Take a cupful and a half of the crushed berries and beat with two a soft custard. If fresh berries are used, add a cupful of powdered sugar to a cupful and a half of berries.



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

Late in the afternoon of January 22, 1915, hours after the Sierra county election had been called, the proclamation filed and forwarded, the Republican Bosses got their nerve up to the point of holding an election for Sierra county in Santa Fe. They then elected Chaves to the seat stolen from Bojorquez.

Their action was the rankest ever recorded in the history of unscrupulous politics.

The Sierra county election, constitutionally called by Governor McDonald, was duly held and Bojorquez elected a second time by a vote of 338 to 2 for Chaves. Fifty-one of the 338 votes were cast for Bojorquez in Monticello, Chaves' home town. That was 13 more than Bojorquez received there at the first election.

Prominent Republicans of Sierra county forwarded to Santa Fe a telegram of protest against the unseating of Bojorquez. These Republicans included Max Kahler, county assessor; Will M. Robins, county treasurer; Dr. F. J Given, county school superintendent, and H. A. Wolford, former district attorney. Mr. Wolford even made a trip to Santa Fe in the hope of preventing the flagrant violation of the rights of the Sierra county voters.

When Bojorquez presented himself as a member of the House of Representatives a second time, with his second election certificate, the Republican Bosses laughed at him. "We are in control here," they said. "The people be damned."

Particularly importint, not only for builders, but for wners and the general public, are the sections devoted to floor and roof construction; chimneys, flues, smokepipes and fireplaces; fire stopping and general precautions for fire pro-

Generally recognized dangers from such old offenders as shingle roofs. inlined chimneys, unprotected stairways and shafts are strikingly illustrated, and many simple and effective, while relatively inexpensive, devices n construction which retard the spread of fire are clearly explained. Vegetable Ashes.

Do not throw away any vegetable ash, for all ashes have a decided garden value. Some seem to have the impression that trashy material returns ashes of little worth, but the reverse is often true. Ashes from cotton hulls have shown as much as 30 per cent of potash and sold for \$40 a ton. Some weeds would prove equally rich. In addition there is always some phosphoric acid and a heavy per cent of lime. That most precious element, nitrogen, however, was all burned out. therefore these substances would prove of greater value if allowed to decompose in the soil rather than be destroyed by combustion. Ashes of deciduous trees, being nearly all hardwoods, are of more value than those from evergreens, for the latter are nearly all conifers—pines, cypresses,

Making House Entrance Attractive.

To one who must watch expenses carefully, the solution of the entrance to the grounds of the country house is often a difficult task. When one can afford to employ the services of a landscape architect the problem is, of course, simplified.

The guiding spirit here, as in the structural features of the house itself. should be to create an entrance, simple, attractive, substantial and in harmony with the surroundings.

Stones are generally easy to procure in the country; therefore stone pillars with a durable gate between make an attractive entrance, within reach of even the limited purse.

Growing vines and flowers will add greatly to the general attractiveness of this approach and furnish the connecting link between entrance and grounds.

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

A good mixture for concrete tanks is one part cement, two parts sand and four parts broken stone or gravel. If neither gravel nor broken stone can be obtained, a mixture of one part cement and three parts of coarse sand can be used. The cement and aggregate should be thoroughly mixed and the resulting mixture well stamped or spaded when placed in the forms. After removing the forms the sides of the tank may be flushed with a mixture of cement and water to smooth up any little irregularities.

Re-enforcing Material.

Heavy woven wire fencing may be used to re-enforce the tank. Lap the ends of the re-enforcing at least six inches. The re-enforcing for the walls should be placed near the outer side and well covered with concrete.

It is preferable to have the forms of green lumber. If sensoned lumber is used, it should be dampened with water before the concrete is poured into the forms. This will prevent the dry boards from absorbing the moisture from the concrete, which if permitted, would cause the walls of the tank to crack.

OLD STRAWBERRY BEDS GETTING PROFIT FROM BEES

Dead Leaves Around Old Crowns Should Be Removed.

Plants in Center Should Be Thinned and Rest Thoroughly Cultivated With Hoe-Give Young Plants

By E. P. SANDSTEN, Colorado Agricultural College, Fort Collins, Colo.) As soon as the picking season is over, the strawberry bed should be mowed and raked off. The dead leaves around the old crowns should also be removed and burned. The rows are generally crowded with plants in the center, and these should be thinned out and the rest thoroughly cultivated with the hoe. Then the beds should be given a coating of well rotted barnyard manure and worked into the ground, and a liberal supply of water applied.

Chance to Start.

In many cases where the rows are heavily matted and the young plants have taken root between the rows, it is advisable to plow up the center of the rows, leaving the young plants to chance. The bee is a faithful and deform the new row.

Strawberry plants produce the heaviest at the first season's fruiting and decline very rapidly after that time. For this reason, it is advisable to remove the old plants and give the younger ones a chance to develop. The old plants can easily be told from the young plants by the roots. Old plants have dark-colored roots, while young plants have light-colored. It is not always possible to prevent the blight, but you can control it in Expert at Madison Station Ad- Well-Cured Crop Is Worth Extra large measure by thorough and frequent spraying with bordeaux mixture. The first spray should be put on when the potatoes are about six inches high and should be repeated at Intervals of ten days to two weeks as the new leaves appear.

To make the bordeaux mixture dissolve six pounds sulphate of copper in 25 gallons of water. In another vessel slake six pounds of fresh stone lime and dilute to 25 gallons. Strain the lime solution and mix the two together when you are ready to spray. Do not attempt to keep from one spraying to another any of the unused mixture.



The disease usually appears when the fruit is nearly grown. Watch carefully for the leaf spot and spray as soon as it appears. If the weather is favorable for its development, spray two weeks before the melons begin to mature, and make a second application a week later.

TO PREVENT HORNS GROWING

Clip Away Hair Surrounding Buttons on Calves and Then Make Use of Caustic Potash.

Horns on dairy cows are a common source of annoyance to dehorned cattle and oftentimes the udders of cattle are seriously injured by horn jabs. Unless the cow is used for show ring purposes by all means remove the

To keep a herd of hornless cows the best way is to begin by dehorning the calves. This can be done when the calf is but four or five days old by using caustic potash. Simply clip away the hair surrounding the small buttons and rub on the caustic potash until the skin bleeds slightly or until a small blister is formed. If the work is properly done a dent can be felt in the skull in a few days and no horns will develop.

FUNGOUS DISEASE OF BEANS

Both Wax and Green Varieties are Troubled With Anthracnose-Spray With Bordeaux.

Anthracnose is a fungous disease of both wax and green beans, appealing first as small purplish discolorations but later developing into large, dark spots surrounded by a light brown ring. These spots often run together. A pink mass of spores forms in the center of these spots. The fungus penetrates through the pod and into the seed, causing it to become spotted. The most important method of control is by seed selection. If the disease appears early, the plants can be sprayed with a 3-5-50 formula of bordeaux VALUE OF GOAT RECOGNIZED mixture. HOW TO USE A HOE

So many people have a horror of using a hoe. It is the most comfortable implement to be found in the equipment of a gardener or farmer. It is so handy to use for so many purposes that one cannot get along with-
