## In CA candidates' dispute

# Court denies new hearing

Just because any particular candidate is a native son of any particular community should not be the overriding motive for the people of the community to support him with their vote and influence. There should be more compelling reasons to support a candidate other than the fact that he is a native son of a community. This I would agree to at the outset.

However, if a native son is a candidate for high office and if his friends and neighbors are convinced that he is the best qualified candidate for the office, he should get their unqualified support and endorsement in his race for Congressman from the nineteenth district of Texas.

State Senator Kent Hance is a Dimmitt native and a graduate of Dimmitt High School. He was a respected and popular member of the DHS student body, serving as president of the group during his senior year. His college and professional career as an attorney made him a popular candidate for the State Senate where he made an outstanding record in his freshman year. ## Rites are held for G. C. Miller Wednesday

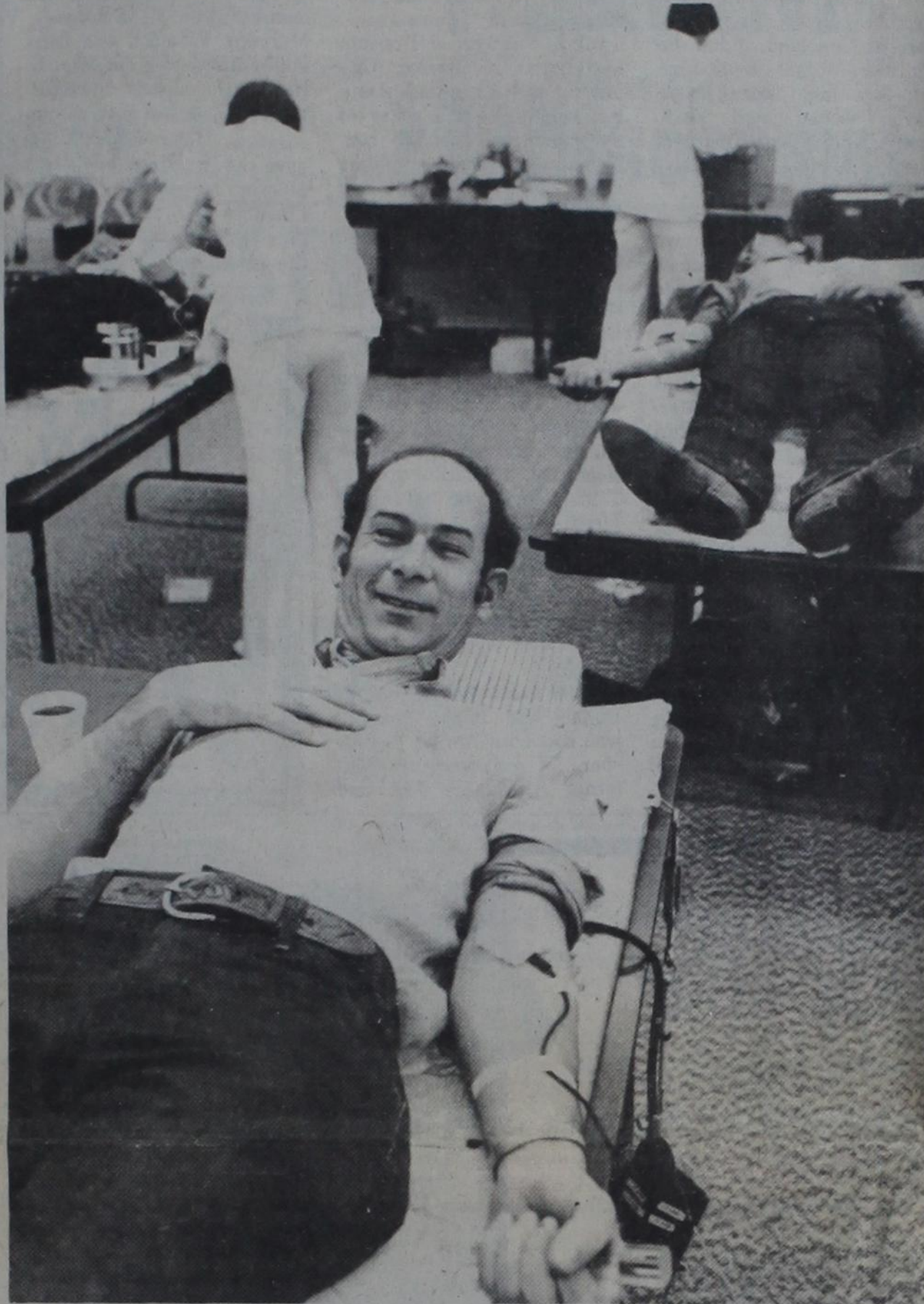
Goodwin Miller, 79, a Dimmitt resident more than half a century, died Monday evening in Plains Memorial Hospital.

Funeral services were scheduled at 3 p.m. Wednesday in the Bedford Street Church of Christ with Ronnie Parker officiating, assisted by Dale Wells, minister, and Miguel Zuniga. Burial was to follow in Castro Memorial Gardens, under direction of the Dennis Funeral Home.

Born Dec. 9, 1898, in Hill County, Mr. Miller had lived in Castro County 51 years. He was a retired merchant and farmer, who formerly operated a hardware business here.

He is survived by his wife, Jeanie; a son, Jack, and a sister, Pearl Sheffy, all of Dimmitt, also two granddaughters and two grandsons. Named active pallbearers were Fred Bruegel Jr., Don Carpenter, Bill Gregory, Russel Moran, Charles Nutt and Dean Wiseman.

## Deputy hired for Summerfield

At its Monday meeting, the Castro County Commissioners' Court voted to advance \$300 for the county fair, gave the sheriff permission to hire a new part-time deputy at Summerfield, discussed cleaning of the Expo Building, and canvassed the votes in the county school board election.

Since the rodeo has been moved to June, a committee of citizens and representatives of the Old Settlers Association are trying to combine the Old Settlers Reunion with the county fair which is usually held in September.

The commissioners agreed to give \$300 toward small cash prizes for the fair.

The commissioners approved the hiring of James Dobbs

as part-time deputy at Summerfield. Dobbs will be paid \$50 per month plus 10 cents per mile.

Nell Ingram and Carolyn Sides appeared before the commissioners to express their concern for the way the County Exposition Building and its contents have been used.

"When we were cleaning up for the Texas Home Demonstration Association district meeting, we were shocked and dismayed at what we found," Mrs. Ingram said. "The chairs nearly all had something sticky on them and many of the tables were dirty and some are broken. We also found evidence of the use of alcoholic beverages."

After a long discussion, the

commissioners decided to table the matter until a possible overseer for the building could be found.

The votes in the county school board election were canvassed and approved. Trustees Percy Hart of Precinct 1 and Houston Lust of [See DEPUTY, Page 10]

## Rawls places on All-Star North team

Rocky Rawls, the Dimmitt Bobcats' much-honored forward, has been named again to a notable team, the North All-Stars who will play at the annual convention and clinic of the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches July 20.

The North-South All-Star game will be played at the Hofheinz Pavilion in Houston to climax the coaches' annual meeting.

Rawls is the first Dimmitt player ever chosen to play in the all-class, all-star game.

"I think his selection shows what class of player Rocky really is," said Coach Ken Cleveland, who was the North All-Star coach last year. "It's as much an honor as being chosen all-state."

The Dimmitt senior guard has already been named to the two principal consensus Class AA all-state teams this year. The Basketball Coaches Association and Texas Sports Writers Association both picked him for first team position.

He was also selected for the first unit of the Panhandle-Plains Super Boys' Team, compiled from schools of all classes by the Amarillo News-Globe.

The Seventh Court of Civil Appeals in Amarillo Monday refused to grant a motion for re-hearing on its decision to bar County Attorney Jimmy Davis as a candidate in the May 6 Democratic Primary.

Davis' attorneys appealed Wednesday to the Texas Supreme Court, asking it to reverse the appellate court's decision and declare Davis an eligible candidate for the county-district attorney's post.

The chain of legal action began several weeks ago when Keith Lemons of Hart, a Baylor University Law School student who is opposing Davis in the county attorney's race, filed a civil suit in 64th District Court here to keep Davis' name off the ballot.

The suit alleged that Davis, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Robert Buntyn, had not met the six-month county residency requirement by the Feb. 6 filing deadline. Davis moved here from Lubbock to take the post after Buntyn's death.

Oscar Wylie, County Democratic Chairman, was named as defendant in the suit. Judge George Miller of Floydada, hearing the case here, ruled March 9 that the 64th District Court did not have jurisdiction in the matter, and Lemons appealed to the three-judge Seventh Court of Civil Appeals.

On March 22 the appellate court enjoined Wylie from placing Davis' name on the ballot. Attorneys for Wylie and Davis immediately filed a motion with the court for a re-hearing.

By refusing a new hearing Monday, the appellate court upheld its original decision—that Davis had not met the residency requirements of Article 1.05 of the Texas Election Code.

Meanwhile, absentee voting in the Democratic primary is scheduled to begin Monday.

## Pupil transfer deadline May 1

The deadline for students to apply for transfer to the Dimmitt Independent School District will be May 1, Supt. Robert Ryan announces.

Application forms may be picked up at the school administration offices, 608 W. Halsell.

Any student who resides outside the district and wishes to attend Dimmitt schools must make application to transfer, Ryan said. Also, students moving to other school districts must transfer to the district where they will reside.

## Three Swiftettes named to UPI all-state squad

Three girls from the Nazareth Swiftettes' second-time State Class B championship team have been placed on the all-state team picked by United Press International news service.

Forwards Cheryl Hartman and Karen Schulte were chosen for the first team and guard Colleen Gerber on the second team.

Hartman and Gerber had previously been named to the state all-tourney team, with guard Lynora Braddock. Schulte was an all-state forward last year when the Swiftettes won their first state title.

Schulte made 261 field goals for her team this year, for a 52.3 percent with long shots as her specialty, and she led the Swiftettes in percentage of free throws, making 161 for 74 percent. She hit for a total of 284

points.

Hartman broke team records with 1,258 points for the season. She is credited with 537 field goals, a 68.7 average, and 185 free throws for 70 percent. She also got 95 offensive rebounds, 11 defensive rebounds and 60 steals.

Leading the team in steals with 84, Schulte was credited with 77 offensive rebounds and 6 defensive rebounds.

Gerber had an impressive 191 defensive rebounds, 80 steals, and 21 tie balls. Gerber, a junior, with Braddock and Germaine Pohlmeier were the guards in state championship play who cut Avinger's field goal average to 38.2 percent and Graford's to 39.5 percent as they defeated those two final challengers.

Named on the all-state first team with the two Nazareth players were Jill Floyd of Sands, Celeste Hoehn of

Crawford, Janet Jurezek of Eula and Cindy Skeen of Fallett.

On the second team in addition to Gerber are Liz Chaloufka of Moulton, Belinda Flores of Austwell-Tivoli, Annette Nester of D'Hanis, Suzue Brasher of Sands and Deb Gunter of Gustine.

## Grand Jury indicts four

The Castro County Grand Jury indicted four persons on felony charges last Wednesday.

Indicted on burglary charges were David Wayne Banks and James Loggins Jr. They were charged with the March 18 burglary of Paxton Tire & Service, in which four tires were taken.

Mrs. Roke Acosta was indicted for theft by check, and County Attorney Jimmy Davis said authorities are now searching for her in the Hereford area. She was charged with passing a rash of hot checks to several Dimmitt merchants last Christmas season.

Cruz Quintero was indicted for felony DWI. He was charged with an April 2 incident involving a collision between his car and another.

All four of those indicted will stand trial in District Court here.

## Track meet scheduled here today

Dimmitt will host its first track meet in a decade or more today (Thursday) when 14 teams of seventh, eighth and ninth grade boys compete here.

Field events will begin at 1 p.m., and running events will start at 1:30 at the Dimmitt High School track.

Entries from Vega, Farwell, Bovina, Hart, Littlefield and Dimmitt will compete in both the seventh and eighth grade divisions, while the freshman meet will be a two-team affair.

"We need all the volunteers we can get to serve as judges and timers," Junior High Coach Shott Miller said. "The Kiwanis Club is helping with the meet, but we could use any others who would like to help."

Local citizens interested in working with the meet were to gather at 9 p.m. Wednesday at the DHS field house for a pre-meet briefing with coaches.

DHS Head Track Coach Jerry Vance said today's meet marks the "coming of age" of the school's track and field facilities, following a three-year building program. The latest improvement was an all-weather surface for the curbed track this year.

Construction of the present track behind the high school plant was started three years ago, before the football stadium was moved. It's part of a complex that also includes the football field, tennis courts, field house and practice field.

"Our track facilities are getting to be as good as any Class AA school's, and better than some AAA schools," Vance said.

Describing track and field as "the basis for all other sports," Vance added, "I can't stress too much how much this meet (today) will mean to our track program. It will help get the kids in front [See TRACK MEET, Page 10]

Looking for a range?

Look for kitchen range sales in April—but, before shopping for a new range, consider the multitude of styles, features and prices offered.

First, evaluate kitchen layout and decide which type of range best suits the family's needs and kitchen space.

The types include the free-standing range, the built-in range with separate cooktop and oven, the drop-in range, the slide-in range and the split level with an oven above and below.

Next, decide which fuel type is preferred—either electric or gas.

Generally, gas models cost about \$20 to \$30 less than electric, and they have a somewhat lower operating cost.

With today's fuel costs, gas models are more economical to operate than electric models—but, in the future, they might not be.

With a gas range, look for those with an automatic ignition with an electronic or mechanical lighting device.

Generally, these are found in more expensive models but are becoming available in other price ranges. This automatic ignition device eliminates the need for a pilot light, thus saving 30 to 40 percent of the gas used by that appliance.

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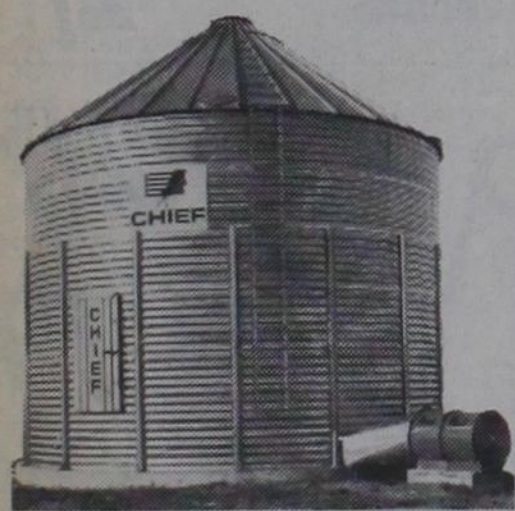

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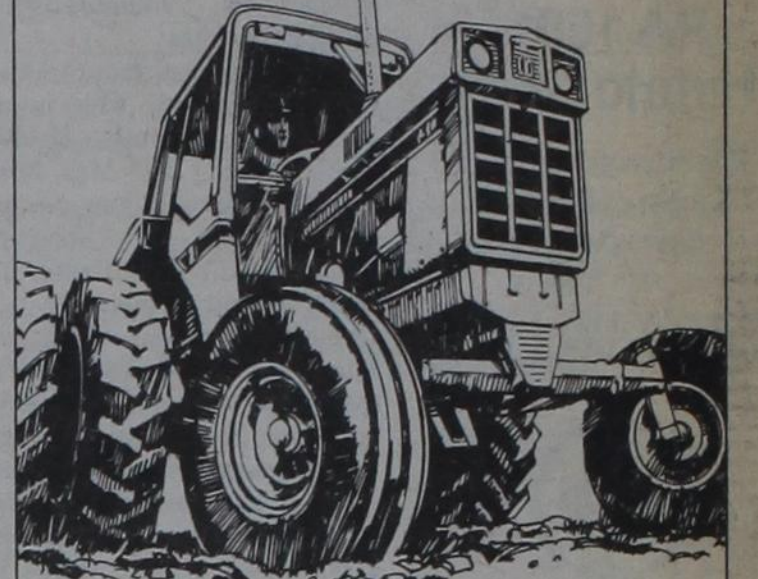

## Farm program changes for 1978 are detailed

Wheat grazing and hay provisions—Producers may receive payment for wheat planted for harvest as grain which they elect to graze or cut immature for green chop hay or silage. The payment will be the higher of the 1978 wheat deficiency rate or \$.50 times the farm established wheat yield times the acres for payment.

The acres for payment are limited to the larger of 50 acres or 40% of the total acreage of barley, corn, grain sorghums, upland cotton and wheat intended for harvest as grain in 1978, not to exceed the wheat acreage planted for harvest as grain. This acreage cannot be increased after sign-up, but will be reduced if it exceeds the maximum based on actual planted acreage.

The designated acreage must be protected from erosion. Other forage crops, excluding corn and grain sorghum, may follow the wheat for grazing and hay, but not for grain or seed. These acres will not be recorded as 1978 wheat acreage and will be ineligible for 1978 deficiency or disaster payments and will be charged against the NCA.

1978 Voluntary Diversion—Producers on farms that grew barley, corn or grain sorghum in 1977 now have the option for voluntary diversion in 1978 for any or all of these crops equal to 10% of the 1978 acreage for harvest.

The payment will be \$.20 per bushel for corn, \$.12 per bushel for barley and grain sorghum and \$.02 per lb. for cotton times the farm estab-

lished yield times the actual acreage for harvest.

The 1978 acreage of corn, grain sorghum, or barley for harvest with voluntary diversion will be limited to the 1977 planted acres. In order to participate in the voluntary diversion for upland cotton, the 1978 planted acres plus voluntary diversion may not exceed the acres planted to upland cotton in 1977. The total acreage of NCA crops, required set-aside, voluntary diversion and any grazing and hay acreage for wheat payment cannot exceed the farm NCA.

One-half of the payment for voluntary diversion and grazing and hay acreage will be made at a sign-up time based on intended acreage. These payments will be charged against the payment limitation of \$40,000 for 1978.

Set-aside—Castro County has been approved for Emergency Grazing of 1978 set-aside until June 1.

After last week's games, the Buckskins are leading Major League standings and the Spurs top the Minor League, both without a loss for the season, in girls' Kids, Inc. basketball.

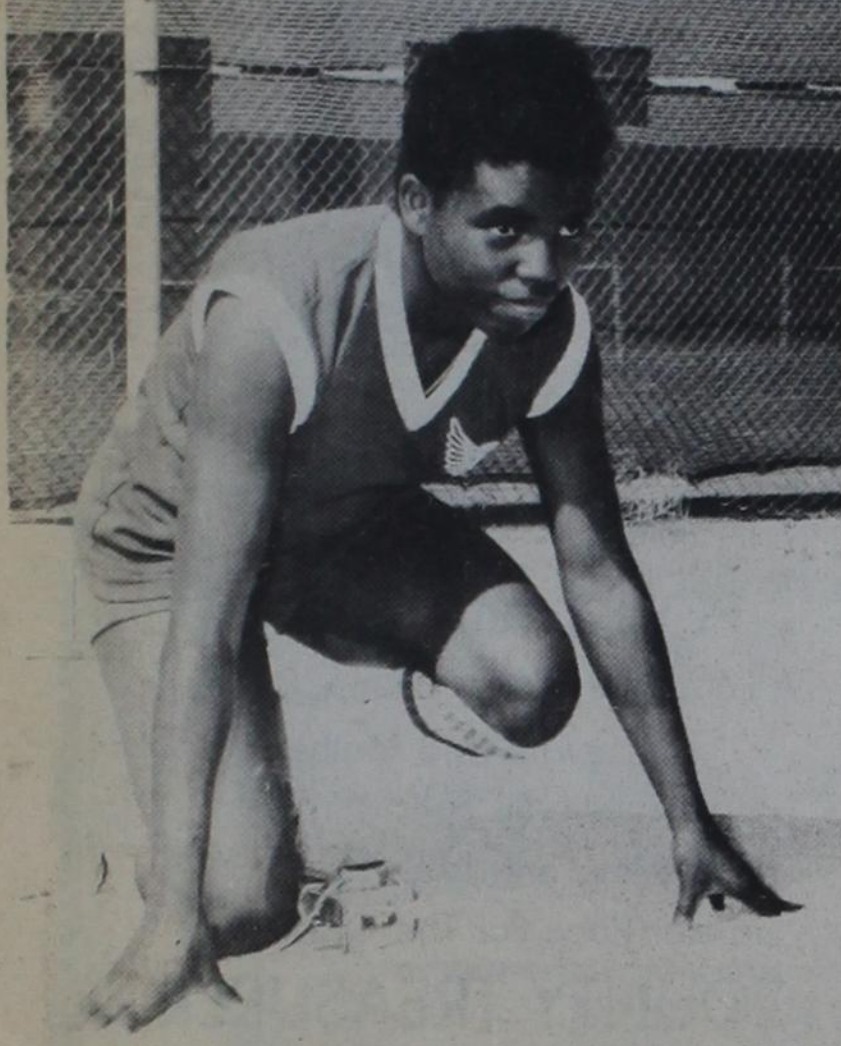

## DHS all-state list longer than reported

When the News printed Dimmitt High School's all-state list in boys' basketball in its March 30 issue, the names of two former all-staters were omitted.

As it turns out, not two but three Bradford brothers have been all-staters.

And not three but four members of the 1975 state championship team made all-state.

Omitted were the names of Bob Bradford, who made the Texas Sports Writers Association's third team in 1966; and Steve Myatt, who made the TSWA second team in 1975.

Bradford was the first in his family to make all-state. He was followed by his brother Kent (TSWA first team) in 1971, and by brother Jim (all-state tournament, TSWA first team and Texas Association of Basketball Coaches second team) this year.

The Bradford brothers are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. James Bradford.

Myatt was the senior post forward on Dimmitt's 1975 state championship team. He was named to the consensus all-state team after three of his teammates—Craig Williams, Wayne McKee and Jim Birdwell—had already been named to the all-state tour-

ament team. The News simply neglected to add his name to the all-state list in its basketball file that year.

Probably no team in Texas schoolboy basketball history has had more all-staters than Dimmitt's 1975 team, with four. Another Dimmitt team, the 1952 state champions, had three all-staters.

The revised list shows that Dimmitt High School has had 23 all-staters in boys' basketball since 1944 (not counting honorable mentions). Five made all-state under Coach John Blaine during an eight-year period (1944-52), two made it under Coach Johnny Ethridge in 1960 and 1961, and 16 have earned all-state honors under Coach Ken Cleveland in the last 17 years.

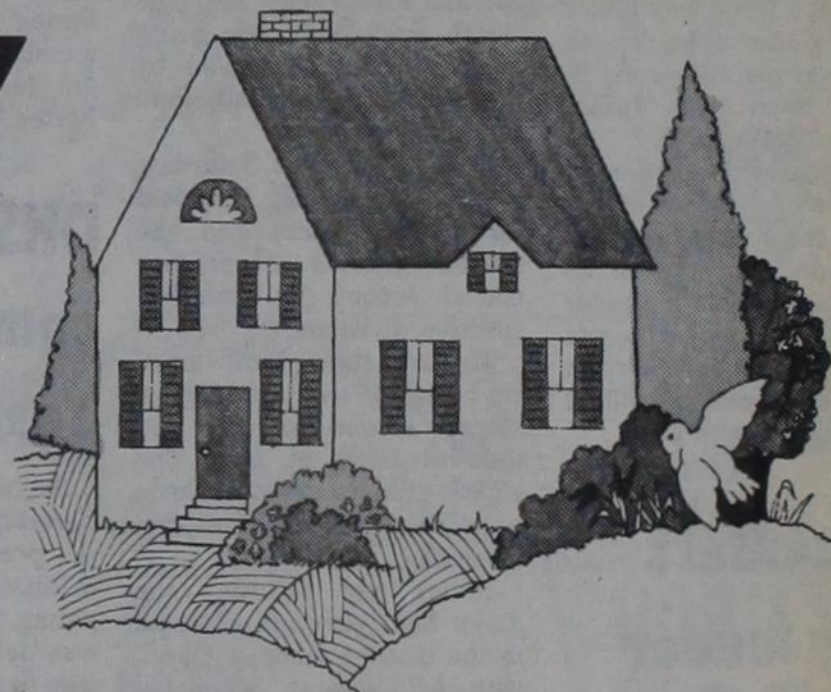

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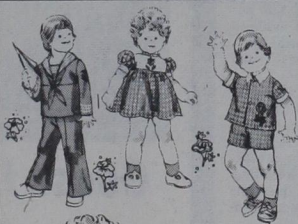
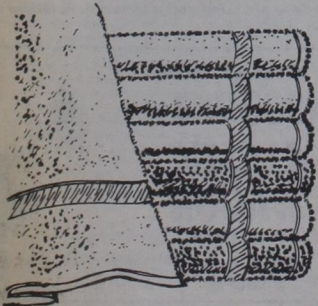
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## Rodeo Queen contest rules are announced

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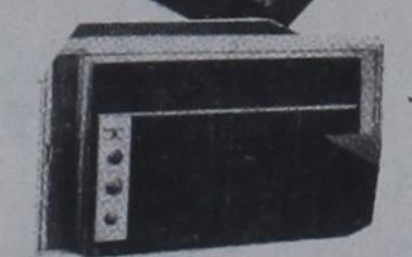


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**Bethel 4-H's tour elevator**

**VETERAN'S SERVICES**

The office will be closed beginning today (Thursday) until April 18, but I may be contacted at my home, 647-4368, for needed services on Saturday.

The Veterans Administration has initiated a study to verify the accuracy of disability and death pension benefits being paid to wartime veterans and their widows, and dependency and indemnity compensation being paid to dependent parents of deceased veterans. Some 3,100 VA beneficiaries will be receiving a letter in the very near future, advising that a Veterans Administration representative will visit them to discuss their entitlement to benefits.

The primary purpose of the study, according to a recent VA announcement, is to measure the accuracy of the current reporting and processing procedures used by the VA. The study, when completed, will provide the VA with information which will determine what changes need to be made in the way in

which eligible persons must report their annual income and net worth to the Federal agency. At the present time, such persons must complete an annual income report sent to them on Nov. 1 of each year. Benefit payments for the current year and the following year are determined by the income information furnished by the veteran, widow or parent. Those older than 72 who have been on the rolls for more than two years do not receive the AIQ cards.

The letters which are to be mailed to those persons who are included in the survey state that participation in the study is mandatory by law. Failure by any person to cooperate may result in the suspension of any VA payments that are being made. When the VA representative calls on pensioners, he or she should insist upon being shown proper identification. Any VA employee chosen for this personal contact survey will have ample identification, and will not hesitate to produce it for verification of his or her status.

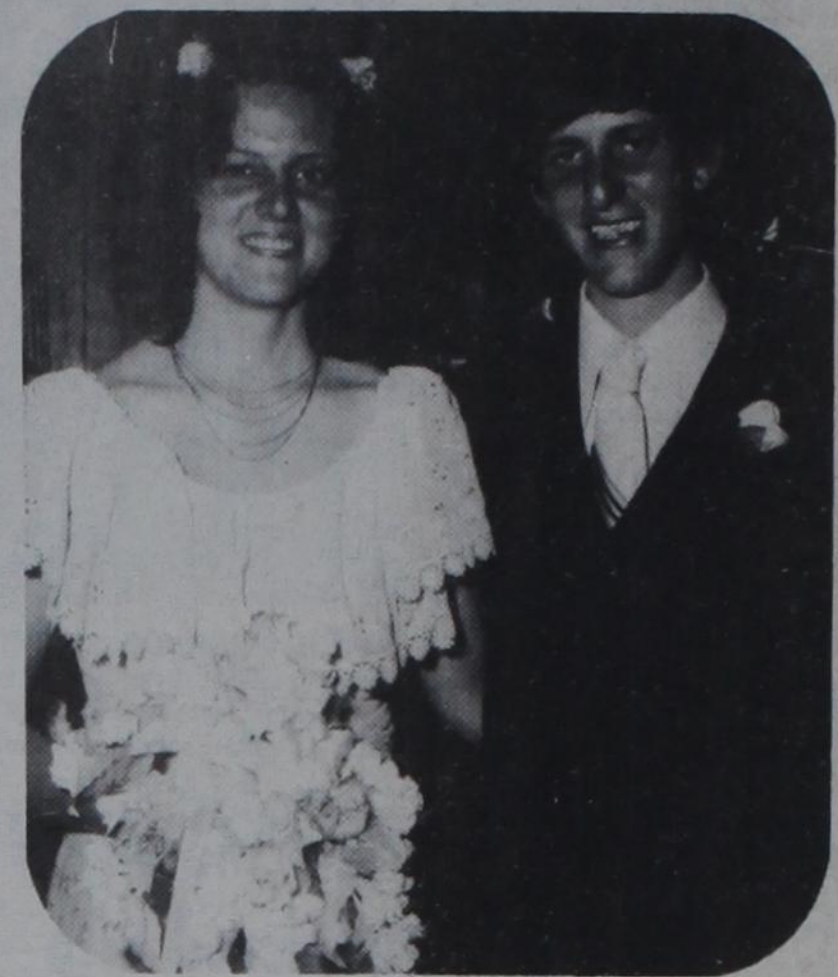

A move by the Environmental Action Foundation three years ago has begun to dramatically affect electric utility companies. The Foundation published a handbook, "A Citizens's Guide to the Fuel Adjustment Clause." The pamphlet catalogues the abuses in the fuel adjustment clauses and it has been used by consumer groups fighting the fuel adjustment clause in various states.

The pamphlet charges that electric utilities in many states have charged excessive amounts under the fuel adjustment clause, since, being automatically added to the electric bill, there is no real incentive for the utility to shop for the cheapest fuel. In some states consumers have not benefited from downward fuel adjustments when fuel savings are realized. California even allows utilities to increase electric rates based on estimated fuel costs and keep any additional revenues even if the estimates were too high.

West Virginia has abolished the fuel adjustment clause completely. Other states are considering a number of schemes to limit further the circumstances under which fuel costs can be passed through directly to the consumer. The Maryland legislature is considering a 5% maximum limitation on fuel adjustment charges while Virginia has adopted a system which requires separate hearings on fuel adjustment charges by Virginia utilities.

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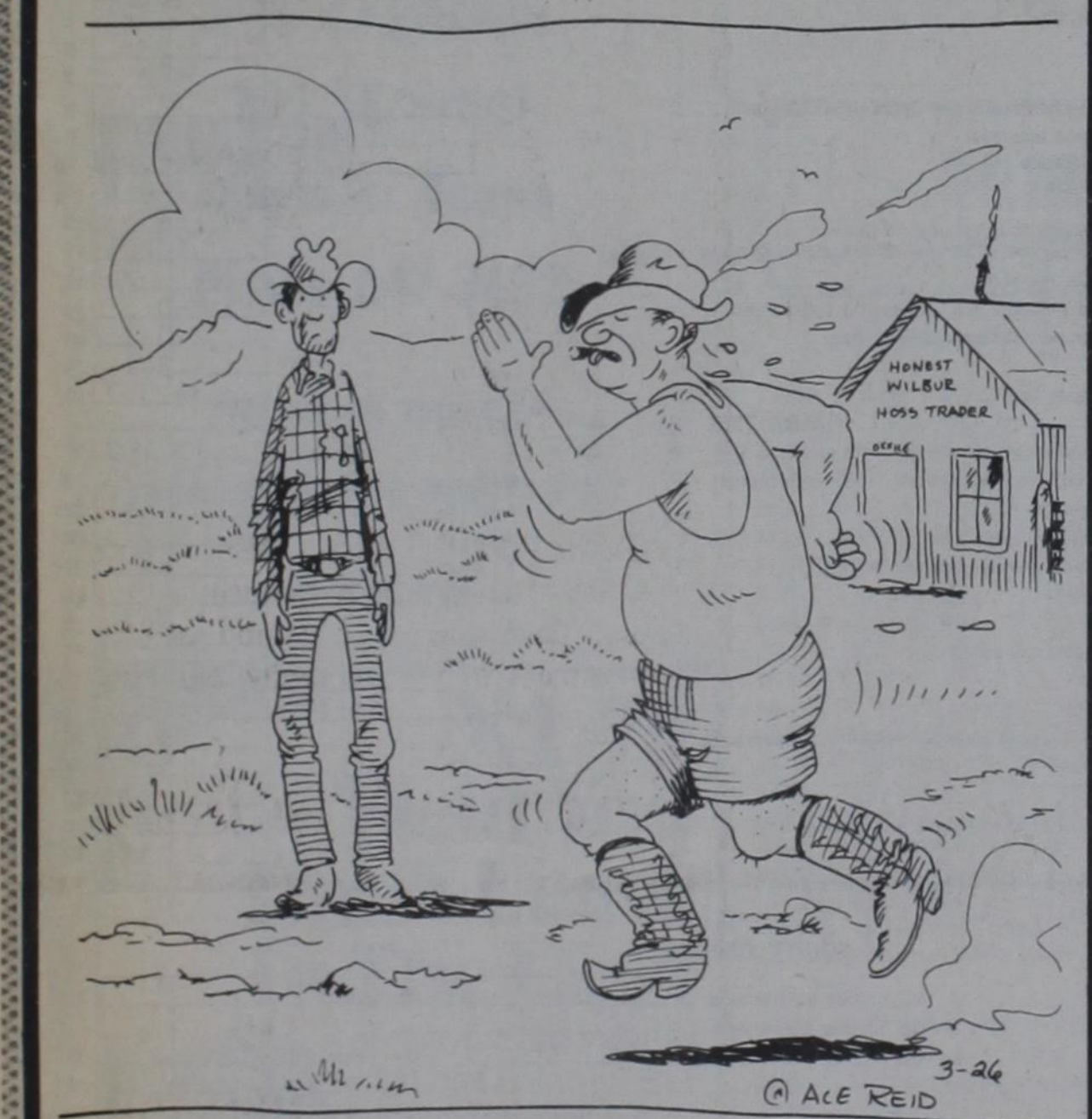

### View from the Library

And now . . . another infrequent book review featuring just what you've been waiting for, a review of H. R. Haldeman's new book "The Ends of Power."

The Watergate gang has to pay its bills and libraries all over the land are helping them by buying their books; thousands of Americans are helping out too. John Dean and Charles Colson have published their books, so have Ehrlichman and Magruder and on and on ad nauseum.

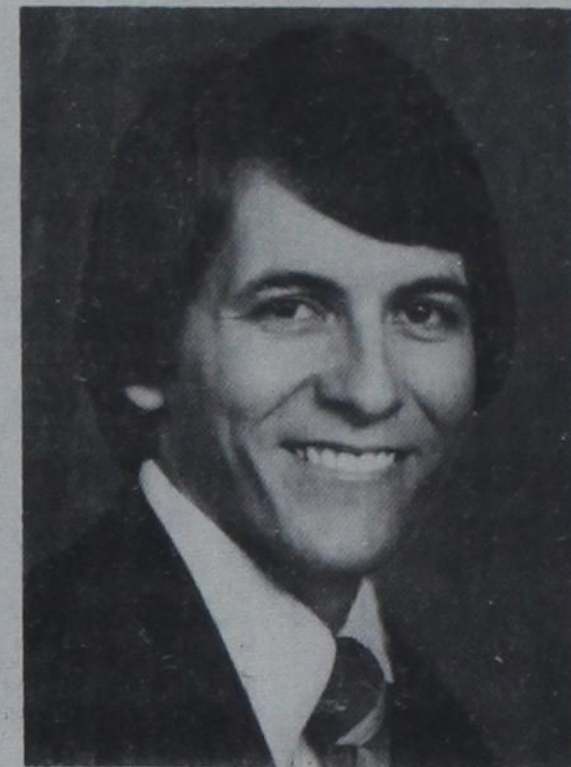
However, this book by Haldeman has merit. Haldeman does not detail his spiritual life in prison or he doesn't tell an allegorical government story or he doesn't bemoan his lust for political power. He writes a good straightforward account of his years with Nixon in the White House and the circumstances which he feels led to Watergate. He is honest about his mistakes, his motives and tells candid stories about Nixon, Kissinger and other White House staff members.

The book is well written on the whole. Joseph DiMona, a professional writer, co-authors the book and it shows.

The book begins while Nixon and the staff are in Florida eating fried clams. While they are eating the phone rings. It is a call from Washington. Yes, you know the rest of the story. Midway through a fairly interesting narrative in the first person, Haldeman detours to tell about his early career, about elections, about people he met and worked with, about his marriage. Then he goes back to the White House and tells about the wire taps, about the tapes, about the cover up.

Through all of this, Haldeman gives interesting details but nothing new or controversial. His observations are good, sometimes amusing but more often not, and his style, in general, is easy to read and pleasant.

"The Ends of Power" makes good reading, but then so does "Tale of Two Cities." If you have a choice, either one will do, but confidentially, I'd save Haldeman's book for later.
