Cotton Quota Referendum Set For December 15

A cotton referendum to register producers' approval or disapproval of cotton quotas will be held December 15 at eight polling places in the county.

If marketing quotas are approved, each farm operator will have the same choice next year as this year concerning two plans of planting cotton.

Plan A includes regular farm allotments, with price support available to growers who comply with their regular allotments at not less than 75 percent of parity.

Plan B includes 40 percent larger farm allotments and price supports to growers who comply with their plan B allotments at 15 percent of parity less than under plan A.

Individual farm allotments under Choice A and Choice B will be made available to producers prior to the referendum.

If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1960 upland cotton crop, only the regular allotment program will be in effect, and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity.

Liquor Election Contest Case December 3rd

A hearing in the suit contesting the legality of calling a liquor election in which sale of alcoholic beverages was approved in Castro County Precinct 4, has been tentatively set for 10 a.m., December 3 in Judge Harold LaFont's District Court in Plainview.

The announcement came after liquor stores in the county had been open for almost a week in Nazareth and East Dimmitt.

What effect the open package stores are having is hard to determine. Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright said this week that about ten drunks had been locked up over the weekend, which was an abnormally high figure. One man was arrested for drunken driving, but it was conceded this particular individual would have probably been arrested for the same offense if the county had stayed dry. The ten arrests for being drunk in a public place may have been just a coincidence, Cartwright said. Most reports were that the package stores did a brisk business over the weekend.

The suit being placed before the District Court contests the right of the Commissioners Court to call an election which enabled Precinct 4 to go dry. It does not contend there was any illegal procedure used in the election.

Bobcats Third As '59 Season Ends

The Dimmitt Bobcats, stunned by an earlier defeat by Tulia, lost their grip on a tie for Conference 1-AA championship Friday night when they fell before the Canyon Eagles at Canyon 14-12.

This brought to a close what had been one of the most promising seasons ever for the Bobcats. Coach J. D. Covington's football players ground out eight straight decisive victories over all comers and had been rated as number four class A team in the state by some. The Bobcats were plagued with misfortune their last two games, losing to Tulia on two in-

tercepted passes that were good for opposition touchdowns; and having Canyon drive over a touchdown in the last minute of play to win Friday night's game.

Coach Covington said this week that the Bobcats would be at least one year recovering from graduation losses. Friday night was the last game for Jerry Hyatt, James and Ted Collins, Carlos Barnes, Hal Ratcliff, Marion Oakley, Jack Ragland, Joe Burkett, Junior Pesina, Carl Lee Kemp, and Jimmy Slough — all Bobcat regulars.

The struggling Canyon Eagles battled back after sustaining a

two-touchdown deficit to take the game and knock Dimmitt out of a share of the title. Canyon will play Oilton for bi-district Friday night.

Junior Coffey scored both Dimmitt touchdowns, for an early lead, but both Bobcat conversion attempts failed. His first score in the chilling weather came in the first quarter and the second shortly after the third quarter opened. The second score, which gave the Bobcats a 12-point lead, was set up by a pass interception by Gene Bradley.

Canyon came bouncing back, with halfback Tommy Henderson scoring the Eagles' first touchdown on a 1-yard plunge. Fullback Chuck Nester ran the extra points to make the score 8-12.

With one minute to go in the fourth quarter, Nester rammed over from the one after a sustained drive to put the score at 14-12 with Canyon in the driver's seat.

Canyon made 248 yards rushing and 15 first downs to Dimmitt's 235 yards and 11 first downs. Canyon didn't complete a pass all night, but Dimmitt completed three of four for 18 yards. Dimmitt lost the ball twice on fumbles while Canyon did only once.

Third Operation Christmas Greeting Drive Begun By Doctors' Wives

Ladies of the Tierra Blanca Medical Society Auxiliary this week began preparations for the third annual "Operation Christmas Greeting" to be carried out in Castro County.

The women, all wives of doctors who practice within the county, use the unique drive to supply needed equipment to the Castro County Hospital.

"Operation Christmas Greeting" is supported by people who deposit the amount they normally spend on Christmas cards at the bank in a special account. Just

before Christmas a large Christmas greeting advertisement, bearing everyone's name who participated, is printed in the Castro County News.

The auxiliary says this not only helps obtain a better-equipped local hospital, but it also takes the work out of buying, addressing and mailing Christmas cards. There is also the added advantage that no one is overlooked, they say.

No particular piece or type of equipment for the hospital has yet been selected, according to Mrs. J. W. Spence. In past years a croupe tent for babies, an oxygen tent, incubator, and operating room overhead light has been supplied through this method. Ordinarily about a thousand dollars are collected through Operation Christmas Greeting from several hundred people.

Anyone wishing to participate may do so by depositing an amount to the Operation Christmas Greeting Fund in the First State Bank at Dimmitt or the Farmers State Bank at Hart.

Cranberries Out As Menu Item at School Cafeteria

Cranberries will not be served in the Dimmitt Grade School Cafeteria until it is fully determined that there is no danger involved, according to a statement made last week by Mrs. Earl White, cafeteria supervisor.

Mrs. White said there were many cans of cranberries on the shelves at the cafeteria. "I don't think there's any danger at all," she said, "but of course we can't take any chances."

The concern stemmed from an assertion by the Federal Food and Drug authorities that cranberries from certain northern states had been treated with a solution known as Aninotrazole during the past year as an insecticide. Since this insecticide has been found to cause cancer in mice and rats, the government decided to clamp down on cranberry sales from the 1959 crop.
