# Court denies new hearing

about dimmitt and castro county by b. m. n.

Just because any particular candidate is a native son of any particular community should not be the overriding motive for the people of the community to support him with their vote and influence. There should be more compelling reasons to support a candidate other than the fact that he is a native son of a community. This I would agree to at the outset.

However, if a native son is a candidate for high office and if his friends and neighbors are convinced that he is the best qualified candidate for the office, he should get their unqualified support and en-dorsement in his race for Congressman from the nineteenth district of Texas.

State Senator Kent Hance is a Dimmitt native and a graduate of Dimmitt High School. He was a respected and popular member of the DHS student body, serving as president of the group during his senior year. His college and professional career as an attorney made him a popular candidate for the State Senate where he made an outstanding record in his freshman year. His record as a civic worker, after graduating with a BBA from Texas Tech University in 1965, and from the Texas University School of Law in 1968, has made him one of the most popular young men in Lubbock. Based on his record as an attorney, civic worker and State Senator, Hance is eminently qualified to replace long-time Congressman George Mahon in the US House of Representatives. His proven ability as a lawmaker makes Hance by far the most qualified candidate for the office of Congressman from the nineteenth district of Texpost

May 6 Democratic Primary. Davis' attorneys appealed Wednesday to the Texas Supreme Court, asking it to reverse the appellate court's decision and declare Davis an eligible candidate for the attorney's county-district

The chain of legal action began several weeks ago when Keith Lemons of Hart, a **Baylor University Law School** student who is opposing Davis in the county attorney's race, filed a civil suit in 64th District Court here to keep Davis' name off the ballot.

The suit alleged that Davis, who was appointed to fill the unexpired term of the late Robert Buntyn, had not met the six-month county residency requirement by the Feb. 6 filing deadline. Davis moved here from Lubbock to take the post after Buntyn's death.


### Pupil transfer Students place high deadline May 1 in literary contests The deadline for students to apply for transfer to the Dim-
