in Roosevelt county. It indicates that the merchants and farmers, and all producers in this county, are behind every movement which makes for the betterment of its citizenship. Such a united public opinion and public spirit cannot be stopped. This means that Roosevelt county is now under way and on its road to permanent prosperity. Are we going to have a creamery in Portales? Yes. Can any individual, or set of individuals, stop the Roosevelt county creamery? No. Are you behind the movement to put this creamery back in operation within the fewest possible days? Yes. Then let us have your cash or negotiable note, as money will talk strongest with the manufacturers of machinery and building material. Louis Kirby has been authorized by the board of directors to make collections in behalf of the creamery. When he comes to your place with his pleasant smile, see that he departs with a larger smile and some real coin of the realm.

## COMPANY "M" TAKING CAMP LIFE LIKE OLD TIMERS AT FRONT

Are Allowed the Munificent Sum of "Two-Bits" Per Day for Grub and They Have Plenty

Are Drilling and Standing Guard and All are Anxious for an Opportunity to Fight Mexico

First detachment of our soldiers arrived at the border city, Columbus, New Mexico, May 12th 1916, followed by the second detachment arriving May 19th 1916. On account of under estimated recruiting, our boys were forced to mess with the regulars for the first day or two after arriving, until proper quarters could be arranged for their entertainment. We our now comfortably quartered in our company street situated on the left of battery "A" and on the right of company "L," a Mexican company. For our sustenance, we are allowed 25.25 cents per day, making sufficient amount for any practical need for our boys. Our rations consist of breakfast bacon, soup, fried and boiled potatoes, sweet potatoes, canned corn, beef, macaroni, and prunes. Prunes are beautiful.

The first regiment of the New Mexico militia consist of 13 companies, seven of which are Mexican and six companies are American, of these companies one company stands guard each night with loaded chambers and bayonets fixed for any casualty. The writer does not know the result of the loaded chambers in the event of an attack, yet he feels as though, each soldier would follow strictly the military channels, or other channels.

Men of all prominences are on the border for the protection of the stars and bars for which our forefather fought and died, not one has looked back or taken his hand from the plow, all have looked ahead in the providential hope that the sword may be beaten into plowshares, which if not done, we are ready for the forward march.

I forgot to tell that we are provided a regimental bath house conveniently situated for all, has cold shower sprays only, Peggy Neal says that it is awful hard for a one legged man to stand up under this cold shower spray.

Many of us are sacrificing our personal and financial interest in the service of our country and for this prominent and distinguished company earnestly request that our personal matters back at home be taken care of which we are sure will be done by our many friends?

Since the writer began this news, a box of home made candy has arrived from the high school ladies of Portales which was appreciated in the extreme by all, come again.

For the benefit of the citizens of Portales I shall state again the regulations of the war department provide that any judicial officer be granted leaves of absences from the front during the holdings of court, and attorneys and litigants may expect my return to Portales, New Mexico for this purpose, the first Monday of July next. From time to time, weekly if possible, I shall try to keep the people of Roosevelt county informed of the proceedings of the border.

The KITCHEN CABINET

MEALS FOR SMALL FAMILY.

When buying chicken, save the wing tips, neck and giblets for soup.

Chicken Pudding or Souffle.—Chop the uncooked white meat of the chicken, then rub it fine.

It is much better to entertain two or three guests on different days than to give a large affair which upsets the routine of the home.

Mutton Boudin.—Take a pint of finely chopped mutton previously cooked. Cook together for two minutes two tablespoons of soft crumbs and half a cupful of stock of water.

Left-over fish may be served in a cream sauce or in a salad, making very good dishes so that one may buy a fish, boil or bake it and not feel that it is too expensive for the small family.

The following is a good dinner menu for the small family: Tomato soup, broiled slice of fish with lemon butter, potato balls, sliced cucumbers with French dressing, apple pie, cheese and coffee.

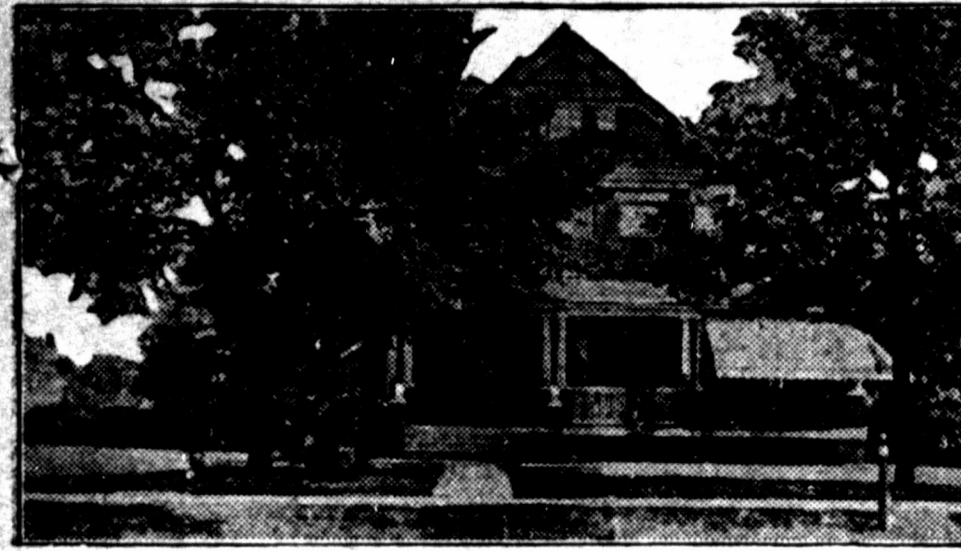

# THE HOME BEAUTIFUL

Flowers and Shrubbery  
Their Care and Cultivation



The Neatest Yard Has a Smooth Lawn.

## THE FRONT YARD

By E. VAN BENTHUYSEN.

The neatest yard now has a smooth lawn grass sod kept closely mown, while the flowers and shrubbery are restricted to the sides and rear. This not only renders the lawn more easily kept than where there are flower beds to mow around and trim, or trees or shrubs to dodge, but it is really more restful in appearance.

If there is room for only one shrub, let it be *Hydrangea paniculata*, the magnificent tresses of bloom lasting for weeks.

It should be cut back every spring fully half of the previous year's growth. While this may go against the will it insures larger blossoms and more of them.

A liberal mulching with stable manure is also in order. Roots may be transplanted in either spring or fall.

The *Deutzias* have extreme hardiness, neat form, profusion of bloom and early blossoms to commend them, and are worthy of a place in any collection.

Several of the *Spiraeas* are beautiful with graceful rose colored or white blossoms. While not all of these withstand the late frosts which come in May, just when they are ready to put forth their feathery bloom, the beauty of the blossoms when they are perfect atones for an occasional miss.

Among June blossoms none are greater favorites than the *Syringa* or mock orange, the flowers being as fragrant as beautiful. While the shrub itself is perfectly hardy, late frosts sometimes kill the buds; and an observing grower gives the rule that there will be orange blossoms when there will be peaches.

*Calycanthus* is a curious shrub, the brownish blossom being odorous of strawberries, yet with so many beautiful as well as fragrant blossoms it could scarcely head the list.

*Purple fringe* is an odd plant, the same smoke tree perhaps more accurately describing the appearance after midsummer, when the pedicels lengthen, branch and bear long plummy hairs, either greenish or tinged with red.

The *Spigelia* is handsome when in bloom, the tubular blossoms of white, rose or purple being produced in profusion. A variety with leaves variegated with gold is especially pleasing.

Instead of planting in rows the fancy is now to group the shrubs and the flowers for cutting. Place the taller ones in the rear with the shorter ones in front.

Arrange that the blooming season shall be prolonged throughout the

summer and see that no two specimens with blossoms which do not harmonize in color shall be in bloom side by side at the same time.

## PLANTS FOR NORTH WINDOWS

By BETTY PAKE.

To make boxes in windows with a northern exposure attractive and cheerful fill them with the following plants:

For vines, plant either variegated *vincas* or English ivy, or both intermingled. *Vincas* are very bright, but they will not survive exposure to freezing temperature, while English ivy will stand unharmed all through the winter. Either of these vines should be planted about one foot apart. The main part of the boxes can be planted with *begonias*, which can be procured from any florist in various colors, white, pink, red. The boxes, if planted wholly with material of a uniform height, are apt to have an artificial appearance, to prevent which, plants that grow taller and having a more graceful habit should be placed, say, one to every half dozen of the others, and for this purpose few plants equal *dracaena terminalis*.

*Panicles* do fairly well in the shade, and so does *salvia* or scarlet sage. If English ivy is used for a vine, it will be found to be of advantage in that when the other plants in the boxes are killed by frost the ivy remains and can be left all winter, with the space taken up by the other plants filled with small evergreens.

## OLD-FASHIONED FLOWERS

The rose-geranium slip planted early in May will soon become an immense plant with most luxurious foliage, which is one of the prettiest things for finishing your bouquet.

The leaves can be used for scenting handkerchief boxes, and a leaf placed on top of your jelly will give it a delicious flavor.

When only a few flowers are grown do not depend on the mignonette alone for fragrance. There are many other fragrant plants that have the added advantage of being beautiful in form and color.

## BRUGMANSIA

*Brugmansia* is a tender greenhouse shrub, and if started out of doors in the spring must be potted before frost. The flowers are beautiful—first a pale cream, turning to a pure white. They are trumpet shaped and the shrub is sometimes called "Angel's trumpet."

# In Woman's Realm

Fine Cotton Fabrics and Linen Lawns Most in Favor for Under-Garments—Little Really New in the Designs Shown This Season—Pretty Coat for Little Girl That the Home Dressmaker Should Be Able to Fashion.

There is nothing startlingly new in the designs displayed in new lingerie. Fllet lace is a more important feature than it has ever been, used as yokes for nightgowns and other garments. Entire corset covers are made of it. Cluny and hand crochet or tatted edgings are used with it, and often additional ornament in hand embroidery, which may extend from the fabric to the lace, appears on the most elaborate things.

A nightdress and an envelope chemise are shown in the picture, in which hand embroidery is applied to

her journeyings to and from the kindergarten or school and for her playtime and any other time during the cool days of spring.

The model shown in the picture is about as simply put together as it is possible for a coat to be. It is cut on familiar lines and presents no difficulties to the home dressmaker, because she may secure a pattern very like it from any standard pattern company. It hangs almost straight from the shoulders, and therefore there is little in the way of fitting to do. It is to be lined with messaline or other

fine nainsook. The nightdress is a "slip-over" model, with short sleeves cut in one with the body of the gown. It hangs straight and is finished with buttonhole-stitched scallops at the bottom. The neck and sleeves are edged in the same way. A floral festoon is embroidered about the top of the gown, and sprays of blossoms on the sleeves. It is a pretty fashion to embroider the initial or monogram on the top of one sleeve.

The envelope chemise is embroidered across the front with a bow-knot and flower pattern. The edges are finished with shallow scallops, with a fine val edging set under them. About the neck a narrow beading takes care of the baby ribbon which is threaded through it to adjust the garment.

The waist is held in place by a wider thin silk, and may be interlined with a light muslin.

In making coats at home it is a good plan to cut the interlining first and, if alterations are found necessary, make them when the interlining has been basted up and tried on the figure. When the interlining has been made to set as it should, the material for the coat and the lining is to be cut according to the interlining, which will serve as a pattern. Sometimes the collar is a little difficult to adjust, and sometimes setting the sleeves in properly gives the home dressmaker some uneasiness.

The coat pictured has a wide belt of serge terminating at each side, where it joins a plaited girdle of silk that extends across the front. This is fastened to the belt with a button at both sides and may be left off en-

tirely. The belt is stitched to the coat-along its upper side. The silk girdle is merely an item of decoration and, if it is omitted, a fourth button is to be added to the three large, fat bone buttons at the front.

The Democratic state convention at Albuquerque was, probably, the most wildly enthusiastic gathering of the disciples of Jefferson and Wilson that has for many long days assembled for purposes political. The delegates were optimistic and exuberant, and well they might be. They had assembled during the closing days of two of the greatest administrations New Mexico and the nation have had since the days of Thomas Jefferson. They had something to point to besides the errors of the party of special privileges. They felt that they had come together with much to praise and no blemishes on their own escutcheon to make excuses for. They had President Wilson and Governor McDonald to keep the fires of their enthusiasm burning brightly, supplemented by the splendid personality and unmatched eloquence of Mr. A. A. Jones. All these things combined were well calculated to keep the spirits of those in attendance at the highest possible pitch. While this feeling of optimism was the cause of much congratulation, it might, also, be said to have been a cover for a hidden danger. Certain elements, which are to be found in all parties, at once began to take advantage of the confidence and good fellowship that permeated the meeting, to urge the claims of their particular localities. The most noticeable instances along this line were Curry and Chaves counties. It would be a mistake, and one with fatal consequences, for this propaganda to gain any appreciable headway. The outlook is too bright, and the chances for success too flattering for us to fall into any such blunder at this time. There is not on the east side a candidate for a state office that would not weaken the ticket and decrease the vote here, without adding any strength on the west side. Roosevelt county wants no place on the state ticket and her people could not be persuaded to go to the polls to help ratify a blunder. The people are demanding that we hand these nominations to men, strong, sturdy men, not to politicians, ward heelers or localities. The magnificent administration of Governor McDonald has set for us a high standard, and that standard must be maintained. It were a thousand times better to lose at the polls if, to win, we have to encumber the state with some of the aspirants from Chaves and Curry. New Mexico cannot afford to pay the present salaries to officers who are not thoroughly equipped to perform the duties devolving on them. We Democrats of Roosevelt county are not without ambition, but that ambition will have been attained only when the state has been wrested from the control of the Republican handitti and placed in the hands, not of Democratic politicians and incompetents, but into the keeping of Democrats who are honest, efficient, strong and fearless. If we are to hold the honors won at the state fair last year, we will be compelled to go there with our very best. The counties outpointed last year have not gone down for the count, and no visible signs of distress. They are strong and nothing less than our best will bring the city of Tenochtitlan. 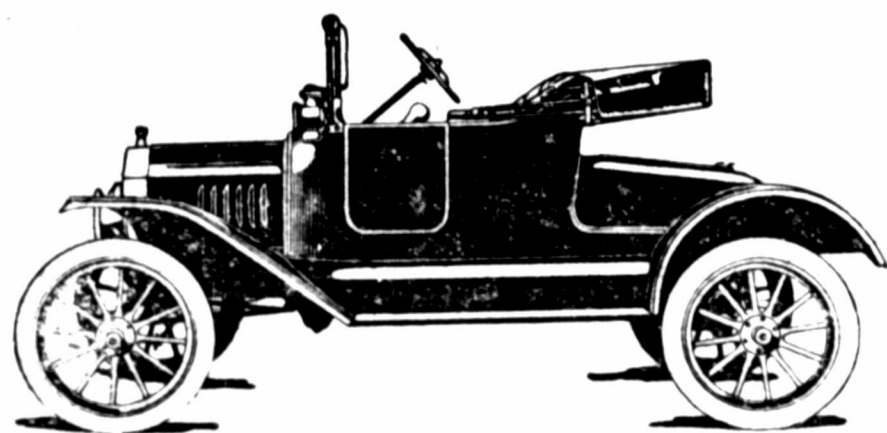

### Improvements at the New Mexico University

Any one who doubts that prosperity exists in New Mexico and the southwest has but to consider the troubles of J. L. LaDriere, an Albuquerque architect, who is in charge of the bids for the new chemistry and physics laboratories of the university of New Mexico, construction which will be begun this summer. The university will spend \$80,000 on the two buildings and the contract is a big one. The bids will be opened June 25th. To date the architect has received just six bids.

"The trouble with this bidding" said Mr. LaDriere in an interview here today, "is not in the plans or specifications, or because there is a prejudice against public work of the kind. It is simply that all the contractors are too busy to consider taking it on, or haven't time to work out specifications and a bid. There has never been a time in the history of this state when building was so general or so active."

Only one Albuquerque contractor has filed a bid on the university work thus far.

The plans for the two new buildings were drawn under the personal direction of Walter Hurley Griffin, the well known Chicago architect, who has been retained by the state university as consulting architect, for both building and grounds. It is hoped to have the physics laboratory ready for use during the coming college year which opens August 22nd. It is not likely that the new chemistry building can be completed for use during the coming year.

In addition to the new science buildings a considerable number of cottages for the students are to be built. The dormitories are filling rapidly and it now looks as if university would have a freshman class of 150 or more. The Albuquerque high school alone will contribute 35 freshmen from its class of 45. One of the smaller Pecos Valley towns will send 11 high school graduates to the university in August.

Joe Pinson was in from Arch Tuesday of this week. Joe says that he has several high grade Durham bulls that he would sell provided they were taken within the next few weeks. His stuff all wintered well and is in good condition.

### W. M. Cox Dead

Last Saturday's Fort Worth Record carried a story to the effect that W. M. Cox had been shot and killed near Corpus Christie, Texas. It appears that he had taken his gun to go kill some rabbits, leaving home early in the morning. He was found late that night in some bushes, dead, his arms folded over his chest. His gun had been discharged but the wound that caused his death was made by a gun of a larger calibre. There was no clue to the party who fired the fatal shot. It is not known whether this is the W. M. Cox who formerly lived here or not. He is supposed to be living in that vicinity somewhere.

### Base Ball Organization

The matter of the organization of a ball team at Portales is progressing nicely. The money has been raised for the grand stand and quite a few of the players have been showing up for the try out. The grounds selected are the same as were used last year and they are being put into splendid condition. Messrs. Waggoner and Whitcomb are working over time and things are coming along nicely. Portales will have a good team again this year.

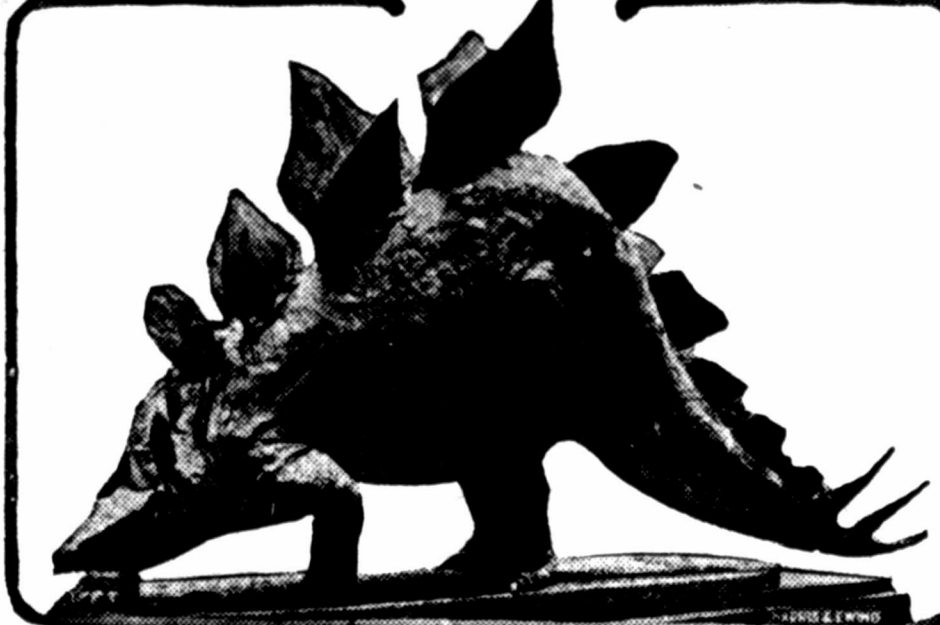
## AIDS TINY WAR VICTIMS

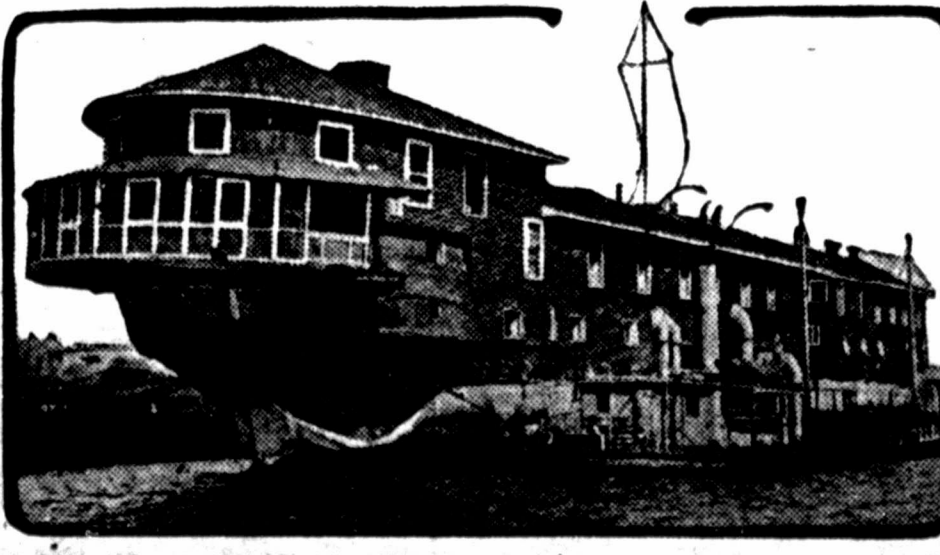

## A LAND PROBLEM AHEAD

(FROM THE PEORIA JOURNAL.)

The Nebraska State Journal calls attention to the fact that Uncle Sam's opening of a 4,000-acre tract in the North Platte irrigation district for settlement practically winds up the "free land distribution" of the nation. It adds:

"Free or cheap land has been the American safety valve. A population straining for self-betterment has had its own remedy—to go west and grow up with the country. With the government reduced to advertising an opening of forty-three farms, the safety valve may be considered forever closed. The expansive energy formerly exerted outward, must hereafter work itself out intensively. Increasing land speculation, with rapidly rising prices of land and proportionately increasing dissatisfaction among the landless would seem inevitable. The tone of our politics and the intensity of our social problems cannot but be vitally changed under the strain of dealing internally with a social pressure which hitherto has had the wilderness to vent itself upon.

"Land hunger" will soon become a reality in this rapidly growing country and the constant pressure of population, increasingly higher than the ratio of production, is bound to bring us face to face with economic problems that we have heretofore considered remote. The far-sighted statesman and publicist must devote his thought earnestly to the consideration of these questions if we are to escape the extremes which curse the older nations of the world."

In the above will be found one of the reasons that the Canadian Government is offering 160 acres of land free to the actual settler. There is no dearth of homesteads of this size and the land is of the highest quality, being such as produces yields of from 20 to 60 bushels of wheat per acre, while oats run from fifty to over hundred bushels per acre. It is not only a matter of free grants, but in Western Canada are also to be had other lands at prices ranging from \$12 to \$30 per acre, the difference in price being largely a matter of location and distance from railway. If one takes into consideration the scarcity of free grant lands in the United States it is not difficult to understand why there has been most material advances in the price of farm lands.

A few years ago, land that now sells for two hundred dollars an acre in Iowa, could have been bought for seventy-five dollars an acre or less. The increased price is warranted by the increased value of the product raised on these farms. The lands that today can be had in Western Canada at the low prices quoted will in a less time than that taken for the Iowa lands to increase, have a proportionate increase. In Nebraska the lands that sold for sixteen to twenty dollars per acre seven years ago, find a market at one hundred and seventy-five dollars an acre, for the same reason given for the increase in Iowa lands. Values in these two States, as well as in others that might be mentioned, show that Western Canada lands are going at a song at their present prices. In many cases in Western Canada today, there are American settlers, who realize this, and are placing a value of sixty and seventy dollars an acre on their improved farms, but would sell only because they can purchase unimproved land at such a low price that in another few years they would have equally as good farms as they left or

such as their friends have in the United States. The worth of the crops grown in Western Canada is of higher value than those of the States named, so why should the land not be worth fully as much. **USING SULPHUR FOR CONTROL OF DISEASE**

Applications for Potato Scab in Spring Are More Satisfactory Than Those in Fall.

An agricultural scientist has been carrying on investigations to obtain data regarding the effectiveness of sulphur for the control of potato scab, and his preliminary report has been received by the department of agriculture. The results thus far obtained indicate that spring applications are more satisfactory than fall applications. The benefits derived from the use of sulphur were greater when applied to land where no crop had been grown the preceding season than on land where such a crop had been used.

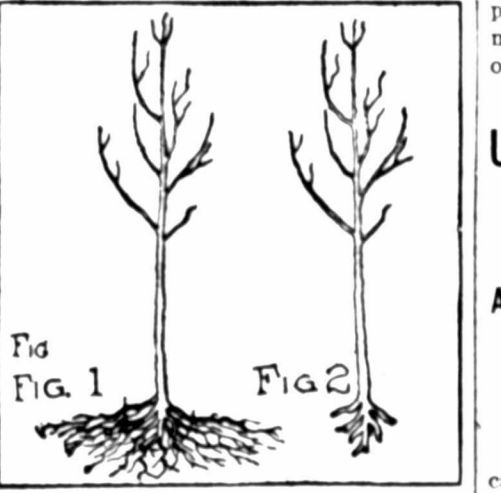
Seed treatment with formaldehyde and the application of sulphur to the soil gave better results than the sum of these two treatments used separately. Broadcasting of the sulphur on the soil after planting is considered the best method of application. When used in connection with fertilizers, sulphur was found more effective with ammonia sulphate than with sodium nitrate, with acid phosphate than with steamed bone, and with muriate than with sulphate of potash.

**PEACH-LEAF CURL IS READILY CONTROLLED**

Thorough Application of Lime-Sulphur Before Buds Swell Is Recommended.

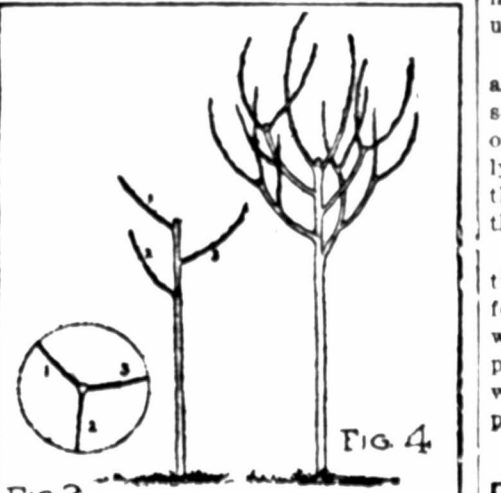
According to observations made by the New Jersey station, peach leaf curl can readily be controlled by a thorough application of concentrated lime-sulphur before the buds swell in the spring. Bordeaux mixture, applied early in the spring before the buds start, also will control leaf-curl, but the lime-and-sulphur mixture is advisable because it will control San Jose scale as well.

In using lime-sulphur it is essential to use a solution that has been properly prepared and diluted with water to a strength of not less than 1.03 specific gravity. The spray material should then be thoroughly applied so that every bud and small twig receives its coating. Any portion of the tree that is not covered with the spray material is likely to become infected. The object of the early spring application is to kill the spores of the leaf-curl fungus before they germinate. In other words, spraying for leaf-curl must be preventive as no cure is possible after the disease is established.



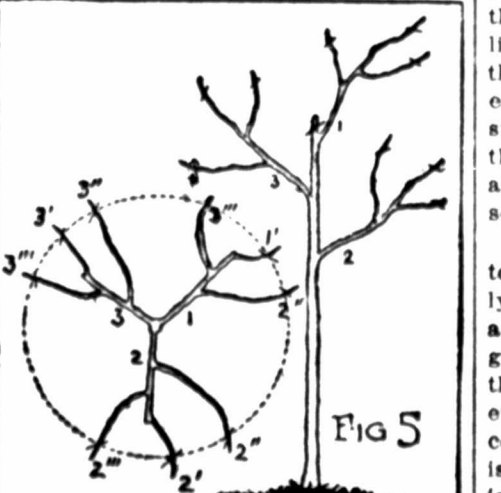
shows where the roots may have been injured in digging. In this case and also in Fig. 2 the untrimmed top is seen.

Figure 2 shows how the root system will look after the injured portions have been cut off. From this it is evident that the amount of top is far too great for the amount of root left on the tree. In Fig. 3 the same tree is



shown after it has been pruned and transplanted. In the circle may be seen the position which the three limbs occupy, as seen from above. It will be observed that they are practically equidistant from each other.

In Fig. 4 is seen a five-branched tree at the close of its first season's growth. The limbs were pruned back as indicated by the forking branches



which spring from the tips of the previous season's growth. Fig. 5 shows how Fig. 3 would look at the close of its first season; also where the pruning should be done either that autumn
