Bobcats Play Dalhart Friday Night After Defeating Friona 28-12

The Dimmitt Bobcats head for Dalhart Friday night to see if they can stretch their string of conference wins to two after handing the Friona Chiefs a 28-12 clobbering last week.

The Dalhart game has the potential of being a close one. The Wolves beat strong Canyon but fell before an even stronger Tulla, so they have to defeat Dimmitt to stay in the running for the conference title. It is also suspected by many local fans that Dalhart will join other teams in the conference in aiming especially for Dimmitt. The Bobcats, currently rated by AP as the No. 5 AA team in the state, have a reputation as the team to beat in conference IAA, and any team that takes the conference crown will have to do it in spite of the Bobcats.

Game time is 8 p.m. at Dalhart Stadium.

If Friona was supposed to be in the conference cellar this year, they have probably been undersold if Friday night's game was any indication. Despite the one-sided 28-12 score, the Chiefs displayed a nerve-wracking ability to puncture the Bobcat defense almost at will and actually played the Bobcats a lot closer game than the score indicated.

The Bobcats started scoring early in the first quarter when Marion Oakley recovered a Friona fumble on the Chiefs' 15-yard line. The Bobcats moved the ball across the field with halfback Jerry Hyatt making a two-yard dash for the first touchdown. They failed on the conversion attempt.

With the Chiefs holding their

ground through the second quarter, the Bobcats clawed through to a second touchdown in the third quarter when Junior Coffey made a 10-yard end sweep into paydirt. Carlos Barnes made a successful pass to Ted Collins for two extra points.

Following the Bobcats second touchdown, the Chiefs battered through to a first touchdown with halfback Gary Brooks making an end sweep on a three-yard run. They failed to convert. The Bobcats retaliated quickly with a third scoring thrust when Barnes made a quick 11-yard pass to Hal Ratcliff who was deep behind the goal line. Collins received a second safety final scoring bid when Brooks once again took the pigskin 10 yards or an end sweep with only two minutes of playing time left in the game. They failed on the extra point attempt.

One thing gratifying to Dimmitt fans was the awesome ability of the Bobcats to grind out yardage in five-yard chunks through holes opened by the capable forward wall in the Chief defense. The Bobcats turned off their usual aerial and end-sweep circus early in the game and started and maintained several fast drives with grinding plunges between the ends.

During the halftime, Miss Sharon Maynard, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Maynard of Dimmitt, was crowned Homecoming Queen.

Four men from Justice Precinct 4 came forward this week and filed petitions contesting the recent election approving the installation of package liquor stores in the northeast fourth of the county.

The men are Odie Moore, Otis McMenamy, Jimmy Barnett and Dan Heard. The petition was filed in 64th District Court here Thursday.

In a case that will probably wind up before the state Supreme Court, the four men are contending that it was unlawful to hold the election. Their petition does not in any way allege the election was fraudulent or that their was any dishonesty connected with it.

They are basing their contest of the election on the supposition that the case upon which the election was based was not applicable to Castro County. This case, known as Myers vs. Martinez, resulted in a Supreme Court decision which has stirred up a storm of controversy over the state. In this case Francisco J. Martinez filed suit against Jay S. Myers, County Judge of Dimmitt County (in Southwest Texas) and his four commissioners for refusing to call a liquor election in the incorporated city of Asherton, which lies in

dry Dimmitt County. Taken to the state Supreme Court, that body ruled that, according to a 1935 Constitutional Amendment, such an election was legal.

This decision pulled the cork out of the bottle and a rash of elections broke out all over the state—one of them occurring in Castro County's Justice Precinct 4.

The Castro County election is now being contested on the grounds that the Myers vs. Martinez case does not apply here.

In handing down its decision, the

Supreme Court ruled specifically in favor of Martinez, in instances which fitted Dimmitt County only, the petition said. The contention is that the court was so specific in its ruling that an election in this county cannot be based on the decision.

According to a statement by plaintiff's attorney Kenneth Hobbs, made Wednesday night, "In the Myers vs. Martinez case) the county involved voted 'dry' after the 1935 Constitutional Amendment to Sec. 20, Art. 16 became effective, whereas Castro County has been continuously 'dry' on a county-wide basis since 1903. As the Court in the Myers case specifically restricted its holding to the fact situation before it, the contestants here are urging that the case is not applicable to the local situation and that the law still is, that once an area votes 'wet' or 'dry' an election must be called in exactly the same area formerly voting, in order to be a valid election sufficient to charge to local option status of that area or any subdivision of it."

Fairly swift action is expected for the petition, since contested elections are given preference in

the courts. The case must first go through 64th District Court here, and then to the Seventh District Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo before reaching the Supreme Court. A final decision on the contested election should be forthcoming shortly after the first of the year, although this is just a guess.

The four men and their attorneys are optimistic about their chances of having the election ruled invalid by the courts. Although based to a certain degree on a technicality, they feel they have a strong case.

Named as defendants are County Judge Raymond Wilson and County Commissioners T. C. Ray, Noble Armstrong, Olin Rice and John C. Stork.

If the contesting of this election proves valid it will set the precedent for abolishing other similar elections over the state. Castro County's Justice Precinct 4 voted itself wet on October 10 by a heavy majority. Jumbo, Arney and northeast Dimmitt boxes turned

down the proposition but the Nazareth box was almost unanimous in approval. The precinct takes in the northeast one-fourth of Dimmitt and is bounded on the south by Highway 86; on the west by Highway 385 and a country road and on the north and east by Deaf Smith, Randall and Swisher County lines, respectively.

TWO MORE APPLICATIONS MADE FOR LIQUOR PERMITS

The process of turning Castro County wet in fact and not just by law moved a step further this week with applications being made for two more package store licenses. One of the applications is for Dimmitt's first package store.

The Dimmitt store will be owned by Claudine Terrazas and will be known as Warehouse Cut Rate Package Store No. 4. It will be located 75 feet east of the Dimmitt City Limits on the south side of the street between Hodge and Taylor's Corder Station and Ed Brock's garage.

Another store, to be known as the Oasis, will be owned by Clarence Schulte and will be located about one-third of a mile north of the Highway 86 and Buffalo Lake Road intersection at Nazareth.

This brings a total of seven proposed liquor stores in Castro County. Four of these are to be located in or around Nazareth, one at Dimmitt and one each near the Deaf Smith and Swisher County lines.

ASC Announces New Cotton Rules, Important Dates

County ASC secretary Charlie Hill this week announced that farmers applying for a new grower allotment on one farm must not own another which has an allotment.

"One of the eligibility requirements for a 1960 new farm cotton allotment has been changed from that of prior years," he said. "For 1960, a new farm will not be eligible for a cotton allotment if the owner or operator of the new farm owns or operates any other farm in the county, the state for which a 1960 cotton allotment is established."

He also pointed out several important dates that farmers should remember in connection with their association with government farming regulations. They are:

December 15—Cotton marketing Quota Referendum.

January 31, 1960—Deadline day to place grain in loan.

Feb. 15—Deadline date to make application for a new grower cotton allotment.

April 22—Deadline Date to release cotton allotment. Deadline date to make application for released cotton allotment.

May 5—Deadline date to reapportion Cotton allotment.

To file for social security benefits, she said, an applicant must have his social security card, marriage license, birth certificate or other age determinant, and service record if any.

Texas Extension Service, Utilities Sponsor New Community Contests

A new rural community improvement program has been inaugurated in Texas, according to an announcement made this week by Castro County Agent Charles Hottel.

For the past several years Castro County communities such as Flagg, Jumbo, Sunnyside and others have gained considerable recognition for their efforts at community improvements through the Farmer-Stockman sponsored Rural Neighborhood Progress Contest. Sunnyside, especially, won extensive recognition and one year was named the most progressive in the state. With the recent announcement that the Farmer-Stockman magazine was discontinuing the contest, the Texas Extension Service and Texas Electric utility companies elected to conduct about the same thing in the future.

The Farmer-Stockman contest has had a strong impact on county rural communities, resulting in community building improvements sign posts giving directions to individual farms, small parks and other improvements.

The new contests will be even more intensive than those in the past. "The electric utility companies operating in Texas has agreed to invest \$70,000 in this program during the next five contest years" Hottel said this week. "They are offering \$6,800 per year in prizes

for communities showing progress during a 12-month period, March 31, April 1."

Prizes in each of the 14 extension districts will be \$100 for first place; \$75 for second; \$50 for third, fourth, and fifth and \$25 each for sixth, seventh and eighth. The state awards will be \$500 for first, \$400 for second and \$300 for third.

Any community in the county that is interested can pick up the enrollment cards at the County Agents' office. The enrollment cards must be in the state office by December 31 of this year.

When the youth come around for "Trick or Treat" for CROP, they will not be asking for the traditional handouts of cookies, candies, etc, but instead will be asking for a cash contribution to send food to starving people overseas. CROP was organized in 1947 because Christian people heard of the terrible need and want abroad. Texas people have joined with other Christians in the nation each year at Halloween to share out of our abundance with those less fortunate. Last year the boys and girls all over the state of Texas collected \$48,200.00 for CROP. Food and other supplies are actually delivered to the needy by missionaries of the various denominations overseas.

Here is what a CROP dollar will do: \$10.00 will provide 44 children milk, bread, and rice daily for a year; 5.00 will give 65

children bread and cheese daily for a year; \$1.00 will give 15 hungry children a cup of milk daily for a year.

6 p.m. Saturday for instructions and assignments. They will leave for door to door collections at 6:30. At 8:00 they will meet at the Gym again to make their reports. At 8:30 they will have a

party consisting of various games and refreshments.

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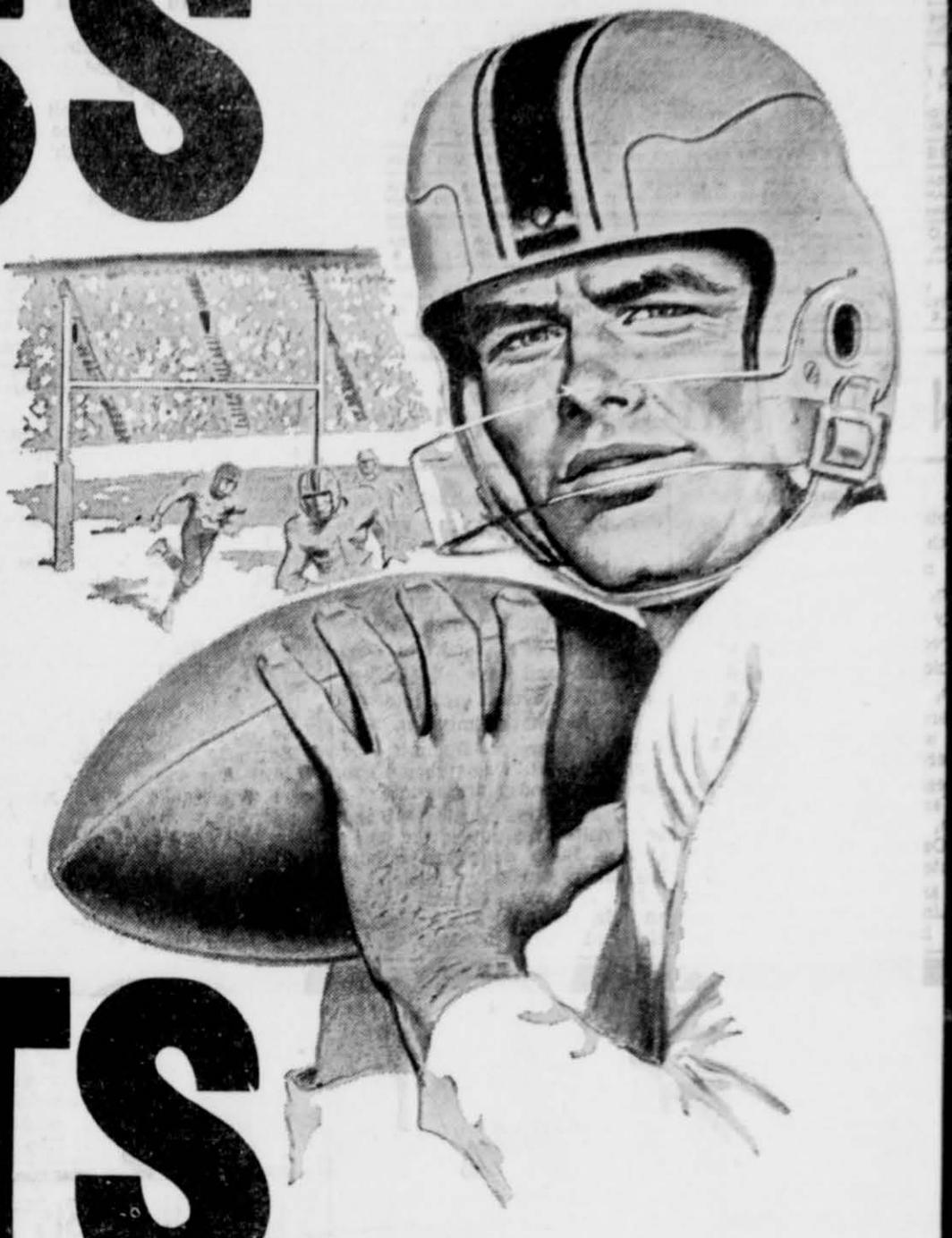
